Sofge Murder Trial Moves to Ballinger

The trial of Carl Sofge, charged with the murder of his brother Clem on Oct. 22 on the streets of Eldorado, will be held in Ballinger, change of venue having been granted by Judge John F. Sutton Monday. The date will be Monday, March 4, it was announced late Tuesday afternoon.

Announcement of change was made Monday night as the culmination of a legal battle which had been in progress since 9:00 that morning. The judge had previously overruled a defense motion for change of venue.

Defense attorneys presented 11 witnesses to show that general opinion had been determined by reading and discussing of the case, that the defendant was pre-judged and that prejudice would prevent his getting a fair trial. The state produced six witnesses to show that a fair trial could be had on basis of newspaper reports, and general discussion. Dist. Attorney Robert G. Hughes brought out the point that the newspaper accounts were not denunciatory, as they merely gave the facts.

Affidavits filed in court in the morning and signed by Payne Robinson, draft board secretary, and justice of the peace, and Roy Andrews, declared that in their opinion Sofge could not get a fair trial. Another carrying the signature of E. H. Sweatt, sheriff, asserted Sweatt's belief that a fair trial could be held.

Upon opening of the case state and defense counsel agreed to pertinent facts, such as the statement that there are between 300 and 400 qualified Schleicher voters, and more citizens in town than on farm and ranch. All Success and Standard Times issues which dealt with the case were submitted by the defense as evidence and the news items were read to show that the facts in the case were widely known by the reading public, and that there was general discussion of these facts.

Defense counsel introduced Ernest Hill, hardware merchant, Dan Adams from the east end of the county 20 miles away, Ed Hill wool, feed and grain dealer, Clyde Keeney, stock farmer and resident of Schleicher since 1900, Henry Mittel, who lives 13 miles north of Eldorado, and who testified that 85 had attended deceased's funeral. O. E. Conner, former sheriff and resident of the county 39 years. Harvey Spears, resident of the county as a rancher 42 years, Dr. H. W. Wiedenmann, in the county 19 years, Jess Walston, feed and grain dealer, F. B. Calcote, lifelong Schleicher resident, now garage owner, and Payne Robinson resident of the county 42 years.

General defense testimony was to the effect that facts in the case were well known and that an unprejudiced jury could not be found.

Witnesses for the prosecution were S. D. Harper, Judge Nix, who ranches east of town but lives in Eldorado, J. L. Ratliff, resident of Eldorado 19 years as proprietor of dry goods store and funeral establishment, Arthur Mund, stock farmer living 15 miles from town, Hugh McAngus, for 25 years; Schleicher stock farmer, Lester Baker, bank employee and mayor and E. E. Newlin who ranches 14 miles southwest of town.

All of these testified that there was good chance of fair trial, in view of the high calibre citizenship in Schleicher, though several

stated upon cross examination that they had not talked with many people about the case.

At 5:45 p. m., both sides had completed their arguments for and against the venue change. Judge Sutton then denied the application, announced a 1½ hour recess, and instructed the court to reassemble at 7:00 o'clock and begin selecting a jury.

Questioning of the 100 special veniremen started at 7:00 p. m. though all reported in the court house at 9:00 a. m., when several with ironclad excuses were dismissed. About 20 veniremen were called for examination, with none qualifying, most being ruled out as being prejudiced against the defendant. At that point the judge stopped the examination and announced that the change of venue would be granted.

Defense and state attorneys and Judge Sutton failed that night to reach an agreement on the place for trial, but Tuesday morning agreed on Ballinger, in Runnels Co., the date to be March 4, as agreed upon later in the day.

Representing Carl Sofge, the defendant, were B. W. Smith of San Angelo, W. A. Morris of San Antonio, M. E. Blackburn of Junction and R. E. Gray of San Saba. The case was tried with District Robert G. Hughes in prosecution. Another attorney, Ralph Logan who recently returned from service and who resumes his former place as district attorney on Feb. 1, also assisted.

Change of venue witnesses were formally dismissed at the courthouse Tuesday.

Judge Sutton states that all witnesses subpoenaed for the trial will be required to follow the trial without further notice.

Eldorado Loses One and Wins One

The Eldorado high school basketball boys nipped the Menard high school boys a stinging defeat of 36 to 27 for a sweet revenge at the Ozona basketball tournament last Friday. Before Christmas at Menard the boys of Coach England slapped an easy victory over the green Eldorado boys.

The second game was a bit different though and the competition somewhat tougher, and the local boys were raced away from by Big Lake, the actual final winner of the whole tournament, by a score of 41-28.

J. F. Runge Present At State Meeting

J. F. Runge has been attending a soil conservation meeting at Lubbock and another similar meeting at Spur. Mr. Runge, one of the state soil conservation supervisors, was accompanied by Conservationist Fawcett of Del Rio. He returned to Schleicher County Tuesday. He has been a member of the state board several years and is active in soil conservation work in this county.

Over \$100 Is Raised For March of Dimes

Over \$100 had been collected yesterday in the March of Dimes campaign, with tonight, Thursday, the official closing date. Of this amount \$42.25 was collected at the Lions Club Wednesday and \$60.21 from collections about town.

Clothing Chairman Thanks Public

Fred Watson, chairman of the clothes drive for war relief, states that a fine collection of clothing was gathered here, including many good garments.

SIX MORE HOUSES TO GET CURRENT

Line 6, a 9-mile REA section with 6 members, will be energized during the next few days, states Don McCormick, manager of the Southwest Texas Co-Op.

Manager McCormick states that a total of 102.4 miles have been energized, with 68 members receiving service. Ten houses on the energized lines have not yet been wired. G. P. Teague, REA house wiring inspector, of Ballinger, is spending the week here, inspecting recently wired houses on the Co-Op's lines. He will work here this week and will return later as other houses are wired.

Three New Members Join Lions Club

The Lions enrolled three new members—A. G. Clark, Rance McDonald and Edward Meador—at their regular meeting Wednesday noon at the Eldo.

The group spent some time discussing cleanliness of the town, and the club voted to do everything possible to keep the city streets clean.

It was voted to buy a book of American literature to donate to the Latin American school library. Reports from Fred Watson, clothing drive chairman, and Jerry Pennington, who headed the March of Dimes drive, were heard.

DDT DEMONSTRATION FOR COUNTY IS PLANNED BY THE COUNTY AGENT

Plans are under way for a County wide demonstration in the use of DDT for killing the lice and controlling the hornfly of cattle. Goat lice, and sheep lice and tick can be killed with the same treatment.

The shortage of machinery and the scarcity of vats has caused a delay in a majority of the producers getting started upon the control of lice and tick in their flocks. Spraying machinery is expected in this county almost any day.

Three different methods will be used, spraying, dipping, and dusting, using the wettable powder. In each case of spraying and dipping .2 of 1% DDT will be used which is sufficient to kill all lice and ticks of sheep, goats, and cattle. If a stronger solution of DDT is used it is at the expense of the operator as .2% is sufficient.

A vat that is charged with DDT will retain its strength throughout the year. A producer wishing to rid his cattle, sheep, or goats of lice and ticks now may add water to his vat later; adding the amount of DDT required to bring the solution to a .2% of 1% solution of the water added. In the grub season which begins in October and continues through November and December Rotone may be added thus the lice, tick, horn flies and grubs are controlled all in one dipping or spraying.

Lice and ticks of goats, sheep, and cattle are controlled in one dipping, spraying or dusting.

17-Yr. Old Herder Shows Case Animals

W. F. Edmiston, 17, of Case Case Ranch, one of the youngest herdsmen in the Southwest to assume full responsibility for registered stock at a show, took four Case animals to sell and several to show at the Brown Co. Livestock Show at Brownwood Sunday.

A bull, Woodrow Mischief 20, took first place in his class in competition with horned and polled calves. One of the Case heifers, Kate Mischief, placed 4th, another, Lady H 3rd, placed 6th, and a pair of calves also placed 6th.

The Cases also sent two bulls and two heifers to the show for sale.

One of the most interesting phases of the Case's entry was the age of the herder. Young W. F. Edmiston, trained by his father to be an expert herdsman, can fit the calves and take the entire responsibility for showing stock, without aid from anyone.

The Case Ranch is operated by B. F. Case, who specializes in polled stock. The family occupy a large ranch home with private swimming pool along the Mertzon road, about 12 or 15 miles from Eldorado. The Cases have three children, Mrs. J. W. Adams, whose marriage to Capt. Adams of Mertzon occurred a few weeks ago, and who is now in San Antonio; Fred hospital apprentice 1st class in the Navy; and Helen, Hockaday student at Dallas.

His opening jubilee Saturday culminates a month of activity, in which electricians, carpenters, painters and others have been pressed into service to push the project at minimum disruption of business.

Much of the moving of counters, re-arranging of stock, and painting was done at night—crews alternating to produce work 24 hours per day.

New display counters which Mr. Parker moved in to replace the old ones, are large enough to carry huge quantities of merchandise. These, as well as the entire interior, are painted white. A new walk-in cooler, 10x14x7 feet in size, was installed several weeks ago for meats, releasing the 6x8x7 cooler for exclusive storage of vegetables. Both coolers are not visible to the public, but they enable Mr. Parker to stock large quantities of meats and vegetables, minimizing loss. Vegetable and fruit bins, some equipped with refrigeration units, and all backed with mirrors, run the length of the main room, displaying fresh products which are arranged for the convenience of the shopper.

Doubling of the floor space for the store was accomplished by removing of the partition which separated the store from office rooms to the south, L. L. Baker and J. D. Ashmore moving their businesses to provide this additional room. The store now occupies 5200 square feet. Workmen today are putting up a new awning and painting the front of the entire building.
