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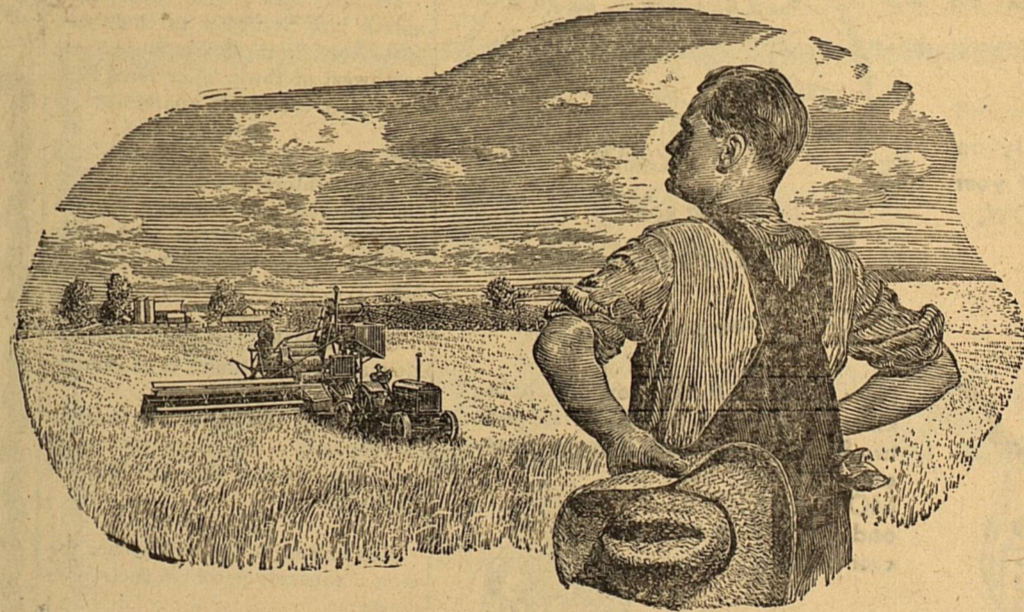

Retired Ranch Woman Looks Back Upon Busy Career

Mrs. R. A. King, rancher for 30 years, club woman and church worker in the 50 years she has spent in or near Brady, San Angelo and Eldorado, has retired, after leasing and selling her stock to her son, John Irvin King.

From her early girlhood she has always lived an active and interesting life. She was reared on ranches of the Southwest, mainly in McCulloch County, near Brady.

Her schooling was thorough for the time, but obtained the hard way — the home ranch being so isolated that she could never attend school from home, but always boarded in town; in Burnett, where she finished high school, and Lampasas, where she attended the old Centenary College.

In McCulloch County, in 1898 her marriage to R. A. King took place, the couple continuing to live in that locality a number of years.

Mr. and Mrs. King moved to Sutton County in the fall of 1915, after purchasing 7,680 acres of land from Judge Taylor of San Antonio.

The first thing they did was to go to San Angelo and buy three saddles from Bob Andrews — one each for Mr. and Mrs. King and their young son. They bought cows from S. E. McKing and then stocked the place with lambs and goats.

Mrs. King tells of the trouble which followed, "The wolves were very bad, and we bought hounds to try to run them off. Mr. King's health was poor, so I would get up early in the morning, take the dogs, leave the ranch house at 3:00 a. m., and ride fast after the dogs trailing the wolves.

"The nearest I ever came to getting one was when I came up on a nice fat sheep, kicking its throat out. The dogs went on over the fence. I finished cutting the sheep's throat, tied him behind the saddle, and took him in.

"Our dogs were gone three days. They came in with their feet so swollen they could hardly walk. We never knew whether they got their quarry or not."

After a year the Kings sold their ranch to Lowery and Bryson, of Sonora, and moved back to Brady, a few months later in 1916, purchasing the Schleicher County ranch which the family now owns. Widowed ten years ago, Mrs. King has continued to operate the ranch, assisted by her son, John Irvin, who now makes his home there.

Mrs. King has four children, two sons and two daughters: Mrs. J. B. Granville of Brady; Robert King,

San Angelo; John Irvin King, Schleicher and Sutton Counties, and Mrs. Georgia Brittain, Eldorado; seven grandsons, the youngest of whom, Bunch King Brittain, is in boot camp in San Diego; and three great granddaughters.

She has always been interested in church and civic work. Every year she attends sessions of the Daughters of Trail Drivers at San Antonio, her membership being based on her record as the daughter of John I. Jones, early trail driver, whose cattle were branded with the Flying Y.

Wherever she lived she has belonged to Federated Women's Clubs and was a charter member of federated clubs here and at Brady. She and her husband were both members of the West Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, and she was a charter member of the organization's Auxiliary.

A devout Presbyterian, she was a charter member of Presbyterian churches at Brady, San Angelo and Eldorado, and was Auxiliary president 15 years in Brady, and three years in San Angelo and was the first president of the Auxiliary here.

Mrs. King, a busy and active resident of Eldorado, has made her home in Glendale, one of the neatest and coolest spots in the city. She is especially proud of her back yard, which she has improved for her own comfort and the entertainment of her friends.

The yard centers around the barbecue pit and the roomy chuck box. The redwood furniture is substantial and attractive. A hedge provides privacy, and there is a thick stand of carpet grass. Elm and hackberry came from the ranch,

and she has also planted apricots, peaches and pecans, and grows canas, zinnias, dahlias, clematis, and other flowers and greenery. She entertains here often, and her relatives and friends always enjoy the informality of her outdoor suppers.

Mrs. King has always liked to ride, to spend most of her time out of doors, and to associate with peo-

ple. Now in her 70th year, she is, as she puts it, "seventy years young."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

ing words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

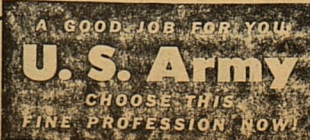

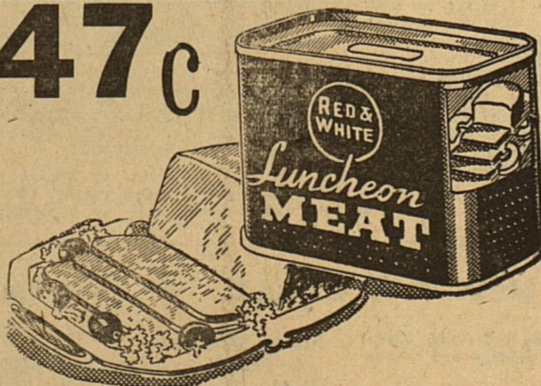
