#### Fire Marshal Warns **Against Street** Hazards

Roy Andrews, newly elected fire marshal of Eldorado, announces that stringent measures will be taken to enforce traffic safety regulations in Eldorado when the fire whistle blows.

He states that firemen have been hampered when called out to a fire. by citizens walking or driving in the path of firemen's cars. Instead of running toward the City Hall, or backing out their cars, citizens can help most, he states, by parking along the curb, and remaining there until the volunteer fireboys are on their way.

He stresses the fact that only firemen are needed at a fire and that others can help most by staying out of the way.
