U.S.O. DRIVE STARTS SOON IN COUNTY

W. M. Patterson will head Schleicher County's U. S. O. drive, with committee members from the Lions Club and the county at large assisting. The county's quota of \$320 will probably be raised within the coming week or two, if residents of Schleicher give the drive their accustomed-and expected-

Texans will be asked to subscribe \$8000,000 toward a national quota of \$19,000,000 which will support an organiation trimmed to the es-sentials and devoting attention to the war-wounded, troops still overseas and to towns adjacent to permanent military installations, Mr. Whitmore said.

Many USO clubs have been closed down since V-J Day in order that available funds might be put into the most essential clubs and shows. Three hundred and seventyfive large clubs will remain open near permanent military bases in the U.S. during 1947 and 25 fully equipped clubs will be maintained for overseas troops sin the Pacific area—China, Japan, Korea, the Phillipines, the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, and the Canal Zone.

One hundred and thirty traveling USO shows will continue to play for troops overseas and will continue to play at Military and vet hospitals twice each month..




