McIntosh, president of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op today received a telegram from Arthur Gerth, chief of Finance Div. of REA, stating that the administrator had approved funds to the amount of \$260,000 to build 254 miles of line in Schleicher, Sutton, Irion, Crockett, Val Verde, and Tom Green counties, to serve 174 members.
