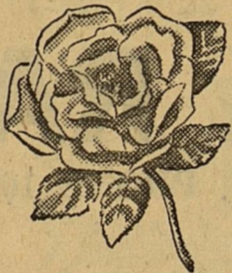

BRACELET SENT TO E. J. DANFORD FROM ENGLAND

The following letter and an identification bracelet belonging to Emmett J. Danford, was received recently by his mother, Mrs. Ruth Danford, from the Prisoner's of War Information Bureau at Washington, where it had been sent from the P.O.W. bureau in London.

The bracelet, which was a present to Jimmy from his mother, was lost before he went overseas, and the fact that it was found on the deceased body of a German, how it got there or why, cannot be explained or understood by Jimmy or his relatives.

The letter reads: "The enclosed identity disc marked "Emmett J. Danford 18153974" was found amongst the personal effects of the deceased German prisoner of War, Serial No. B479806 Bajer, Adolf, who was interned at No. 115 Prisoners of War Camp, White Cross, St. Columb, Cornwall. As this disc would appear to belong to an American airman, it is forwarded to you for such action as you may consider necessary. — A. J. Weston, Controller, P.O.W. Bureau, London, England."

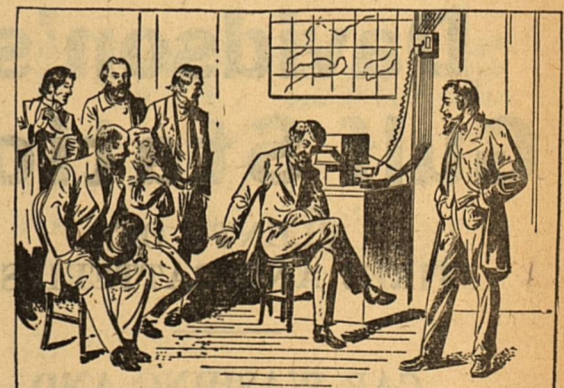

**Montana Resident
Describes Blizzards**

Frozen sheep pulled from a ravine by a bulldozer, and temperatures ranging from 40 degrees above to 20 degrees below in a matter of a few hours, are only a few of the discomforts experienced by Montanans in the worst blizzard that state has seen in many years.

Edwin Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Johnson, who has been a resident of Cutbank, Montana, for 13 years, writes his parents that the blizzard began its onslaught at 9:00 a. m. with rain—at 10 it was snowing—at 11, sleeting and hailing—at 11:30 the sun was shining with temperature 40 degrees above, and that by 3:30 p. m., the thermometer had fallen to 20 degrees below. The temperature changed so fast from 40 above that you could see the mercury drop—and it was ground hog day too.

He reports that one ranchman found his sheep at the bottom of a ravine buried in the snow. A bulldozer was required in pulling the sheep from the hole, and the only way they could be found was by two holes made in the snow by their nostrils in breathing. In this manner, the sheep were located one by one, pulled from the ravine, and those still alive taken to shelter to be revived.

Probably Eldorado even on its coldest days would look good to this former Schleicher County resident, who has called Montana his home for 13 years. However, he likes living there very much, and says that his children never have a cold, and that they enjoy ice skating much of the time. His parents and friends enjoy hearing these interesting bits of news from Johnson, who is well known to many here, and who until graduation from the local school, lived in this county.

**MANY CASES OF MUMPS
REPORTED IN THE STATE**

Austin, Feb. 12.—During the past few weeks there has been a general increase in the incidence of mumps throughout the State. There have been 1750 cases reported since January 1, compared with only 896 cases during the same period last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Though mumps is one of the common childhood diseases, serious complications may develop, so children should be protected as much as possible from this disease. The usual control procedures such as avoidance of crowds, exclusion from school of all cases or suspected cases and quarantine should be followed. The family physician should always be consulted where a case occurs.

The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervous, circulatory, and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called promptly, Dr. Cox advises.

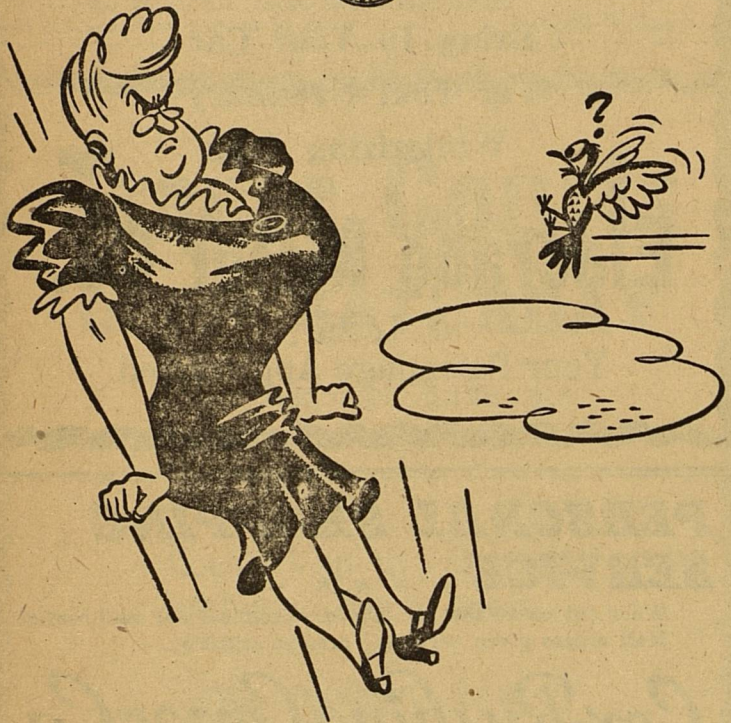

Washington News Letter

The House last week, by a vote of 285 to 121 passed a resolution by the required two-thirds to submit a constitutional amendment to limit the tenure of the President to two four-year terms. I voted for the measure in the belief it is a matter of such importance and of so much public interest that the question should be passed upon by the state legislatures. The proposal now goes to the Senate where, if approved by a two-thirds vote of the members present, it will be submitted to the states. Our Constitution requires that at least 3-fourths of the states ratify the amendment before it is adopted. If the Senate concurs, this will be the first Constitutional Amendment submitted since I came to Congress four years ago.

Wool Tariff — Last week I appeared before the Committee on Reciprocity Information and expressed my opposition to any reduction in the present tariff on wool. These hearings have been going on for several weeks and are preliminary to negotiations for reciprocal trade agreements with a number of countries and deal with a vast number of agricultural products, including wool.

In my testimony I pointed out that certain segments of American agriculture may suffer unjustifiably from trade agreements that fail to give adequate consideration to the needs and rights of American farmers.

At this time there is a world stockpile of apparel wool of approximately five billion pounds. A major portion of that is controlled by a British state monopoly, which can and does virtually control the market price the domestic grower gets for his wool in this country. The domestic grower is therefore at a decided disadvantage in competing with the highly subsidized monopoly controlled stockpile.

Tariff serves as an equalizer between our own cost of production and that of other countries. We compete with countries where labor and other costs of production are only about a third of our own and where standards of living are much lower. It is the prosperity of our markets that enables us to be the largest consumers of imported products and therefore the world's best customers of imported goods. We should try to maintain that prosperous market by giving stability and security to the wool industry.

If the present tariff rate of 34 cents per pound, scoured basis, is lowered it will mean a corresponding decrease in the price the producer can normally expect to get for the wool he produces. As it is, foreign competitors can produce wool, transport it, pay the tariff and yet sell it on our markets at or under our cost of production. It was for these reasons that I urged the Committee not to consider lowering the tariff rate but rather to consider raising it a few cents. While other agricultural products get various forms of government support, the wool grower gets no government help—except for the temporary purchase program—other than that which is afforded by the tariff. It would be disastrous to the domestic grower for it to be materially reduced.
