MRS. J. L. RATLIFF DIES SATURDAY AFTER OPERATION

Funeral services for Mrs. Nora A. Ratliff, 65, were conducted from the First Baptist Church at 4:00 p. m. Sunday with the Rev. J. M. Hays officiating, assisted by the Rev. J. E. Eldredge of the Sonora Baptist Church, and the Rev. F. B. Faust, Methodist pastor. Special songs by the choir were included in the services, and a favorite poem of Mrs. Ratliff's, Edgar A. Guests' "It Takes a Heap O' Living in a House to Make it Home," was read by Mrs. J. M. Hays.

Burial was in the Eldorado Cemassisting Emmett Askins of the Ratliff Funeral Home, in conducting the funeral.

Mrs. Ratliff died at about 4:30 Saturday afternoon in a San Angewhich she had undergone Wednesday morning. She had been in ill health for a number of months.

She was a charter member of the Baptist Church there whose 50th anniversary was observed the day of Mrs. Ratliff's burial. Only four other charter members survive at and E. H. In view of the fact that the road bed must be watered in preparation for topping, a rain would not greatly delay the work, it is stated.

About half of the residences fronting on the paving are availing themselves of the opportunity of having the paving brought up to their property, and paying the cost themselves. In streets with 100-foot clearance these are 100 x 26 feet, and sometimes narrower where streets are narrow.

Curbs can and probably will be added later, when local labor can be utilized, it is thought.

The entire project will take three or four months, it is estimated. A delay will be occasioned by failure to receive materials for the water system extensions, in Taylor Construction Company's water line and sewer extension project. Other work will probably be completed before

Slowest of the work has been the digging of deep trenches for sewers serving Glendale, Eldorado's new residential area. Continual blasting has been necessary to cut through the solid rock with which that part of town is underlaid.

INTERESTED IN AMENDMENT

A number of Schleicher County veterans are interested in the proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 62 — a copy of which appears on page six of this issue of the Suc-

According to this amendment the state proposes to set up a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board with a capital of \$25,000,000. With this money the board will enter upon a program of buying suitable farm land throughout the state, for resale to veterans of World War II.

This and other constitutional amendments will be submitted to the voters of Texas in an election in November.

What veterans here are particularly interested in is the fact that here are about 90 sections of good farm land belonging to the University of Texas, in the western part of Schleicher County now being used only for grazing. It this block of land were divided into halfsection farms it would provide houses for about 175 new families.

So - Schleicher County veterans, 'politicking" in the interest of their home boys seeking a foothold, are telling their friends to remember Amendment No. 62 at the November Election. If the amendment carries, a new board will be set up and this board will be urged to buy this Schleicher land and open it for resale to veterans.



Her schooling was thorough for the time, but obtained the hard way - the home ranch being so isolated that she could never attend school from home, but always boarded in town; in Burnett, where she finished high school, and Lampasas, wheer she attended the old Centennary College.

In McCulloch County, in 1898 her marriage to R. A. King took place, the couple continuing to live in that locality a number of years.

Mr. and Mrs. King moved to Sutton County in the fall of 1915, after purchasing 7,680 acres of land from Judge Taylor of San Antonio.

The first thing they did was to go to San Angelo and buy three saddles from Bob Andrews - one each for Mr. and Mrs. King and their young son. They bought cows from S. E. McKing and then stocked the place with lambs and goats.


Mrs. King tells of the trouble which followed, "The wolves were very bad, and we bought hounds to try to run them off. Mr. King's health was poor, so I would get up early in the morning, take the dogs, leave the ranch house at 3:00 a.m., and ride fast after the dogs trailing the wolves.

"The nearest I ever came to getting one was when I came up on a nice fat sheep, kicking, its throat cut. The dogs went on over the fence. I finished cutting the sheep's throat, tied him behind the saddle, and took him in.

After a year the Kings sold their ranch to Lowery and Bryson, of Sonora, and moved back to Brady, a few months later in 1916, purchasing the Schleicher County ranch which the family now owns. Widowed ten years ago, Mrs. King has continued to operate the ranch, assisted by her son, John Irvin, who now makes his home there.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas Edda Lou Meador and Doris Cal- be amended by adding thereto a cote will arrive home Friday from new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby

McClary, formerly of the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corpora-

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World publisher. War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescrib-

ed by law. "All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified elect- San Angelo: 7271-1 ors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the follow-

"FOR the Amendment of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amenoment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation there-

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and electpenses of such publication and elec-
