REPRESENTS LOCAL BANK AT ANGELO CONFERENCE

W. O. Alexander, vice president and cashier of the First National Bank of Eldorado, represented the local bank at a conference in San Angelo last Thursday of West Texas bankers in session with officials of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Objective of these sessions planned by the Reserve bank is to draw the Federal agency into closer relationship with the actual leaders in the field. This was the fourth session in the series of conferences.

General opinion expressed by the bankers in their meeting was that agriculture is facing a price decline, and that warehouses stocked with wool still belonging to the CCC, is a distinct threat. West Texas bankers who as shown by the records are the "lending-est" bunch of financiers in the 11th Federal reserve district, have already "put the brakes on" their state.

94-Year-Old Ft. McKavett To Be Permanently "Lit Up"

For the first time in its 94-years of existence, Ft. McKavett will have electricity from a central power station, when REA brings electric service next week, over a 27-mile line in the east part of the county.

Colorful Ft. McKavett, long ago in the limelight as a frontier fort for negro troops, today is somewhat of a ghost town. The Southwest Texas Electric Co.-Op., energizing its new Ft. McKavett line next week, will bring electricity to about 25 users there, including the filling stations, business houses and residences interspersed among the ruins of the old Fort. A total of about 35 will receive current on this line next week—25 in town and 10 others elsewhere.

Ft. McKavett has had electricity before—but always from a small local plant. Taylor Construction Co., will receive more wire early in 1947, and expect to complete stringing 20 remaining miles of line in that locality—thus completing all of Sec. A.

Ranchman Is Killed In San Angelo Hotel

Wylie R. Tomlinson, 32, Menard County ranchman, and former serviceman, was released under \$10,000 bond at noon Saturday following the death of H. B. Opp, 64, former Menard ranchman, who owned oil leases in Schleicher and Concho counties. Eight San Angelo and Menard ranchmen signed as sureties.

Opp died instantly about 3:00 o'clock Friday afternoon in the lobby of the Roberts Hotel in San Angelo after a .45 calibre bullet entered behind his left ear. Murder with malice aforethought was the charge placed against Tomlinson in Justice of the Peace Charles Gibbs' court.

Opp, who had lived in recent years in San Diego, Calif., had lived in Menard County about 25 or 30 years, owning ranching interests there. He had entered the oil business several years ago, drilling tests in this county where he got a small discovery well on the Whitten ranch which did not amount to much as a producer.

After moving with his family to San Diego, he made occasional trips back to Texas to look after his oil interests. He had been in San Angelo about five weeks before his death, and had been in Eldorado the day of his death.

Opp and Special Ranger L. E. Trimble were charged on Nov. 29, 1934 with the murder of Wylie Tomlinson, Sr., Menard ranchman and county commissioner, and father of the young man charged last week with Opp's death. After a long session of trials, the case against Opp was dismissed.

Funeral services for Opp were conducted at 5:00 p. m. Saturday from the Robert Massie Chapel in Angelo, and the body was shipped to San Diego for burial. Survivors in addition to the widow include the mother, three daughters by a former marriage, one son and one grandchild.

40th ANNUAL SALE OF XMAS SEALS NOW ON

The 40th annual Christmas Seal sale which opened this week carries a life-saving Christmas tradition not only into Texas homes but to all military installations in Texas.

In a letter to Pansy Nichols, executive secretary, Texas Tuberculosis Association, General Janathan M. Wainwright this week endorsed the State-wide campaign for funds to combat tuberculosis, and declared Christmas Seals will be made available to military personnel throughout the State.

"The purchase and use of Christmas Seals has become an institution in this country of ours," General Wainwright said, "and I would like to have you know that your efforts in raising funds through the sale of seals for use in the control of tuberculosis has my whole-hearted endorsement."

U. S. SAVINGS BOND SELLING CAMPAIGN NOW UNDER WAY

More than 6,500 Texas volunteers will help the Treasury sell extra U. S. Savings Bonds in the year-end campaign which opened Armistice Day and runs through Pearl Harbor Day, December 7th.

"There will be no house-to-house canvass," Nathan Adams, state chairman of the advisory committee for Texas, said, "but every avenue of publicity will urge Americans to 'Save for Security' and 'Buy Extra Bonds Now,' the slogans of the campaign."

Chief aim of the campaign is to increase every citizen's bond holdings in order to distribute as widely as possible the interest payments on the public debt.

"As these bonds mature, both the principal and interest paid to the owners will become purchasing power," Mr. Adams said. "Smart Americans are adding to their war bond holdings in order to share in this."

TAYLOR CONSTRUCTION CO. TO LEAVE IN DECEMBER

Taylor Construction Co., are planning to leave Eldorado by Dec. 15, when the sewer extension lines will be completed and a clean-up job finished—but will return in January to put in the new water lines, if pipe is available by that time.

WILLOUGHBY HONORED

Ray Willoughby, prominent rancher of the Southwest, with ranching interests in Schleicher Co., has been appointed on a wool advisory committee to assist the government in administering the wool merchandising program. He is also vice president of the National Wool Growers Association.

ROTARY MOVED TO COOPER NO. 4 FOR NEW TEST

The rotary which drilled the Cooper-Page well will take over on No. 4A Jess Koy, next well to go down in the Koy field, and pipe will be re-perforated in the Tisdale well—these are the latest Schleicher Co. oil developments.

Cooper Gas Co. 2D Bert Page (C NW NE 39-L-GH&SA) flowed 208 barrels of oil through tubing in a 24-hour test ending Tuesday morning—which places it at this time as the smallest of the producing new wells in the field. The well was treated last week with 3,000 gallons of acid through casing perforations at 5,600-45 feet. This well is a quarter mile south of Cooper No. 3A Koy. Surface hole for Cooper-Page 3D, located ¼ mile south of 2D is practically ready, but it is understood that it will not be drilled at this time.

The new Koy location is Cooper-Koy 4A, 1320 feet east of Koy 2A, is C SE SE 38-L-GH&SA. Repair parts and other needed supplies came in Monday.

Testing of the Tisdale well (C NW NW 16-A HE&WT) is scheduled to go on through the week. The pipe will be re-perforated at 2710-28 and 2738-74 feet, to further test the Wichita Albany vein showing.

City Awaits Figures On Gas Appraisal

Nothing has been heard to date concerning the recent appraisal of the Rio Gas system, and until the result of this appraisal is ready for release, no action can be taken by the city on proposed purchase of the local gas distributing system.

The firm of Beavers & Lodal was engaged by both the gas company and the city in an effort to set a price which would be acceptable to both parties. If purchased, the gas system will be operated as a city-owned utility.

The Eldorado schools closed Wednesday afternoon for the holidays and will re-open Monday morning.

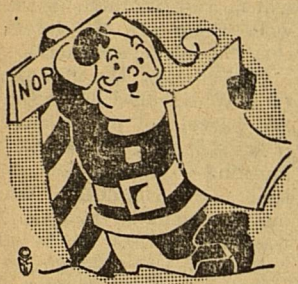

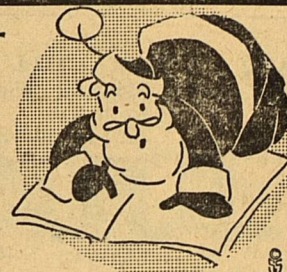

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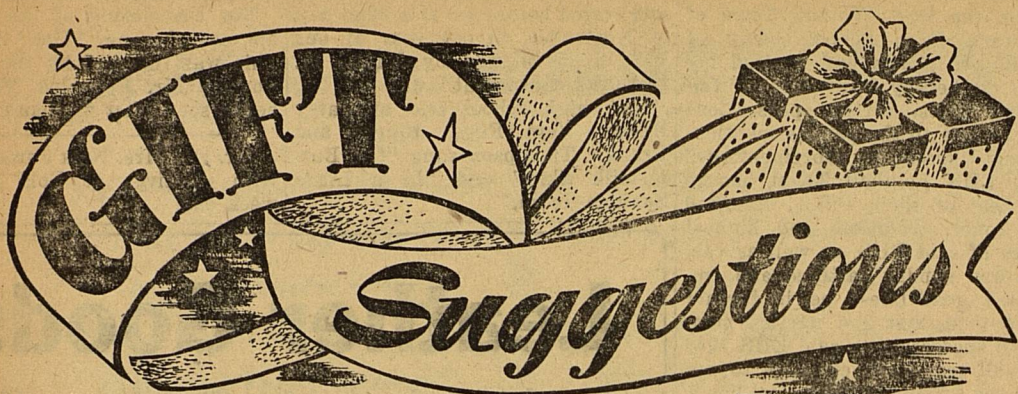

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How To Use Less Tender Cuts of Meat

Opening of the deer season in Texas has brought to the wives of successful hunters the problem of using the less tender cuts of venison. Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, offers venison sausage with its variety of uses as a solution.

The shoulder, neck and lower portion of the ribs when boned make good sausage, says Miss Lawrence. Here are the directions:

Grind the meat, using three parts deer meat to one part of fresh pork fat. If a drier sausage is preferred, use four parts deer meat and one part of pork fat. Season with one and one-third cups of salt and three-fourths of a cup of black pepper to 50 pounds of meat. About three-eighths of a cup of sage may be added to the seasoning mixture, according to taste. (Three eighths of a cup equals one-fourth of a cup plus two tablespoons.)

If the sausage is to be kept for some time, stuff it in a casing or muslin bag, Miss Lawrence suggests. She adds that the sausage may be smoked, depending on family preferences.

Ground venison may be used as any other ground meat—in meat loaf, with spaghetti or in chili, for instance. Sometimes even the choice cuts from an old animal prove difficult to cook tender, and in this event they should be ground. In addition to adding seasoning, add some fat, too, the specialist advises, for venison usually contains insufficient fat. That is sometimes a reason it remains tough after long cooking.

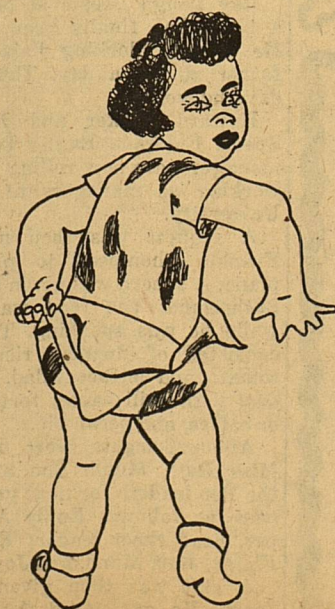

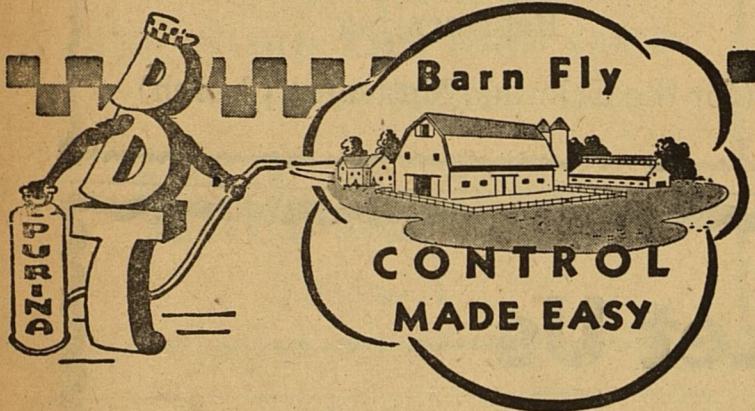

Stock 1029 For Spinose Ear Ticks

Common throughout most of Texas, the spinose ear tick, an external parasite that attacks horses, sheep, goats and deer, should be treated now with Stock 1029.

This recommendation comes from entomologists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who say that the tick can be controlled by a single fall and spring Stock 1029 treatment, provided the farmer also sprays his salt and mineral boxes each month with equal parts of kerosene and lubricating oil.

In the immature stage, the tick attaches itself to the ears of animals, and Stock 1029 can best be applied with a one inch paint brush. Both the inner and outer surface of the animal's ear should be covered thoroughly.

Stock 1029 is a mixture of pyridine containing 45 percent rosin, 40 per cent hercolyn and 15 per cent dibutyl phthalate.
