3rd KOY WELL COMPLETED FOR GOOD PRODUCER

Testing of Cooper 3A Koy well continues this week after the well began flowing Friday at a rate indicating another good producer, but not as large as the Koy 1 and 2 in production.

Perforations were made in 7-inch casing, at 5610-45 feet, after casing had been set several days previously at 5665 feet. Testing of the well will continue this week, officials state.

Cooper Koy No. 3A is in the C sw se 38L GH&SA, ¼ mile south of No. 1A Koy, first major oil producer in the field. It is located N NW of the Page field which has five gassers and a small oil well in the south end.

No. 1A Koy was brought in in the latter part of June, and was granted dual completion for gas and oil by the Railroad Commission. No. 2A was brought in in August; its location is ¼ mile west of No. 1A Koy.

The rotary is being moved by Parker Drilling Co., to a location ¼ mile south, to Cooper No. 2D Bert Page, C SW SE 38L GH&SA. A spudding machine has already started this well and has set surface casing at 357 feet. The spudder—which is staying one location ahead of the rotary—is moving back to the Koy ranch where it will start spudding operations on the 5th well. This well is known as No. 4A Koy, C SE SE 38-L GH&SA and will be ¼ mile east of No. 1A Koy.

City, Highway Dept. Regulate PO Traffic

A cooperative City-State Highway Commission project, launched in the interest of safety, is this week being put into effect in the two-block stretch reaching from the Ogdan (Robinson) corner to the West Texas Utilities property.

Planned ultimately to eliminate traffic hazards in that locality before the new Eldorado-Menard road adds to existing hazards, the new set-up will call for one way traffic only, and will eliminate all center parking. West bound Menard traffic will keep to the right, on a newly paved stretch, which has been widened by addition of most of the little center park. A small strip of the sodded section, only wide enough to divide the traffic, will be retained, and a similar strip for the same purpose will be put in in the wide area between the hotel, Eldorado Hardware and Eldorado Motor Co., and the courthouse lawn.

This section of city street has long been regarded as unsafe, the area between the postoffice and courthouse fence having been the site of careless parking and driving and the corresponding block at the west providing a free-for-all speedway for motorists from Eldorado and elsewhere.

The cost of improving these two blocks will be shared by city and state, and the new set-up will be in working condition before the new Menard road is opened.

The city's paving program is proceeding ahead of schedule. Two blocks not included in the original plan are to be paved, to serve new residences which are being erected—the block including the new residence of L. A. Goss and two new houses which Willie Burleson is building, and the block in which the new Newlin-Ray houses are located.

The Lions Club of Eldorado is financing caliche of the block in which Dr. Pennington's residence and clinic building are located, cost of the project to be about \$300, to be paid by private subscription.

ASSOCIATIONAL MEETING TO BE HELD HERE

WINNING STREAK OF 15 YEARS IS BROKEN FRIDAY

After 15 years of wins the Eldorado Eagles were finally defeated by the Sonora Broncs before a huge crowd of spectators at the Eldorado field last Friday night.

The Eagles were swept from their feet by a hustling hard-blocking Sonora line. The so-called "Big Five," pride of the Eagle team were blocked out of the play numbers of times during the game by the not so large, but hustling, Sonora forward wall.

Sonora's "four horsemen"—Boughten, Bond, Street and Chalk—ran wild during the big part of the first three periods of the game. Sonora ran through the center of the line, went around end, through tackle and threw a pass for the four touchdowns. Two tries at extra points were successful making the final score 26-0. Fighting hard, the Eagles managed to hold the Broncs scoreless in the fourth period.

Sonora received Eldorado's kick and with a series of snappy plays, marched to the Eldorado 33 yard line. Then Street, speedy Broncs quarterback, broke away from several would-be tacklers and sped to pay dirt. Try at conversion failed. Sonora kicked to Eldorado, who after 3 attempts to run, were forced to punt out. Sonora received punt and then rallied, making 3 first downs in a row and placing the ball on the 1 yard line. Eldorado got a break and recovered a fumble. Eldorado punted out and Sonora ran the punt back about 20 yards. Sonora made touchdown No. 2 from 6 yard line immediately after this. Eldorado received the kick and made first down after 2 attempts. Then they surprised the Broncs by a quick-kick. Sonora was forced to punt for the first time after failing to gain needed ground. Eldorado passed to make a first. Then Sonora set up touchdown No. 3 by intercepting an Eagle pass. Chalk then dropped back and heaved a pass to Boughten, who after nearly dropping it, went over for the touchdown. Try at extra point was good. The half ended with the score 19-0.

The Eagles came back on the field determined to hold their opponents. They did until Sonora's halfback, Frankie Bond, got away for 50 yards and a touchdown. Try at extra point was good.

The Eagles held the Broncs down the remaining part of the game, with Mund exhibiting some running and Whitley a block now and then. Fumbled balls were recovered by Speck and Whitley with Gerald Harris intercepting a pass.

REYNOLDS ROAD IMPROVEMENTS BEING MADE

As a first step in providing all-weather roads in Schleicher County for the school busses, and for general use of the public, the Commissioners are giving attention to the Reynolds road, and are seeking new machinery to carry out planned improvements there and elsewhere in the county.

An almost impassable stretch of the Reynolds bus route, a 1½ mile strip from Walter Powell's to Moore's gin, has been worked recently and caliche surface is being applied. The new equipment, dump trucks and other machinery required for the job, will be used on an additional 8-mile stretch in that locality, it being the aim of the county officials to add caliche after the road bed has been worked, and thus provide an all-weather road.

This strip of the Reynolds road is the first in what is expected will be a series of road projects covering much of the entire county.

As it will probably require several months to map out definite school bus runs on a permanent basis, it is not possible at this time to know what roads must receive attention, but steady progress on the project will undoubtedly be made during the year.

Parker Drilling Co., had reached a depth of 500 feet yesterday in the new Cooper 2D Page well.

Tisdale Wildcat Test Starting This Week

Persistent rumors current here for several weeks to the effect that there would be a test on the Virge Tisdale ranch several miles from the Koy wells were confirmed Tuesday when Holland, Grossenbacher, and others announced that No. 1 Tisdale would spud in this week, with Rhodes Drilling Co., of Abilene doing the drilling.

The wildcat, 6000-foot test is L. W. Elliott of Sonora, trustee, No. 1 Virgil G. Tisdale, 660 feet S and 660 ft. E of N&W lines, Sec. 16, block A, HE&WT RR Co. Survey, located 3½ miles W NW of Cooper Gas Co's 2A Koy, farthest west of the three Koy producers. The test is located 660 feet south of the Eldorado McKavett road, and 3 miles almost directly east of Eldorado, just over the line from the John Williams property.

The spudder arrived this week at location and Wednesday morning started on the water well. The spudder will go to 350 feet and set surface casing, and the rotary, part of which came in Wednesday afternoon, will then take over. It is expected to drill to 6,000

feet, unless pay is reached higher than that point, or water is struck in the Ellenburger. If production is struck in the Strawn the well will be finaled there and another test drilled to Ellenburger.

The drilling block consists of about 5 sections of land—4 from Virge Tisdale's ranch, 1 from John Williams minus 80 acres and 160 acres from Joe Edens. Holland and Grossenbacher have both been interested in Schleicher Co. oil wells for some time, Holland for 22 years and Grossenbacher for 14 years. The latter had been associated with the late J. M. Cooper in drilling the Page discovery gas well in 1935.

Adjoining this block on the east, leases are held by Cooper Gas Co., Shell, Texas Co. and Humble; to the south by Magnolia, Geo. T. Wilson of San Angelo, Sinclair, Prairie, Superior and Standolind; on the west by Atlantic, Standolind and Humble, and on the north by Standolind, Honolulu and Shell and Humble and Phillips farther north.

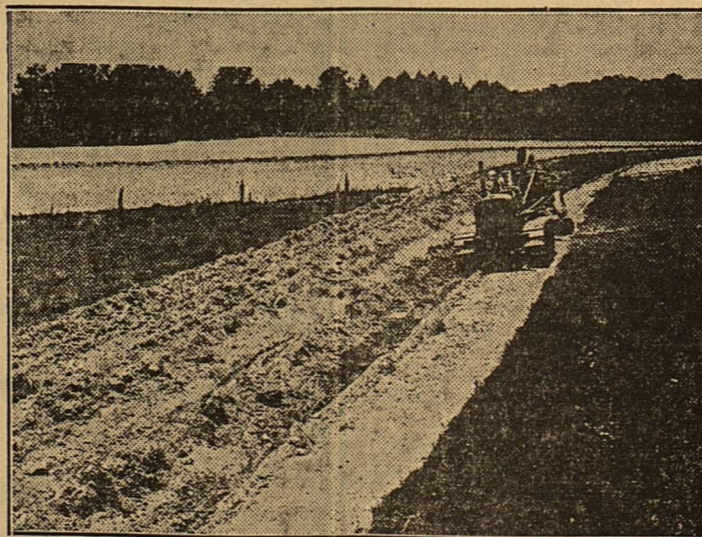

TERRACING IMPROVES FARMS



Cropland terraces save water and conserve soil, Chairman Joe B. Edens of the Schleicher County Agricultural Conservation Association committee says. In the end, this means more and better food and improved health for all, he added.

Farmers cooperating with the Agricultural Conservation Program can receive assistance in terracing their farms, he continued. Experiments prove that terraced land yields more and retards water erosion. Properly constructed terraces slow water runoff and hold it on the land where it can be used by growing crops during the dry period of the year.

Recognizing the extensive need for terraces and the expense of their construction, the Federal Agricultural Conservation Program helps farmers to pay part of the

costs. The Government's share of the cost is \$79.20 per mile for the large standard ridge type terraces.

To make terraced fields completely successful, the USDA also cooperates with farmers in establishing and maintaining other good conservation measures. These include sound crop rotations, strip-cropping, cover crops, and contour tillage.

Southern States have led in the use of this practice and in 1944 over 1,500,000 acres of the 1,719,000 acres terraced under the program were in the South.

The committee recommends this practice as a means to prevent soil washing. Farmers may still terrace under the 1946 program and if they wish to do so, should contact the county office at Eldorado immediately.

FUNDAMENTAL BAPTIST PASTOR LEAVES NOV. 10

Rev. D. I. Miller, pastor of the Fundamental Baptist Church since March, 1945, has tendered his resignation, effective Nov. 10, and he and his family will move to Ft. Worth where he will complete the 1½ year's work which he lacks at Bible Baptist Seminary. Next week he and his family expect to go to Ft. Worth to make arrangements to live in that city.

The congregation are looking for another pastor and hope to have another on the job as soon as Rev. Miller leaves.

At Ft. Worth Rev. Miller will enroll for the second quarter, taking full time work, and will probably serve a church in that locality. His wife will take music also at the Seminary. The couple have 3 children. During his pastorate here the congregation has shown decided gain in membership and attendance. Average Sunday morning attendance has been 50 and 55 and during the summer months it has been between 75 and 80.

During Rev. Miller's period of service in Eldorado, the church building has also undergone extensive improvements, including painting and addition of nursery, rest rooms and side walks; at present a 150-foot paving project at the front of the property is under way at an estimated cost of about \$700, much of which has been raised.

Harper gave a report on the Pep Squad sweaters and thanked those who helped to get the uniforms ready. Miss Annie Herbert gave a report on the desire of possessing an opaque projector for use in the school. The room count was taken with winners to be announced later, and Mrs. Edwin Jackson, president, announced the list of room mothers selected. Mrs. Jackson passed slips of paper for a vote on a county flower as requested by Cleone Dabney, county beautification chairman. Mrs. Kenneth Cheek gave a report on the "Texas Parent Teacher," official magazine, and took subscriptions to it. The president announced a district PTA meeting to be held in Sonora at 10 a. m. Thursday, Oct. 17 (today).

The next regular meeting will be on November 19 at 2:30 p. m.

BIDS BEING RECEIVED ON MENARD ROAD

Bids are being received on a 14½ mile stretch of ranch-to-market road leading east from Eldorado, next Wednesday by the State Highway Dept. A similar stretch leading to the county line will be let at a later date, and 14½ mile stretch in Menard County has been awarded on a bid of \$38,000 but work order has not been issued, as the two counties concerned prepare to provide a direct and all-weather improved highway from Menard to Eldorado. The road will lead past Ft. McKavett, and will connect with a stretch of about 5 miles which is already nearly completed west of Menard.

Bids will be opened next Wednesday, and contract may be let immediately if the low figure is satisfactory.

Office Established

Temporary quarters for the State Highway Department office have been established in the office of the Home Demonstration Agent in the Schleicher County courthouse, and will be maintained here until the bids are opened on October 23.

Maintained as a sub-office, with Dept. official Stroud in general charge, the office will provide bidders with personnel who can show them the stretch to be paved.

The first of what will probably be a number of bids on the road has been received. A construction road has been built to the county line to enable bidders to get over the route, most of which does not follow the old route, and to take fencing materials to location.

Veterans Assisted In Purchase of Surplus Government Property

Assistance to veterans of Schleicher County in obtaining surplus government property from War Assets Administration will be given next Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 22 and 23 at the veterans service center, basement of the Tom Green courthouse in San Angelo.

Veterans desiring certification to exercise their priority buying rights should present a copy of an honorable discharge when making application. Complete data on sales for veterans late in October can be obtained from catalog listing Wellborne will have for vets to inspect.

Veterans of this county can be certified and participate in a huge site sale which opens at Pantex Ogdan Plant October 28. Quantities of textiles, general hardware, industrial belting, sanding materials, fire fighting equipment and other materials are available. Veterans only will be waited on at the sale from October 28 through November 1st.
