Good Rain Blankets Most of Schleicher Co.

A good rain, not general, but covering more of Schleicher County than other late spring rains have done this year, fell Wednesday afternoon.

While complete information on all communities is not available, scattered reports have been received as follows:

At Carroll Whites, in Cliff Community, 1½ inches and light rain on preceding night, at Joab Campbell's over an inch, and good rain throughout that locality; Bailey over half an inch; at Eldorado, .76 inch; Runge's official gauge, .5 inch; Cecil Meador's, good rain; Jackson's, in dry strip in Northeast part of county, good rain; Joe Eden's, light rain but 1½ inches fell to the east; Frank Meador's, light rain; A. J. Halbert's, two miles south of town, 1 inch; Faught ranch, 8 miles Southwest of town, good rain; Moore's Gin and locality, none; John Williams, heavy; Sam Jones, 1 inch over whole ranch; Bert Page and Jess Koy locality, good rain.

Heavy rain was reported at Christoval and in most of the farm and ranch land between Eldorado and San Angelo.

MORE REA POLES ARRIVING FOR COUNTY LINES

Three more carloads of poles will be sufficient to supply the REA lines with poles throughout the county, state officials of Taylor Construction Co., who will move part of their men to another location when these have been received and set. Poles to Ft. McKavett have been set, and work is under way in other parts of the county.

Wire must be secured and strung before the lines are ready for use, this work to be done by Taylor Construction Co., as the materials are received. Though poles are now more easily obtained, wire remains a short material.

Hatchery Operators Attend 3-Weeks' Poultry Short Course

Albert McGinty and Mrs. George Williams will leave Sunday for A & M, where they will attend a 3-weeks course in poultry. They expect to return to Eldorado in time to re-open their hatchery on July 15.

Mrs. Williams, who has been operating the large Williams Hatchery in Eldorado, recently turned over management of the Hatchery to her son, Albert McGinty, who, with his wife, occupies the cottage, at the rear of the business building.

Bank Deposits Pass Two Million Mark

An all time record in Eldorado bank deposits was established by the First National Bank Tuesday afternoon when wool checks pushed the total over the \$2,000,000 mark.

This figure, the highest ever reached in the history of the institution, reflects the excellent financial condition of the entire County.

Officials of the bank express the opinion that wool checks and live stock payments are partly responsible for the heavy deposits. Ranchers have been receiving a high price for stock sold for lack of grass, and movement of stock out of Schleicher County has been compar-

They will leave the building in its present location for awhile, but are considering the possibility of moving it to a lot nearer the business district later.

Combining Proceeds On Short Grain Crop

Combining of Schleicher County's short grain crop is underway this week. From the Reynolds Community, usually a leading section in grain production, come reports that the yield in oats is only about 10 to 12 bushels per acre, drouth having cut production.

Feed crops are unusually short this year because of the drouth, and most farmers were either unable to plant this spring at all, or were unable to get a stand.

Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Edmiston, who were married about two weeks ago, moved during the week end to a house on the Case Ranch, where Edmiston is employed. Mrs. Edmiston, the former Earline Coulter, resigned from her position as a dentist's assistant in San Angelo.

Bringing in of gas measuring 24,700,000 cubic feet per day from an upper Strawn zone—continuation of heavy oil production from No. 1A Jess Koy well—preparations for moving of the rig to a new location for a second oil test—plans for disposing of gas and oil from 1A Koy—persistent rumors of growth for Schleicher County—statewide publicity for Schleicher's big oil news—these are some of the developments of the past week as Schleicher County oil takes the spotlight in Texas.

The third and upper Strawn zone was acidized this week, and swabbed out late Tuesday evening. A packer had been set at 5,494 feet, excluding the oil-bearing sections, and acidizing operations had been performed through perforations in 7-inch casing. During the day Wednesday a Railroad Commission gauge revealed the fact that the new oil well was not only a big producer of oil, but that it was putting out gas at the rate of 24,700,000 cubic feet per day. Visitors at the field Wednesday found the well's performance most interesting, as gas was blowing out over the countryside while testing proceeded.

Cooper Gas Co. will connect the gas with Lone Star Gas Company's pipeline which takes gas from the

Page field to San Angelo. Two 500-barrel storage tanks for the oil have been moved in, and the oil from the two lower zones which has flowed at the rate of about 50 barrels per hour when tested, will be run from there into a pipeline a few miles away.

Location for another test has been made by Cooper Gas Co. at a point 1320 feet west, depth to be 6,000 feet. It is generally agreed that if this second well also develops into a producer, Cooper Gas Company, and probably other companies with holdings in the county, will be interested to the extent of putting down other wells with the aim of heavy development for the field.

Gratifying to Schleicher County boosters is the state wide publicity given to the county's oil news. The San Angelo dailies have carried detailed stories, and such papers as the Ft. Worth Star Telegram and the conservative Dallas News have run news items under double column heads, featuring the story on their oil pages.

While the boom days following oil discovery seem to be a thing of the past—probably due to proration and the fact that there are few unemployed—it is generally thought that Eldorado will undergo steady growth as a result of development of the field.

Improvement Noted In Condition of Ollie Alexander, Jr.

Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Alexander came home from Corpus Christi Tuesday where they have been with their son, Ollie, Jr., for the past six weeks since he was stricken with polio at the Naval base there. Mrs. Alexander will stay here for a few days of much needed rest before she returns to be with her son. Mr. Alexander plans to accompany her back, but will probably return to his duties at the bank here.

The Alexanders report that their son, in many ways is much better, but in others he is not so well. He is entirely free from the disease itself, but partial paralysis remains, with the left leg entirely paralyzed, and now accompanied by swelling which the doctors have diagnosed as flebitis. This will probably take several weeks to cure, state physicians.

On Monday, he was wheeled in the iron lung about three blocks to

the X-Ray laboratory where pictures were made, and Tuesday, before the parents left, he had spent three hours out of the lung on the bed.

Arrangements had been made through the Red Cross for Admiral Chester Nimitz to visit with the young lad Tuesday, but it is not known as yet whether he was able to carry out these plans or not. The Admiral was there to review naval organizations stationed at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Center, and was honored with a parade and other courtesies.

Mrs. Alexander stated that Ollie had received more than 200 cards and letters to date from friends and relatives.

George Stanley Finley, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Finley, leaves Georgetown today with other reserve students, en route for New Orleans. He is not certain as yet what his future plans may be, but thinks that he may receive his discharge this summer.

Washington News Letter

Case Bill Vetoed

Hope for legislation this year of a permanent nature to protect workers and the public against the unbridled power of labor bosses went up in smoke last week when President Truman vetoed the Case bill.

That bill, which infuriated certain irate labor leaders to the boiling point, failed of passage over the President's veto. The House vote to override was 255 to 135, a few short of the required two-thirds. All Texas members but three—Combs of Beaumont, Lyle of Corpus Christi and Thomas of Houston—stuck by their guns and voted for the Case bill over the President's veto.

The President in his message contended that the Case bill was enacted in haste and should have further study. Last January, in a broadcast to the nation, Mr. Truman in referring to labor legislation to deal with labor-management problems said: "I had hoped that Congress would . . . at least propose a solution of its own."

The fact is that the Case measure was introduced last December and was considered by committees for months and then debated and amended at length in the House and Senate before finally being passed. It is hard to know how many months or years of study the President would require before deciding a bill has been sufficiently studied.

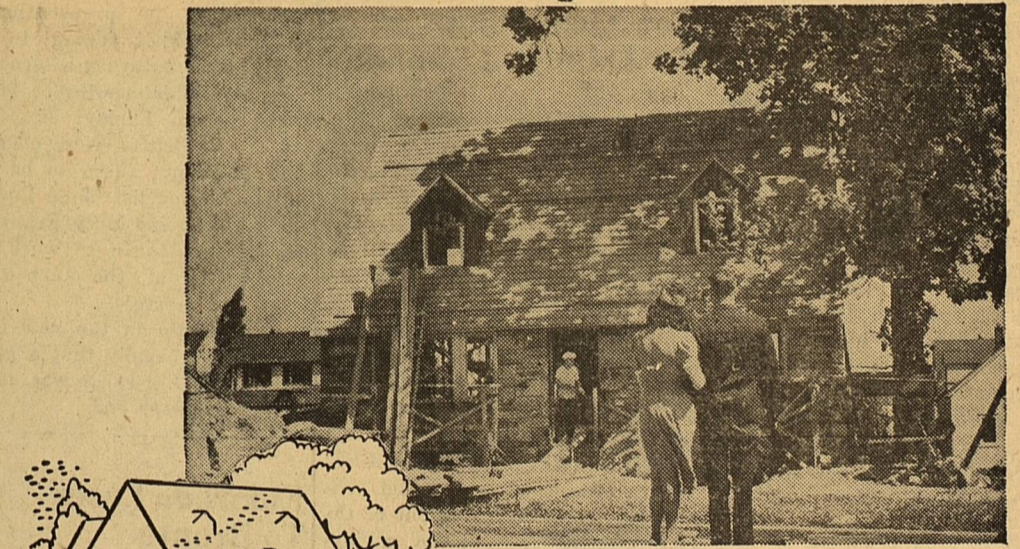

At the Ed Finigan ranch Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 4, with Ed Finigan as Presiding Officer.

At the Mayer No. 2 School House Building, in Schleicher County,

Texas, Election Precinct No. 5, with Joe Ruff, Jr., as Presiding Officer.

At the Alexander School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 6, with E. F. Ramsel as Presiding Officer.

At the Cliff School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 8, with J. F. Runge as Presiding Officer.

At the Reynolds School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 9, with E. W. Craig as Presiding Officer.

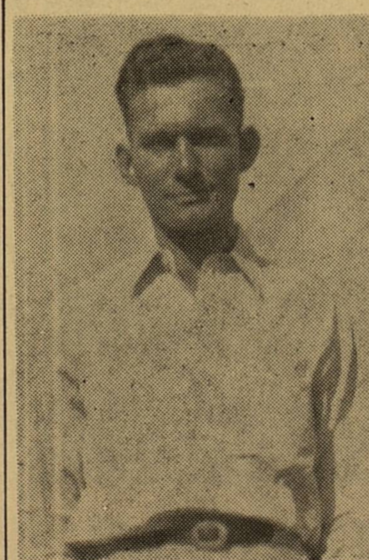
Logan Discharged
