We aren't talking about shortages of this and that, such as feed, tools and labor. Just how much money he has is a question for discussion, and one seldom answered. Let us look at the farmer's pocketbook at its worst, 1932, and again in 1944.

One way to look at it, the farmer rot 21% of his share of the national income in 1932, and 46% in 1944. **Causes of Increase**

The increased share in national ncome by the farmer since 1932 is brought about by many things. One cause is less people on the farm -31 million in 1932; 25½ million in 1944-the tendency being for the lower income person to go into other work, especially during the war years. Other causes for increased farm income are better

price relations, improved methods of production, wise use of credit, and more efficiency in marketing and distribution. More farmers every year are en-

tering into associations for the purpose of taking their produce one step nearer to the consumer. Often they gain in many ways-obtain a return by conducting a part of the marketing process, insure an outlet for their production, and obtain a larger share of the consumer's dollar in return for their product
