## VAN EMAN CHILD KILLED BY HORSE AT MARFA RANCH

Louis Turner Van Eman, 2, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Van Eman of Marfa, and a grandson of the Milton Baughs of Eldorado, was fatally injured when trampled underfoot by a horse at the Van Eman and Baugh ranch 32 miles south of Marfa Monday.

Funeral services for the child were held at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning at San Angelo with the Rev. B. O. Wood, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiating. Burial was in Fairmount Cemetery.

Always a bystander when the horses were fed in the evening, the tot suddenly stepped too near one of the animals while men were putting out the feed. The hoof crushed the child's chest and he lived only a few minutes.

The child was carried to Marfa by Aubrey Baugh and the parents and then to San Angelo in a Johnson's coach.

Mrs. Van Eman is the former Betty Baugh. Grandparents include Mr. and Mrs. Milton Baugh of here and C. H. Van Eman of Houston. A number from Schleicher Co., attended the funeral at San Angelo. Both of the young parents formerly lived in this county.

## Eldorado Merchants Over-Subscribe For Baseball Uniforms

Coach Al Vance, at the request of Baseball Mgr. Johnny Luedecke, recently ordered 20 new baseball uniforms for the Eldorado town team and High School team's use.

At first 18 suits were thought to be all that were necessary but on getting ready to send in the order, two other local merchants made it imperative that they should be counted on in the deal too. The suits ordered were bought with the understanding that school and town teams both use them in their spring and summer periods. A strict account is to be kept of each suit issued and who to. The school will store the suits in the winter.

According to Vance, baseball clothing is extremely hard to get and various air mail letters and telephone calls had to be made before contact could be made. The suits have been ordered from a Brooklyn, N. Y., house and the color specified was Yale grey with black caps, black lettering on front and back, and black hose. ## JESS KOY COLT DEL RIO WINNER, OTHERS PLACE

Victorious as his name, V Day, 1945 stud colt owned by Jess Koy, Schleicher County ranchman, emerged as champion of his class at the Del Rio Horse Show which ended last Sunday following three days of matched horse races and judging of horses.

Texas Boy, owned by O. H. Luedecke and Ranger Boy, owned by James Burrus also held placings in the stud class.

This is the second show and second victory for V Day, who won honors at the Odessa Horse Show in March. His owner also plans to enter him as well as his sire in the Fourth Annual San Angelo Colt Show which opens Saturday. Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, Fort Sam Houston, hero of Bataan and Corregidor and longtime prisoner of the Japanese, now commanding the Fourth Army and the Eighth Service Command, is to be judge of the thoroughbred and halfbreed classes.

## BURK IS ELECTED NEW PRESIDENT SANITARY ASS'N

L. B. Burk, head of the Eldorado City Water Works, was elected president of the Fort Concho Sanitary Association at their re-organization meeting in the City Hall at San Angelo Wednesday evening, May 15. The group, made up of representatives from several West Texas counties, meets each month for the purpose of discussing water and sanitation problems.

Other officers named were C. O. Smith, Eden, first vice president; L. E. Ray, San Angelo, 2nd vice president; Ralph Mitchell, San Angelo, sec-treas.; and Clifford Guess of San Angelo, group leader.

W. E. Cuzisk, itinerant instructor with the State Board for Vocational Education and former water works operator in San Angelo, explained to the group a new Texas law requiring licensing of water plant operators. J. P. Brewer, city engineer of San Angelo, discussed sewer construction problems.

The group is also studying and working on the controlling of polio through the water systems.

## SOFGE TRIAL NOW GOING ON AT BALLINGER

The trial of Carl Sofge was called in District Court at Ballinger Monday and a jury of 12 men was completed Tuesday afternoon. The State began presenting its witnesses Tuesday night, continued on through Wednesday, and rested its case last night.

The defense will present its case today and tomorrow and it is thought that the case may go to the jury by the end of this week.

District Attorney Ralph Logan and special prosecutor Glenn R. Lewis are in charge of the prosecution, and defense attorneys are Will Morris, San Antonio; B. W. Smith, San Angelo, Paul Petty, Ballinger, R. E. Gray, San Saba, and M. E. Blackburn, Junction.

Large numbers of Eldorado citizens, including most of the courthouse crew, witnesses, and many others, have been driving to Ballinger each day to attend the trial.

Among those appearing as witnesses for the prosecution Tuesday and Wednesday were: R. C. Spurgers, Reuben Koerner, Dr. H. W. Wiedenmann and Cramer Sofge, the first three on conversations and events preceding and following the shooting, and the last on the history of the case, origin of hard feelings existing in the family, and his actual witnessing of the killing. McClary of Mertzton, who helped carry Clem into the Eldo. Hotel; and Co. Judge C. L. Meador, Jack Ratliff, Mrs. Bernice Sofge and Mrs. Sallie Sofge.

**County Agent Column**

**The Farmer and the Dollar**

You hear a lot about how well off the farmer is today, or rather that he has MORE money than is his habit. We aren't talking about shortages of this and that, such as feed, tools and labor. Just how much money he has is a question for discussion, and one seldom answered. Let us look at the farmer's pocketbook at its worst, 1932, and again in 1944.

One way to look at it, the farmer got 21% of his share of the national income in 1932, and 46% in 1944.

**Causes of Increase**

The increased share in national income by the farmer since 1932 is brought about by many things. One cause is less people on the farm—31 million in 1932; 25½ million in 1944—the tendency being for the lower income person to go into other work, especially during the war years. Other causes for increased farm income are better price relations, improved methods of production, wise use of credit, and more efficiency in marketing and distribution.

More farmers every year are entering into associations for the purpose of taking their produce one step nearer to the consumer. Often they gain in many ways—obtain a return by conducting a part of the marketing process, insure an outlet for their production, and obtain a larger share of the consumer's dollar in return for their product.

**Put To Good Use**

The increased farm income since 1932 has not been "wasted on the desert air." A nice chunk goes into taxes—income taxes and otherwise. In five years the farmer has increased his livestock 73%, or nearly 4 billion dollars more than in 1940. He has 52% more, or 1¼ period. The 4 billion dollars he invested in War Bonds is something to remember.

In the period 1940-45, the farm mortgage debt was reduced 20%. As of January 1, 1945, real estate mortgages amounted to a little over 5 billion dollars.

**Immediate Problems to Face**

The price of land is getting out of hand. Land is 60% higher than in 1939, having increased about 1% per month. In some places it is much higher. Unchecked, this could lead to another burst bubble as in 1920.

Most farms are operated on a "family" basis. Marketing and distribution of commodities are becoming increasingly complicated, making it more and more difficult and expensive for a small producer. Too many handlers in our marketing system make for expense and inefficiency, leading to wider margins and higher costs. Do not forget that the farmer, too, is a consumer. If he fails to receive full value for his produce because of excess handling costs, for the same reason he pays too much for the things he buys.

Cooperative effort is the small farmers way of living and competing in our free enterprise economy. Properly managed and financed, it is the way for the nation to achieve Democracy. The alternatives are Corporate and Collective farming.

**NEWS IN THE**

**World of Religion**

By W. W. Reid

Concerned over the plans of Congress which would reduce the funds appropriated for the American Indians, the Home Missions Council of North America has appealed to senators and representatives to give more rather than less funds for this needy segment of American life. The Indians today stand in "great need for more schools and equipment, more teachers and better roads and means of transportation, if their educational needs are to be met," says the Council of which Dr. Mark A. Dawber and Miss Edith E. Lowry are the secretaries.

The plight of the Protestant churches in Hungary is desperate today, because they had to face Nazism before the war, and because one-third of their buildings were destroyed or seriously damaged during the fighting of 1944, according to Dr. Bela Vasady, president of the Theology Department of Debrecen's 400-year-old Reformed College, and now visiting in America. Now inflation is an added problem, he says. Protestants comprise only 20% of Hungary's population; this number includes 2,000,000 members of the Reformed Church, 500,000 Lutherans, and lesser number of Baptists and Methodists.

"It is my conviction that the question of good relations between

Russia and the United States and Great Britain center in the control of Germany," said Dr. Fred Field Goodsell, mission leader of the Congregational Christian Churches, Boston, Mass., on his return from a visit to central Europe. Germany's greatest problems, he found are those of "displaced persons," refugees, and hunger. "If we cannot solve the problems of international cooperation there," he adds, "we cannot solve them anywhere else. There is no doubt that the Germans fear Russia as people fear a hurricane. American authorities in Germany have both the ability and the desire to meet Russia in an absolutely fair way and to work out the vast problems involved in the control and re-education of Germany without resort to violence."

Dr. Edward H. Hume, born in India of American missionary parents, M. D. from Johns Hopkins, and for more than twenty five years associated with Yale-in-China, in Changsha, China, where founded the Medical School and later became president of the Colleges, is the author of "Doctors East, Doctors West: an American Physician's Life in China." The author is the winner, with this book, of the \$3,500 award offered by the W. W. Norton Publishing House

The United Church Service Center, at New Windsor, Maryland—operated by the Church of the Brethren Service Committee but serving all Protestant denominations—in one recent week shipped 274,352 pounds of food and clothing, valued at \$183,994, to war stricken countries in Europe, there to be administered by church agencies. The shipments, which continue each week, included 400 bales of clothing, 750 bags of shoes, and 1,104 cartons of food for Poland; 1200 bales of clothing for Hungary; and 400 bales of clothing for Greece. There are four other centers from which American Protestantism is unitedly shipped for Europe and Asia.

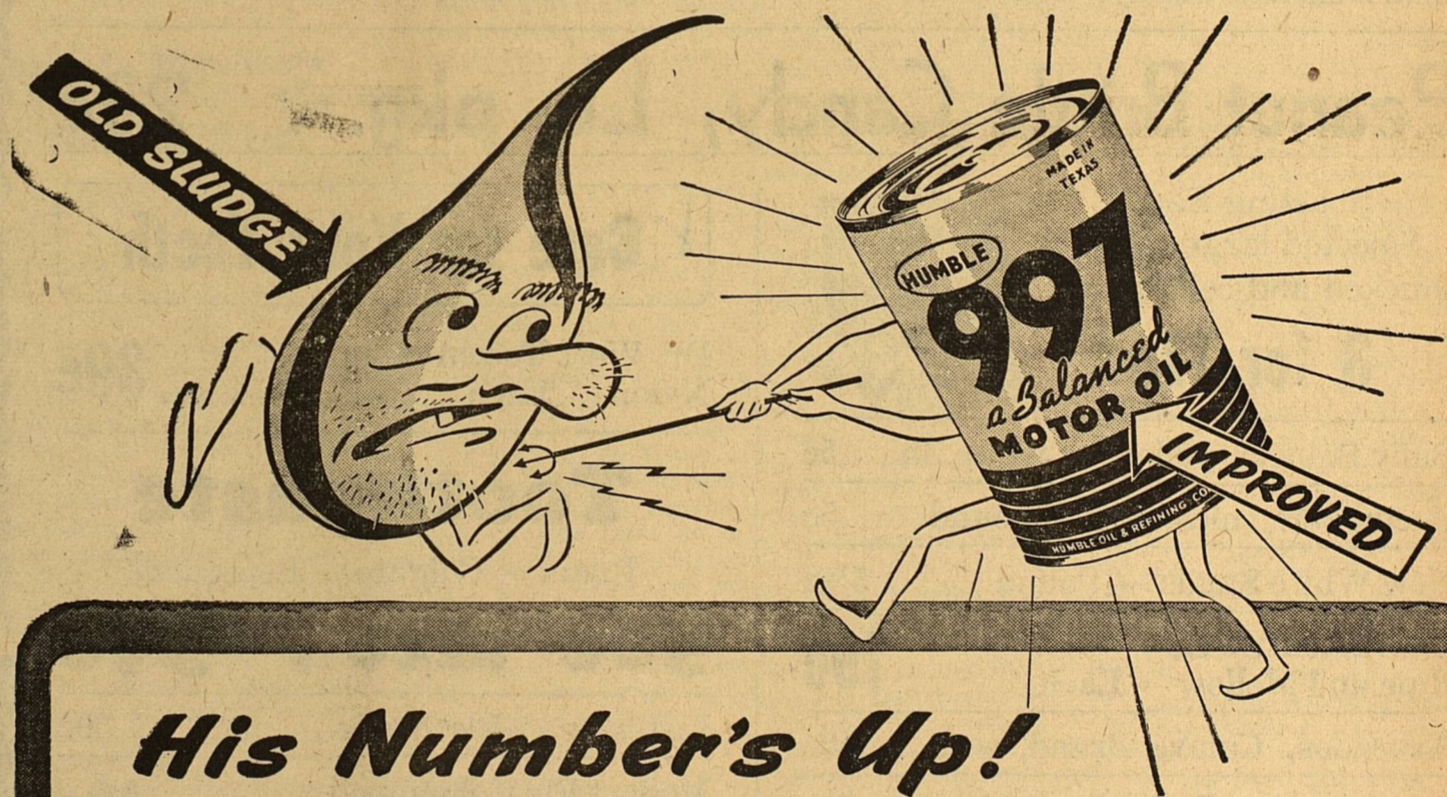
"The Negro church is an important factor in the community as well as one of the largest organizations among Negroes," says the Rev. J. Oscar Lee, of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America. "In the light of the fact that the Negro community is witnessing a rise in the educational level of its people, the educational equipment of the minister becomes an increasingly important factor if he is to continue in his place of leadership. Numerous studies have indicated that the educational level of the Negro ministry is low, thus the problem that confronts those interested in the training of the Negro minister is not only the preparation of those who intend to enter the ministry but the improvement of the professional equipment of those already in the profession."

The National Interfaith Committee of Russian Relief is composed of fifty-six prominent leaders of seventeen religious bodies in the United States, all committed to assisting Russia with relief supplies furnished by the churches. Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, pastor of Christ Methodist Church, New York City, is chairman; and the vice chairmen are Bishop Charles K. Gilbert of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, and Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Zionist Organization of America.

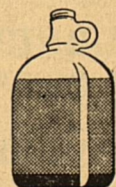

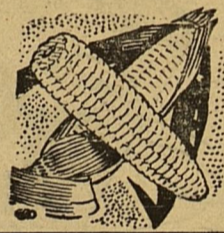

### D.D.T. SPRAY USED IN CITY POLIO PREVENTION

Joint action on prevention of polio in Eldorado has been taken by Schleicher County and the city, in joint purchase of 400 pounds of DDT and spraying it in alleys and other sources of possible infection, and the dump grounds and disposal plant near Little Mexico. The spraying was done from the Topliffe butane truck, which is equipped to handle work of this type, and which E. H. Topliffe donated to the city and county for this project.

What can we do to prevent infantile paralysis?  
The answer is: Practically nothing!

Very little is known about the disease. We know the cause—a virus—but not the cure. We know that it is communicable, that many persons may harbour the virus without presenting any clinical symptoms of the disease.

Certain precautions, however, are recommended by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

If polio strikes, the Foundation urges, continue with normal activities. Schools, theatres and other places of congregation can remain open at the discretion of the health authorities, but unnecessary mingling with crowds should be avoided. Extreme fatigue, sudden and prolonged chilling make the indi-

vidual an easier victim. Swimming in polluted waters and removal of tonsils during epidemics should be avoided. Flies and other insects should be kept away from food. Sanitation is a "must."

The first symptom of poliomyelitis may be some minor discomfort: headache, unexplained fever, a cold, even an upset stomach. If any of these appear, a physician should be called immediately. Expert medical care may prevent crippling deformities.

Above all, the Foundation adds, don't worry about expense. Foundation chapters are pledged to see that no victim of infantile paralysis goes without care and treatment for lack of funds, regardless of age, race, creed or color.

When a case appears, be sure that the nearest Foundation chapter is notified.

Rules for the public to follow are listed herewith:

Don't get overtired. Extreme fatigue makes you an easier victim.

Avoid chills. Don't stay too long in cold water.

Keep clean. Wash hands before eating. Keep flies and other insects away from food.

Help keep your community clean. Waste and exposed garbage may be sources of infection.

Don't swim in polluted waters.

Avoid removal of tonsils or adenoids prior to and during polio epidemic season.
