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# History of 1941 Class Concluded

**Helen Thompson**  
 In September, 1941, Helen Thompson entered Sul Ross College at Alpine, taking Business Administration as her major. In December of 1942 she left College and returned to her home in Eldorado planning to start work. In February, 1943, she entered Civil Service at Concho Field, San Angelo, Texas, as Statistical Clerk-Typist. She remained there until Sept., 1944 when she was transferred to Marfa A. A. Field, at Marfa, Texas. There she was Supervisor of Production Control. In Dec., 1945 she left this service and returned home where she will remain until her marriage to Shelby Burke of Alpine. He expects to enter Sul Ross soon to complete his college work which was interrupted when he quit school to enter the service. They will reside in Alpine.

**Floyd and Lloyd Spurgers**  
 The following report is exactly as Floyd handed to us and is a brief record of what Floyd and Lloyd Spurgers have been doing: "We joined the Marine Corps in October of 1942. Received our training in San Diego and Camp Pendleton, California. Our training in the U. S. extended a little over nine months. We shipped overseas July 19, 1943. Arrived in Naumea, New Caledonia in twenty-six days. Left New Caledonia in about a month to New Hebrides, stopping in the harbor of Espiritu Santo. We then sailed for Guadalcanal to prepare for the Bougainville operation. We

joined the Third Marine Division to hit Bougainville. After Bougainville and a rest we sailed from Guadalcanal in May of 1944 to the Marshall Islands. We joined the 58th Navy Task Force to hit Guam with the Third Marine Division. D Day for Guam was July 21. We were in the assault wave. The fighting on Guam was very intensive for the first two weeks. We patrolled Guam for over five months finding and capturing most of the time, killing Japs. We stayed on Guam, training and preparing for another operation—this time we knew would be very close to Japan. We sailed from Guam February 12, 1945 to hit and seize Iwo Jima with the Third Marine Division. We landed there Feb. 23, 1945. We fought the Japs every day we were there and then some. On our way to Iwo we were caught in a Kamizase Raid (Jap Suicide Planes). Many of our ships were hit and sunk. We left Iwo Jima on March 22 for Guam. Remained on Guam until Nov. 7, 1945 then sailed for the U. S. after 29 months overseas. Received our discharges in San Diego Dec. 22 and came home for a very beautiful Christmas."

**Ruby Bodine**  
 No report came from Ruby Bodine. She moved with her family to San Antonio and there she was married.

**Kathleen Crosby**  
 Kathleen Crosby entered State University in Sept. 1941. She received her B. A. degree in Feb., 1945 and since that time she is at home

in Eldorado. She also spends much of her time on the ranch with her Grandfather, G. C. Crosby.

**James E. Henderson**  
 James E. Henderson worked on the ranch for A. P. Bailey most of the time until he went into service in San Antonio July 6, 1942. He joined the Signal Corps and received his basic training in Joplin, Mo. He was sent to Athens, Ga. where he graduated from Radio Mechanics School and went to Tampa, Fla. From there he was transferred to Lakeland, Fla. Nov. 24, 1942 and remained there until July, 1945 as Telephone Linesman. Howard, Neb. was his next station and there he was placed in the Second Air Force. Then he was sent to Pueblo, then to Colorado Springs, Colorado. He was discharged from Ft. Worth, Texas in January, 1946 and is now living in San Angelo, Texas.

**Frank Henderson**  
 Frank Henderson was employed by Terry Crane until January 12, 1942 when he enlisted in the Air Corps at San Antonio. He received his training and graduated from Sheppard Field Mechanics School in July. He then went to Seattle, Washington to school and to Jefferson Barracks, Mo. for a few months training. He was sent to Alaska, arriving there Christmas Eve Day, 1942 He spent three winters there, returning to the States April, 1944. That summer was spent at Watertown, S. D. He returned to Alaska in Oct. being stationed at Ladd Field and Fairbanks as an engineer on B-29's. He came back to the States in Oct. and received his discharge Nov. 5, 1945 at San Antonio. He is now employed by Gandy's Creamery, San Angelo.

**John and James Burr**  
 John and James Burr were beginning to realize their ambitions to be ranchers when they had to leave their ranch in Coke County and answer their country's call to service. John entered the Army in June, 1943 and became a member of the First Cavalry Division, a mechanized unit. He was overseas a little over two years, serving in the Southwest Pacific, the Philippines and was last stationed in India. He received his discharge early in 1946 at El Paso and returned to the ranch in Schleicher County. James entered service in Nov. 1943 and became a member of the Sixth Marine Division. He was in some of the hardest campaigns in the Pacific area; those battles for the capture of Tinian, Saipan, Guam and Okinawa. Then he was with the 22nd Marines when they entered China. He was stationed there when the war ended and only recently returned to the States where he has received his discharge. At the present he is getting a much needed rest on the ranch in Coke County which he and John plan to take over again, soon.

**Katherine Moore**  
 Katherine Moore entered TSCW at Denton in the fall of 1941 working toward a major in Institution Management and a minor in chemistry. That year she was a member of TSCW Dietetics Ass'n and the Mary Swartz Rose Club. She attended the summer sessions and was thus able to complete her work and receive her degree in Sept. 1944. She held membership during her Junior and Senior years in James H. Lowery Club, Rainbow Club, the Round Table and was House Counsellor. In May 1944 she joined the O. E. S. In January 1945 she accepted a position as chemist with Air Technical Service, San Antonio, Texas, where she is still employed. She hopes to do graduate work this summer toward her Master's degree.

**Bertha Sauer**  
 Bertha Sauer attended Nixon-Clay Business College at Austin from August 1941 to June '42. She was then employed at Duncan Field Air Base as stenographer from July '42 to Dec. of that year. August 24, 1942 she married Master Sgt. Vernon Lux. She moved to Dodge City, Kansas where she was employed as a bookkeeper until

March, 1943. Their daughter, Verna Ann was born in Dodge City, Aug. 3, 1944. Her husband was discharged Dec. 1945 and they plan to make their home on a farm west of Eldorado.

**Abram Millar**  
 Abram Millar was attending A. & M. College when he enlisted in the AAF in October, 1942. He received his training mostly in New Mexico. He was sent overseas to the European Theatre of War and arrived Nov. 15, 1944. He was serving with the 305th Bombardment Group as a Waist Gunner on the B-17 Flying Fortress "Reich's Ruin." Sgt. Millar was seriously wounded in action over Germany on Jan. 10, 1945. At that time he had participated in 10 daylight bombing raids over Germany. After being seriously wounded, and realizing the plane had two engines knocked out, Abe still had presence of mind enough to trip the toggle switch with his foot releasing the bombs and enabling the pilot to right the plane. For this he was awarded the Silver Star. They landed in France where Abe was kept in a hospital for some time and then removed to England. After his recovery, he rejoined his unit and completed his missions. He returned to the States and was discharged in the Summer of 1945. He is now attending Teachers' College at Denton, Texas.

**Norah Mund**  
 Norah Mund attended TSCW in Denton during 1941 and '42, majoring in Foods and later Business. She transferred to Nixon-Clay Commercial College in Austin and graduated from there in 1943. 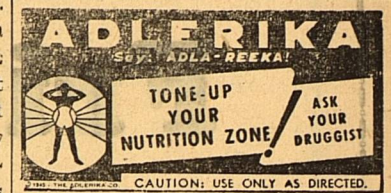
**Earnest Dickey Jr.**

She transferred to the Medical school at Galveston where they are both studying toward their degrees in Medicine.

**James S. Huggins**  
 James S. Huggins, class sponsor, volunteered at Brownwood March 1943. He received basic training at Boca Raton. In May, he was appointed a Meteorology Cadet and was sent to New York U. to the AAF Tech. training detachment. He was graduated Feb. 1944 as a Meteorologist. He was assigned to the Base Weather office at Dalhart AAB. until July 1944. He was sent to New York on temporary duty with CAA in Flight Office Central School. In August 1944 he was ordered to report to Casa Blanca. There he was assigned duty as Operation's officer and sent to Naples Italy, where he remained until Nov. 1944, when he was sent to open the ATC base at Rome. For several months he was the only Flight Operation Officer at that base. Sept. 1945, he was given additional duty as Military Manager of the Hossler Hotel. At present he is hotel manager and billeting officer. While in operations, he was required to fly over all the routes over which he dispatched aircraft and while on this duty, he visited all cities in

North Africa; all our bases in France; parts of England; and all our bases in Germany and Greece. He was in some combat and is entitled to wear three campaign stars. If his wife is permitted to join him in Italy soon, he will sign up for another year of service abroad. In August, 1944, he married Miss Cleo Brown of Ft. Worth and she makes her home in Amarillo, while he is in service.

**Committee Submits Financial Report On Beautification**

Schleicher County has achieved great success in planting out their Living Memorial shrubs and trees. To date at least 250 redbud have been planted, 50 watermelon creeper myrtle, 24 pecan trees, 5 live oak, several hundred mountain laurel and 12 senecia.

Citizens of the County donated a total sum of \$160.39—\$49.54 of which was spent for redbud, senecia and crepe myrtle, leaving a total of \$110.85 in the account credited to "Eldorado Beautification Committee" to complete the fall planting along the highways and public parks.

The pecan was selected many years ago as Schleicher County's shade tree. The Woman's Club of Eldorado donated a \$2.50 red bud to the highway project.


