Rodeo to be Included in Election Day Fun

With the Eldorado Roping Club announcing an election day rodeo for Saturday, July 27, and the Lions Club featuring election returns and a carnival that night, Schleicher County citizens are promised a full day's program of entertainment on the day when they exercise their voting privileges in the first Democratic primary.

The Roping Club promises two full hours of entertainment starting at 2:00 p. m., and including such ever-popular features as calf and steer roping, and steer and bronc riding. You are urged to go to the polls early and gleefully scratch off the names of about a dozen would-be governors—and then spend the balance of the day in Eldorado having a good time. The Lions will have a rousing bingo game at night while the early returns are coming in and being posted.

D. D. T. Hints Given By County Agent

Highlights of the cotton insect condition finds a continued high infestation of flea hoppers in the coastal section and a widespread high population of boll weevils in central, northern, and eastern Texas.

Recommendations for control of today's outstanding pests are: (1) 5% DDT-sulphur for a "knockout" kill of heavy infestation of flea hoppers; (2) calcium arsenate dust for boll weevils; and (3) for combination weevil and flea hopper infestations a mixture of 5 pounds of calcium arsenate and 5 to 10 pounds of sulphur.

County Agents have been cautioned to give publicity to the fact that DDT and calcium arsenate is being mixed and offered commercially for control of cotton insects. Cotton growers are warned that DDT does not retain its effectiveness when mixed with lime or other alkaline material such as calcium arsenate.

No. 2 Koy Well Below 3200 Feet

The No. 2 Koy well, about seven miles east of Eldorado, was reported yesterday to have reached a depth of 3200 and drilling was continuing steadily. The well is said to be logging exactly with Koy No. 1 which is a quarter mile farther east.

ELDORADO VETERAN BUYS SURPLUS ARMY VEHICLE

Among the successful purchasers at the sale of used motor vehicles conducted by the War Assets Administration at Camp Bowie, at Brownwood last week, was William E. DeLong, Eldorado. DeLong was among the 432 holders of oldest dated certificates invited to the sale and purchased a 1941 Ford Tudor Sedan for \$670.00.

Since the large list of invited veterans failed to appear to claim more than one-quarter of the passenger cars, jeeps, motorcycles, trailers and pickup trucks offered, WAA officials indicated that quite probably another sale would be held at Camp Bowie in the near future and a different disposal method used. All vehicles are on the "set aside" list and can be sold only to veterans of World War II.

Unsold vehicles remaining on the list included 11 passenger cars and two mobile repair shops fully equipped for which none of the invited veterans who hold certifications appeared.

Carriker Resigns Local Pastorate

The Rev. J. A. Carriker, pastor of the local Presbyterian Church for the past two years, has resigned his pastorate and will leave July 29 for North Carolina where he will begin his new work in Charlotte under the Home Mission Committee. His farewell sermon will be preached at the local church Sunday, July 28.

Rev. Carriker's resignation was presented to the congregation last Sunday morning following church services. In the resignation it was asked that the membership concur in a request to the Mid-Texas Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relationship. After voting to do so, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Jackson were appointed to represent the church at the meeting of the Presbytery at the First Presbyterian Church in San Angelo Monday afternoon. The request was granted at the meeting and a certificate issued to the Mecklenburg Presbyterian Synod in North Carolina to which Rev. Carriker will go.

A committee composed of Edwin Jackson, chairman; James Page, H. T. Finley, Billy Frank Meador and Jack Ratliff was appointed to work with the Mid-Texas Presbytery in securing a new pastor for the local church.

Rev. Carriker's new work is in his old home section of the state in which he was born and reared. For the present, the family will be at home at Indian Trail, N. C. until a house in Charlotte can be secured. Mrs. Carriker and their son, Don, have been spending the summer months with her father in Elizaville, Ky., but at present are visiting with their daughter, Mrs. E. B. Clark at Charlotte, N. C. Mrs. Clark expects to spend the winter months with her family at Indian Trail, while her husband, who was recently discharged from the service, completes his senior year in college.

The Carriker's other son, Cpl. t-5 Jack Carriker, who is stationed in Japan, has written home that he expects to be in the States by Sept. 20, and will visit with his family before entering college.

The family came here two years ago, August 1 from Marion, Ohio.

Mr. and Mrs. Truman Herring and son, Eugene and Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Moore of Kilgore are visiting this week with Mr. and Mrs. Chester Biggs and family. Mrs. Herring is a sister and the Moores are parents of Mrs. Biggs. On Tuesday the men, including Mr. Biggs, went to Devils River Lake for a few days of fishing.

Menard County Gets Oil Production

Menard County was assured of oil production Saturday when the Warren Petroleum Corp. and F. T. Morrow No. 1, Mrs. Ruby Russell and others, six miles northeast of Ft. McKavett, swabbed 15½ barrels of pipeline oil naturally in six hours at a rate of 62 barrels daily. The test, ending at 2:00 p. m. followed cleaning out of the Canyon (Pennsylvania) pay section at 2,282-90 feet.

No. 1-Russell which was bottomed at 2,307 feet, in sandy shale, will be completed on the pump. The rotary rig will be moved a quarter mile west for the drilling of No. 2 Russell. The second test will be drilled 4,300 feet, if necessary to explore the Ellenburger, as had been scheduled on No. 1 Russell Rhodes Drilling Co. which drilled the discovery, has the contract.

This is Menard County's first oil production.

Keno Ogden Buys Robinson Property

In an important real estate deal completed this week, Keno Ogden, former Magnolia station proprietor, bought the Robinson store property on the Angelo highway across from the courthouse, and announces that he will have the old wooden building torn down, and that the corner will be developed into a tourist court, and perhaps other businesses. Work will commence when labor and new material is available.

This property is considered one of the choicest locations in Eldorado and when rebuilt, will be a valuable addition to the business district.

Mrs. Kate E. Robinson, who established a store there in 1902, is moving this week to her newly built home on lots adjoining the Methodist parsonage.

Texas Flyers Invited to Eldorado Airport Opening Festivities

W. M. Patterson, secretary of the Lions Club, has been mailing out invitations this week to Texas flyers who might be interested in the formal opening of the Eldorado Municipal Airport on Sunday, July 28.

A full day of entertainment is being planned with a program calling for stunt flying, contests, passenger rides, and instructions. Free transportation will be provided for all visitors who wish to attend the church of their choice, and a free barbecue will be served at noon to all flyers.

Afternoon attractions are open to the public, including a free exhibition of matched calf roping sponsored by the Eldorado Club which will be staged at 1:30 p. m.

The committee in charge of arrangements are C. L. Wheeler, Wm. Patterson, Jr., and C. C. McLaughlin.

Steps Taken to Buy New Fire Truck

E. H. Topliffe, who had just returned from Dallas, reported to the Lions Club yesterday that the fire truck wanted by this county can be purchased from the Army Surplus depot, and the club immediately took steps to have the purchase made.

The truck, which is the one that was located here last year is priced at \$2468 00 and is equipped for fighting ranch and county fires. It is proposed that the truck be bought for county-wide use, and the cost be financed by public subscription.

C. L. Meador, Jr., was appointed chairman of the special finance committee, and a public subscription will get underway at once. It is hoped that the purchase can be made during the coming week.

Two new members, Joe Lawrence and Jack Hoffman were added at the meeting. Jerry Pennington received his past president's pin, and C. A. Reynolds was presented a key for having gotten two new members.

New Corporation But The Same Old Boys on the Job

The advertisement for Parker's Red and White store appears this week with a slight change in its signature. The official name of the store now is, "Parker Foods, Inc." the business having been organized as a Texas corporation this week when it was issued an "unlimited" charter to engage in retail and wholesale trade.

There is no change in the policy of the store, which continues as a Red & White store; nor in its personnel. The corporation includes the Eldorado and Menard stores, and all stock is held by four men, all of whom are actively working in the business: W. T. Parker, Glen Parker and G. J. King of Eldorado, and Bill Sproul of Menard. Under the new set-up W. T. Parker is designated as president and general manager and Bill Sproul is vice president.

The corporation was organized because it offered a more practical and business-like way of doing business, Mr. Parker said.

R. E. A. Construction Crew Leaves

The Taylor construction crew which has been here for many months working on REA lines vacated their office in the McWhorter building last week, and have moved to Junction. At Junction they will continue REA construction in the Kimbell County district. There is still about three weeks' work in this area remaining—a line to Ft. McKavett which was not completed for lack of wire. The crew will return later to finish this job.

ON BAPTIST HOUR

As unusual as it may seem, the subject, "The Church in Our Day," will be discussed on the Baptist Hour next Sunday, July 21, as announced by the Radio Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention, S. F. Lowe, Director, Atlanta, Ga.

The speaker is Dr. W. Douglas Hudgins, popular pastor of the First Baptist Church of Jackson, Mississippi, having recently come to this important responsibility from the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Houston, Texas, according to the Atlanta announcement. Mr. Lowe states further that Dr. Hudgins, a graduate of Carson-Newman College of Tennessee and of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary of Louisville, Kentucky, has won distinction in the discussion of this timely subject.

The city's water and sewer extension program was actually under way this week as a crew of Taylor Construction men began breaking ground for the first of the sewer lines. The work started in "the draw" south of Rock Station on land that leads toward the disposal plant. It seems that the first problem the crew ran into was rock, calling for a considerable amount of drilling and blasting.

Superintendent for the construction crew is Mr. Couch, who has established an office in one of the city water works buildings. The men are of the opinion that sewer line work will not be completed until about November. After that there will probably be a delay before work on water line extensions can start. Orders have been placed for water main pipes, but delivery of this material has not been promised until January.

The water and sewer extensions are part of a \$150,000.00 municipal improvement program, including between five and six miles of paved streets, which was voted by the citizens of Eldorado several months ago.

Members of the Ft. Concho Sanitary Assn., held their monthly meeting in Eldorado last night and enjoyed a barbecue supper furnished by L. B. Burk, who is president of the association.

The Association is made up of water and sewer operators in the following counties: Schleicher, Sutton, Crockett, Irion, Concho, Tom Green, Runnels and Reagan. Meetings are usually held once a month and are conducted more or less in nature of short course or school in which sanitary problems are discussed and instruction given. Mr. Burk was elected president of the group at the annual meeting held in Angelo several months ago.

Jack Hoffman, who recently became proprietor of the West Texas Cafe, this week made a deal with D. C. Royster and has become proprietor of the Eldo Hotel. He states that he will continue to operate the hotel under somewhat the same plan under which it has been run in the past.

Present for the meeting will be L. A. Wood, state superintendent of public instruction, and John Olson, state director of the school census. All people interested in the improvement and future development of the county's school system are

invited and urged to attend. The meeting will be conducted in an informal manner, and there will be an opportunity for school patrons to ask questions and have them answered by the state's highest school authorities.

The imminent growth of Eldorado calls for a forward looking school policy that will meet the needs of the increasing population, and tonight's meeting offers an opportunity to bring up such things

as transportation, consolidation, tuition, teachers' salaries, and additional taxes. Everyone should be interested and it is hoped that a large crowd will be present.

More Barbecue Than Bitterweed Found In Pulling-Bee Monday

Only a small amount of bitterweed was found in the town section when the Lions Club held their annual Bitterweed Pulling Monday afternoon followed by a barbecue on the courthouse lawn.

"This does not indicate that bitterweed has been entirely eradicated from the town but proves that we have gone a long way toward controlling it," stated W. T. Whitten, master of ceremonies, in his introductory address. Heavy drouth suffered in this section, has also been a factor in preventing the growth of the poisonous weed this year, it was indicated.

Originated three years ago under the leadership of E. B. Keng, in charge of the Soil Conservation Office here at that time, the Bitterweed pulling has become an annual affair, under the sponsorship of the local Lions Club. The first year, 2100 pounds of the weed was gathered on the town section. Last year about one-third that amount and this year, workers brought in three paper sacks and one small can full.

Visitors introduced at the barbecue included Wallace Dameron, Supt., and Leo Merrill, botanist of the Experiment station, Joseph Vander Stucken and Joe Brown Ross and E. B. Keng of Sonora, and Judge Wilson of San Angelo. Mr. Ross, as guest speaker, gave a short history of bitterweed, its potential danger, and means by which it can be controlled. Bitterweed is a native of this country, its spread was slow and gradual, and early ranchmen paid little attention to it. Thus, it was 1932 or '33 before ranchmen of this section awoke to the fact that it was killing stock, and saw in the weed a real danger.

Rotation and deferrment are two of the methods by which the weed may be controlled, and since stockmen have realized its danger and began a battle against it, the weed is becoming scarcer. Every precaution should be taken in its control and since the presence of the obnoxious weed lessens the value of land, sheep, and cattle, it is a real menace and should be treated so, said Ross in conclusion.

The Eldorado group were commended by the visitors for the action taken thus far towards its control, and since eradicating it from the town section means that it has less likelihood of being scattered to ranches controlled by the east and northwest water shed.

About 60 Lions, ranchmen, their families and guests were present for the barbecue.

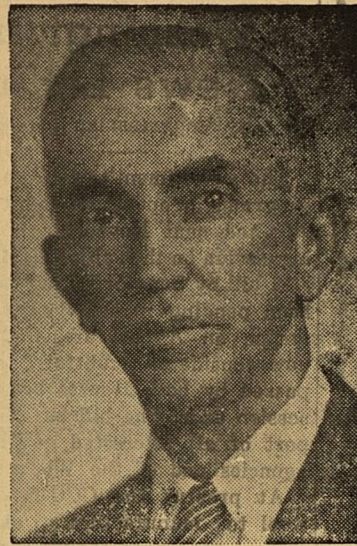

Washington News Letter

By Congressman Fisher

The government's wool purchase program, in operation for 2 years will end next November 1, unless legislation on the subject is enacted.

A bill by Senator O'Mahoney has been pending in the Senate Committee on Agriculture, and it is now considered doubtful it can be passed by both Houses before the session ends. The bill has the support of all interested government agencies and of the White House.

At present the CCC is selling wool to manufacturers at about eight cents under the price paid to producers. This is because of the competitive price established by imported wool. Because of low production costs in New Zealand and Australia, they are able to produce wool, transport it, pay the tariff and yet sell it in this country at a price less than our cost of production.

The British Wool Council controls the disposal of their tremendous stockpile, which amounts to 4 billion pounds. With America as their principal market, there is little comfort for the American producer without a government program to cope with the British disposal plan. As it stands, without import quota restrictions, the sheep man is at the mercy of a domestic market that can be controlled by the British Wool Council.

Back to Washington after four months with the American Military government in Germany, is H. W. Topperwein of Menard. Topperwein, who served as a Navy Lieutenant in the Pacific, became ill in Germany that caused his return. He is now recovered. His wife, also of Menard, is one of Senator O'Daniel's secretaries and is known for the efficiency of her work.

Most of the Texans in Congress who are still at the Capitol have ordered absentee ballots. Speaker Rayburn told us not to expect a recess before July 27, at the earliest. That means it will be impossible for many of us to return home in time for the first primary. The last few days of a session are always crowded with important business.

FARM NEWS

The Schleicher County Agricultural Conservation Association Committee is now making final subsidy payments on dairy products, sheep and lambs, and beef through the local AAA office.

Since the beginning of the subsidy program in 1943, drafts have been issued amounting to \$2,570.65 to fifty producers in Schleicher County. At the present time, applications are being accepted for the April, May, and June period. Rates of payment for dairy products sold in April are 70c per hundred pounds of whole milk and 17c per pound of butterfat. The rates of payment for May and June are 55c per hundred pounds of whole milk and 15c per pound of butterfat. Evidence for this last period must be presented to the local AAA office within 60 days of the last day of June.

The Sheep and Lamb Subsidy Program was begun in October, 1945. Since that time, drafts have been issued to 81 sellers, totaling \$43,490.07 for sheep and lambs sold for slaughtering purposes. Application must be made within sixty days of date of sale.

The Beef Subsidy Program was begun at the same time and seven producers have sold beef which would qualify and have received subsidy amounting to \$336.50.

All applications are made through the local AAA office and are approved and the drafts issued by the county committeemen who are elected annually by the farmers and ranchers of Schleicher County.

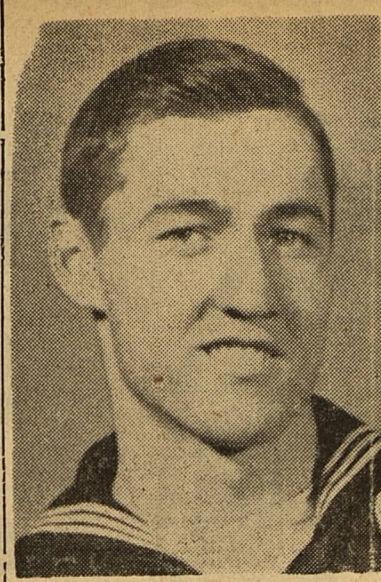

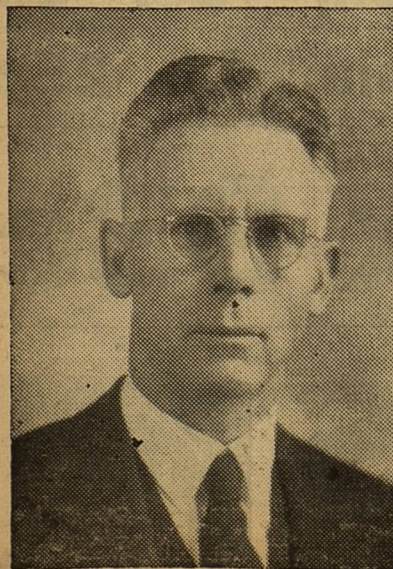
