Bond Election Called to Authorize Paving

The first step in Eldorado's determined effort to do something definite to get the city out of the mud will be taken Feb. 23, when qualified voters will go to the polls and vote on a proposed \$100,000 bond issue for paving over 5 miles of the city streets.

Decision to put the question to Eldorado citizens was reached at the council meeting Monday night culminating years of discussion on the part of Eldorado home owners and renters.

A second proposition in the Feb. 23 election will be issuance of revenue bonds to provide funds for the extension of the water and sewer systems.

An official legal notice published on another page of this paper, gives a detailed and legal description of the proposed bond issues, and our readers are urged to study it carefully.

A map of the proposed paving project which would be financed at a cost of \$100,000 has been drawn up and is on display at the city hall. Voters are urged to study this map so they may understand where the paving would be laid.

Safety Engineer Addresses Employees of Shell Company

R. L. Huffman, safety engineer from Houston, spoke on the fact that safety meetings had lowered the lost time accident rate of the Austin division of the company from 445 in 1944 to just eight in 1945, when the Shell Pipe Line Safety Chapter No. 17 met last Thursday evening in San Angelo.

About 20 representatives from Big Lake, Eldorado and Menard were present for the meeting which was held in the Art Room at the Hotel Cactus. Huffman said about 1,500 persons were employed by this division.

In this city, Chairman Fred Watson reports a total of 1751 pounds as compared with 1885 pounds last year. Included in Eldorado's shipment were 325 pairs of shoes for men, women and children and 35 pairs for infants, also many more garments.

AAA PROGRAM NOW UNDER WAY IN SCHLEICHER

The Schleicher County Agricultural Conservation Association has begun work on the 1946 AAA program. Assistance will be given producers for eight practices including: terracing of cropland, drilling of wells for livestock, laying of pipe lines, contour farming intertilled crops, establishing winter cover crops, seeding drilled crops contour, deferred grazing and eradication practices.

The County has been allotted \$75,606.00 for this year's program. In order that this allotment is not exceeded every practice carried out by producers for which assistance is desired must have prior written approval of the County Committee before the practice is begun. This requirement applies to all the above listed practices.

The county AAA office has on hand the 1946 Farm Plan Work Sheets. Every producer carrying out any 1946 practice must execute his plan sheet before work is begun and not later than May 15, 1946. However it would be appreciated if this matter was attended to as soon as possible.

Information concerning allotments for individual farms and requirements for any practices is available at the local AAA office.

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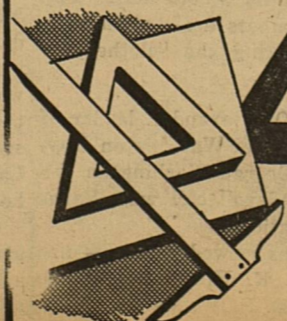
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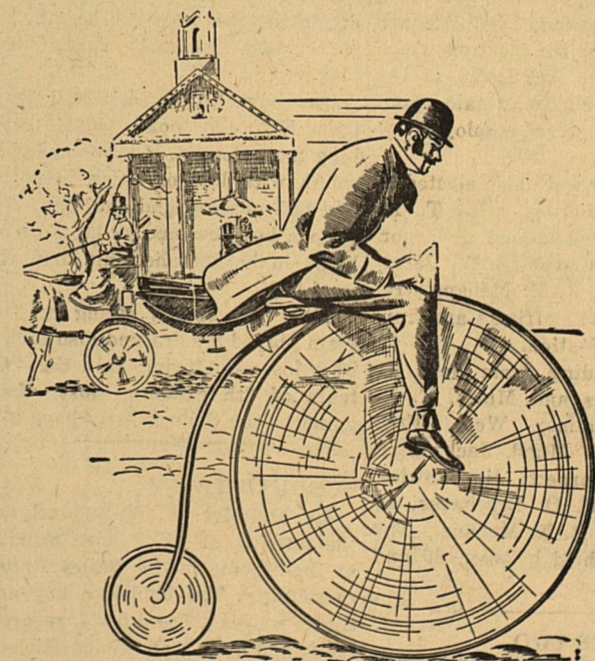

Take notice that an election will be held on the 23rd day of February, 1946, in the City of Eldorado, Texas, on the propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the order of election adopted by the City Council on the 4th day of February, 1946, which is as follows:

RESOLUTION AND ORDER

By the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, calling an election on the question of the issuance of Revenue Bonds of said City in the amount of \$62,000.00, of which \$12,000.00 of bonds will be issued for the purpose of cancelling, refunding and paying off an equal amount of outstanding "City of Eldorado, Texas, Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds," dated August 1, 1938, and \$50,000.00 of bonds will be issued for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the waterworks system now owned by the City of Eldorado, Texas, and pledging the revenues of the waterworks system and the sewer system of said city for the payment thereof; and on the question of the issuance of tax bonds of said City in the amount of \$100,000.00, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in the City of Eldorado, and the levying of a tax in payment thereof.

WHEREAS, the City of Eldorado, Texas, has heretofore legally issued its bonds known as "City of Eldorado, Texas, Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds," dated August 1, 1938, Numbers 1 to 40, inclusive, in the denomination of \$500.00 each, aggregating \$20,000.00, bearing 4½% interest per annum, and maturing on August 1st, \$1,000 in each of the years 1939 to 1943, inclusive, and \$1,500 in each of the years 1944 to 1953, inclusive, for the purpose of securing funds to aid in the purchase and extension and improvement of a Waterworks System and for the construction of a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City, and pledged the revenues of the Waterworks System and the Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, to the payment of said bonds; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it advisable and to the best interest of the City of Eldorado to make certain improvements and extensions to the Waterworks System of the City; and,

WHEREAS, there are still outstanding \$12,000.00 "City of Eldorado, Texas, Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds," dated August 1, 1938, & maturing \$1,500.00 on August 1st in each of the years 1946 to 1953, inclusive, which constitute a lien on the revenues of the said Waterworks and Sewer System; and,

WHEREAS, it is considered to be

to the best interest of said City that the construction of such improvements and extensions to the Waterworks System be financed by the issuance of revenue bonds in the amount of \$50,000.00, which bonds, together with the \$12,000.00 of revenue bonds to be issued for the purpose of cancelling, refunding and paying off an equal amount of outstanding Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds shall be payable solely from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the Waterworks and Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the 1925 Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and in no wise supported by an ad valorem or other tax on property in the City; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it advisable and to the best interest of the City of Eldorado to construct certain street improvements in the said City and to finance the construction of such street improvements by the issuance of \$100,000.00 Tax Bonds of the City; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it necessary and proper that the questions of the issuance of such \$62,000.00 revenue bonds and the pledging of such revenues, and the issuance of such \$100,000.00 tax bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof, be submitted to the qualified electors of said City;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS:

I.

That an election be held on the 23rd day of February, 1946, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

"Shall the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, be authorized to issue \$62,000.00 of revenue bonds of said City, of which \$12,000.00 of bonds will be issued for the purpose of cancelling, refunding and paying off an equal amount of outstanding "City of Eldorado, Texas, Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds," dated August 1, 1938, and \$50,000.00 of bonds will be issued for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the existing Waterworks System now owned by the City of Eldorado, Texas; maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half (4½) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of and interest on said bonds by pledging the net revenues from the operation of the Waterworks System and the Sewer System of said City."

PROPOSITION NO. 2

"Shall the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Eldorado, in the sum of \$100,000.00, payable serially not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, bearing interest at a

rate not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in said City, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas."

II

The said election shall be held at the City Hall Building, in said City, and the following persons are hereby appointed officers of said election: Jno. H. Roogers as Presiding Judge, C. A. Reynolds, as Judge, and J. M. Pennington as Clerk.

III

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds by cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For the issuance of waterworks and Sewer System Revenue bonds and the pledging of the Revenues of the Waterworks System and the Sewer System of said City to the payment thereof, as submitted in Proposition No. 1."

"Against the issuance of Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds and the pledging of the revenues of the Waterworks System and the Sewer System of said City to the payment thereof, as submitted in Proposition No. 1."

"For the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in Proposition No. 2."

"Against the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in Proposition No. 2."

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the two propositions, respectively.

IV

That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor and said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

V

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause this notice of election to be posted at three (3) public places in the City, one of which shall be at the City Hall and one of which shall be at the place designated for holding the election, for at least fifteen (15) full days prior to the date of said election.

VI

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to cause this notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, once each week for two successive weeks. The date of the first publication shall be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date of said election.

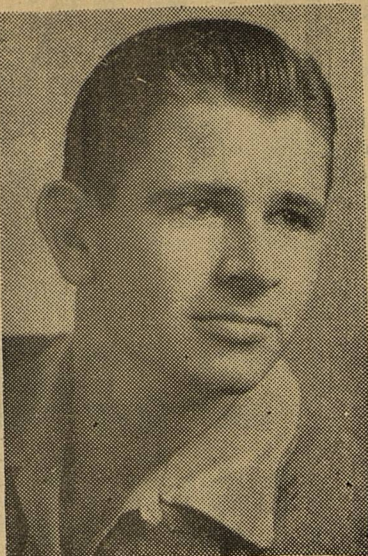

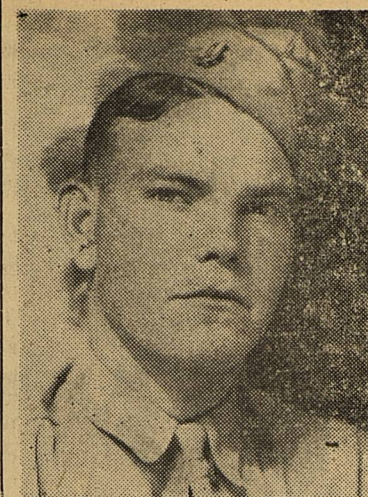
