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# **Practices Stressed**

Six hundred and sixty-two thousand dollars is a lot of money to 'go down the creek" every year. That is just what farmers, ranch ers and other residents of the 7200 square mile area of the Middle Colorado River watershed are losng in flood damage every year.

Damage on the Middle Colorado watershed results primarily from the flooding of either crop or pasture land. In this livestock-raising section of Texas, there has been ittle industrial development and only the largest and most devastating floods have caused substantial urban or non-agricultural damage.

Average flood damage to crops and pastures along Pecan Bayou above Lake Brownwood alone is estimated at \$146,400 annually. Farmers and ranchers below the lake lose an average of \$49,500 in flood damage to crops every year

In the upper Colorado area, average crop and pasture damage amounts to \$145,500 yearly. Brady Creek floods on the average destroy \$66,250 worth of crops and pasture. annually. Overflow of crops and pasture land in the San Saba River area results in average annual damage of \$118,700.

This brings the total average annual flood damage to crops and pastures alone in the Middle Colorado watershed to \$526,350.

Often a farmer loses his entire crop or his season's pasture is destroyed. Sometimes part of his crop is destroyed, per-acre yields thus being reduced. When fields are washed out, there is the added expense of repeated plantings and

In addition to their crop and pasture losses, farmers and ranchers of the watershed lose an annual average of \$97,260 in other agricultural damage caused by floods. They lose valuable livestock. Often there is a loss of stored crops. Flood waters damage farm buildings, fences farm roads and other farm prop-

Local thunderstorms covering from 100 to 500 square miles in the uplands of the watershed cause severe flooding on small tributaries while causing only small rises on the main stems. On the other hand, frontal storms and cyclonic disturbances, covering extensive tributary areas or a major part of the watershed, result in severe flooding not only along the small tributary streams but also along the main stems of the large tributaries and the Colorado River. 76% of the estimated average annual damage of \$662,000, however, occurs on the small tributary streams.

Though most of the loss is agricultural, the floods also cause some damage to urban and public property. Roads are flooded, bridges are washed out, and telephone lines, gas and oil pipe lines are damaged. According to the Department of Agriculture survey report, nonagricultural damage of this type averages \$38,600 annually.

There are also certain intangible osses that cannot be measured readily in dollars and cents. High waters often cause an interruption in public utility services, loss of wages because of business shutdowns and solation of recreational facilities.

There is also the washing away of precious topsoil which cannot be evaluated. As the topsoil is washed off by the flood water, productivity of fields and pastures declines and the value of the farms and ranches steadily goes down and down. Even much of the pasture land of the Middle Colorado watershed is exposed to such erosion because it has been overgrazed. The survey report stated:

"Approximately 85% of the wa tershed still supports a semblance of its native vegetation although weeds, unpalatable annual grasses shrubs and cacti have spread considerably since cattle, sheep and goats over-populated the pastures

While farmers and ranchers suffer the greatest losses, it can be seen from the survey report on damages that all people in the Middle Colorado River watershed are affected one way or another by repeated floods.



These trees take their toll in stunting crops for many feet around where they grow. It is practical to kill back perhaps 30 feet in the pasture to give crops the advantage of moisture at the edge of

fields. Since the growing season is over now, trees, may be killed quickly by the following procedure: Cut through the bark of the tree you want to kill. Then mix this formula, heat one and one-half gallons of water to a boil, add two pounds of sal soda, slowly mix one pound of lye into the water and follow with two pounds of white arsenic. When all the ingredients have dissolved, remove the mixture from the fire. Pour into the cut bark of the tree one teaspoonful of the poison mix-Mrs. E. H. Coulter assisted the ture. # '46 COTTON CROP IN NEED OF RAIN;

Little cotton insect infestation is reported in Schleicher County's cotton, as the Farmer's Co-op gin prepares to handle what may be a short

County Agent W. G. Godwin, in a recent tour of the county to make an insect survey, found 3% boll worm infestation of cotton - indicating extremely light damage from that source.

It is generally admitted that without moisture, the drouth will cut the yield, by decreasing the number, size and quality of the bolls. This is a disappointing situation to growers, who had started the season with fine prospects.

Hop Cheatham has had to use poison for leaf worm - possibly the only one in the county to do so.

A few bolls of open cotton have been noticed by growers, who state that cotton is heavily loaded, promising a fair crop if moisture comes in time.

An estimated 1500 to 2,000 acres of Schleicher County land is planted this year in cotton. The yield should be 300 or more bales, state local gin men.

In preparation for handling of the crop, the Farmers' Co-op gin has replaced worn gin saws, and worked others over; these are back from the factory and are again in place at the gin. Other repairs and preparations are under way, with possibility that a few scattered bales may be ready for ginning in a week or two.

Local Manager Van McCormick reports a shortage of gin hands to date, and necessity of locating help before the gin starts its late sum-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. #### TEACHER ASS'N MAKES TEACHER SHORTAGE CHECK

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey to determine the number of teaching positions now vacant that must be filled by September 1 if schools are to open with a full staff of teachers.

Replies were received from 813 superintendents representing 33,958 teaching positions or approximately 75% of all the teachers in Texas. Out of this number, it was disclosed that there are 4,324 positions now vacant or 12.7% of the total. The picture is much worse for rural schools.
