Rained-Out Lamb Sale Reset For 21st

Cooper-Koy No. 3 Logging With No. 1

Cooper Gas Co. Koy G. H. & SA No. 3, offset to Cooper Koy No. 1, which is now a good producer, is logging the same as No. 1, 1320 feet away, according to reports from the field. The rotary is drilling this week in black shale—and going down steadily with a minimum of set-backs.

The first two Cooper-Koy wells are now producing and prospects are that the third will be equally as good.

The spudder has been moved from Cooper-Koy 3 to Cooper-Page D2 GH and SA. Location for this test was made shortly after bringing in of the first well, and the slush pits and other preliminary preparations have been completed. The spudder was drilling at 200 feet Tuesday on its contract depth of 370 feet. The rotary from Koy No. 3 will then take over, with Parker Drilling Co., in charge, as soon as it is released from No. 3.

A good showing of oil and gas was encountered this week in the S. B. Roberts—John I. King oil test, in the southwest quarter of section 25, block K, GH&SA Railroad survey Sutton Co. The crew topped what is thought to be Strawn lime at 4545 feet and have drilled a few feet into this formation. Drilling is continuing with expectation of reaching Ellenburger. It is understood that the oil and gas showings were encountered about 800 feet higher than in the Koy wells.

Mr. King, who is Commissioner of Precinct 2 in Schleicher County, owns about 2500 acres of land in Sutton County, and has leased his mother's Schleicher County ranch adjoining.

This test is three-fourths mile southeast of the old George Allison-Southern Crude well, drilled about 1929. This well was the biggest have topped what is thought to be at that time, producing gas estimated at 20 million feet—but it was plugged for lack of an outlet.

Sam Kerr Dies At Age of 56

Sam Kerr, 56, died at his home in Three Rivers Saturday, Sept. 14 after an illness of several months. Funeral services were held at Three Rivers at 2:00 p. m. Monday.

Mr. Kerr was born Nov. 26, 1889 in Mason County. He was married to Miss Josephine Wallace on Nov. 5, 1915, in McCullough Co., and to this union were born five children. He moved with his family to Three Rivers in June 1929, where he lived until his death. He became a Christian at the age of 17, and united with the Good Hope Baptist Church in 1940, serving as choir leader and faithful member until his illness.

Survivors include the widow; three sons, Sam Kerr, Jr., John B. Kerr, and Perry Kerr; two daughters, Mrs. Charles McQuire and Mrs. R. A. Lerch, all of Three Rivers; the mother, Mrs. J. B. Kerr of Eldorado; four brothers, L. B. of Eldorado, Edd of Rock Island, John and George of Houston; and four sisters, Mrs. E. K. Turner, Garwood, Mrs. Hough Wolf, Houston, Mrs. T. K. Jones and Mrs. J. A. Griffin of Eldorado, and four grandchildren.

Those attending services from here were Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Kerr and Mrs. J. A. Griffin.

Eldorado-Menard Highway Contract To Be Let Soon

Approximately nine miles of new wire has been received by the county to be used in fencing right-of-way on State Highway No. 151 from Eldorado to the Menard Co. line, and fencing has been resumed from 4½ miles east of Eldorado. This County and Menard County are experiencing considerable difficulty in obtaining fencing materials. However, this will not hinder construction of road bed as arrangements are being made with land owners to enter upon land where fences have not been put up previous to construction.

All material options needed by the Highway Department in the construction of this road have been signed by land owners, except in the case of The West Texas Cotton Oil Co., owners of a 13-acre tract of land adjacent to this highway, wherein it was necessary for the Commissioners Court to file condemnation suit against them in order that plans and specifications of the first 14½ mile section of this road could be forwarded to Austin.

The plans of the first 14½ section are now in the Austin office, subject to a slight change in right-of-way through the Tom Henderson ranch and it is expected, according to officials of the District office, to be awarded to contractor in the October letting.

Frances Sellers Is New Teacher At Local School

Mrs. Frances Robinson Sellers of Eldorado, graduate of Our Lady of the Lake at San Antonio, and post graduate student there one semester, has assumed her new duties as teacher of the fifth grade of the public school. Mrs. Sellers joins the faculty as the result of a series of changes effected during the weekend to relieve crowding. She is well qualified for the place and comes to the job with the best of recommendations.

Heavy enrollment in the first grade of the public school has necessitated dividing of that grade. Miss Ellington remains in the room to teach one section, and the other section is to be taught by Miss Lightsey, 5th grade teacher, who has had a number of years experience in the first grade. Mrs. Sellers will take the fifth grade. The eighth grade has been moved to the high school building to accommodate the extra grade.

Eldorado Eagles Win Season's First Game

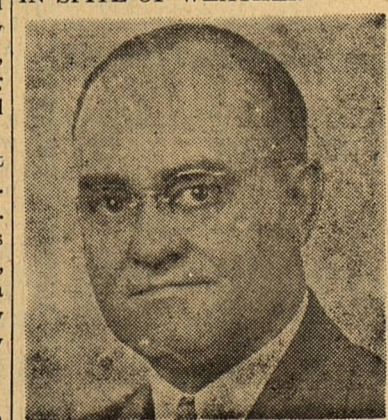
The Eldorado Eagles defeated the Christoval Cougars Friday night on the local gridiron 26-0 in the season opener for both teams.

Eldorado Stone Mason Found Dead Thursday

The body of Willaba Gay, Eldorado stone mason, prominent member of the Masonic Lodge, and long-time resident of this city, was found at his home Thursday afternoon by Virge Tisdale, who called at his residence to learn why he had not started on some work out at the Tisdale Ranch, Monday, as he had promised to do. Death was evidently from natural causes.

Mr. Gay had attended church Sunday night, and it was presumed that death occurred that night, the body remaining several days undiscovered, as he lived alone.

The Masonic Lodge, of which he had been a faithful member for many years, had charge of the funeral, which was held at the Christoval Cemetery Thursday night, beginning at 10:00 o'clock. The service included a song by a group of Masons, prayer, sermon by the pastor, Rev. J. M. Hays, and the impressive Masonic committal rites. Burial was in the family lot where his parents were laid to rest.

Willaba Gay was born 51 years ago in Arkansas to Mr. and Mrs. John W. Gay, and about 11 years later accompanied his parents to Christoval, Texas. Shortly afterward, the mother died, and the family came to Eldorado, all of them later moving away except Willaba.

He learned the stone mason's trade, and has done a great deal of work in Eldorado and on Schleicher County farms and ranches during his 40 years' residence here. He built his own house and has lived alone.

He is survived by four brothers, Jim of Rockland, Texas; Dan of Ruston, La., and Simon and Homer of Lebanon, Mo.; and a sister, Mrs. O. L. Wooten of Brady, who with her husband and a nephew, Richard Ruff, arrived here Thursday night too late for the funeral. His father died at Eden 18 years ago.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church, of the Masonic Lodge of Eldorado, and the Knights Templar of San Angelo.

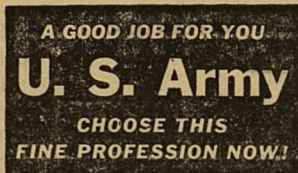

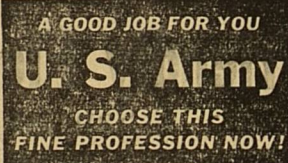

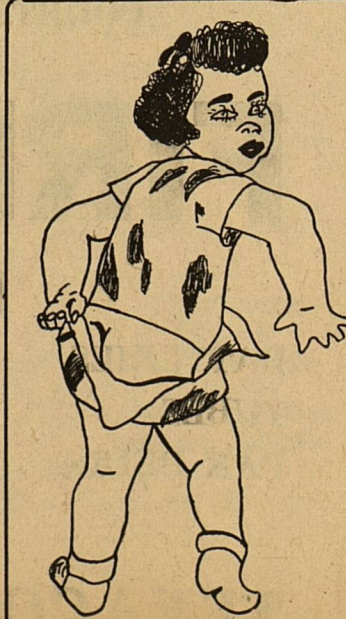
