School Fire Extinguished With Only Slight Damage

Spontaneous combustion caused from oil soaked floors and paper stuffed in a hole, was believed to be the cause of a fire which broke out about 2:45 p. m. Wednesday in the High School building between the ceiling of the 8th grade room and the Junior home room located on the upper floor.

Arthur Mund first discovered smoke pouring from a hole in the upper room where a class in Algebra II was in progress, and the fire alarm was turned in by Fred L. Speck. Students vacated the building in approximately 45 seconds. The Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department answered the call and had the fire out in short order.

A small hole in the floor had evidently been used as a sort of "wastebasket" for many years with one paper taken from it bearing the name of Vance Morgan, and dated 1929. Exact amount of damage was not known Wednesday, but is believed to be light. Smoke caused some damage to desks and floors. All personal property such as books, coats and wraps, was removed from the cloak rooms.





Need of More REA Service Is Stressed

This need for more power has been prompted by two outstanding facts. In the first place, the number of electrified Texas farms has increased from approximately 11,400 to more than 168,000 in the 11 years since the Rural Electrifica-tion Administration was established. An even greater factor is the tremendously increased use of electrical farm production equipment on the average electrified farm. REA statistics show that in the last five years the amount of power distributed by the REA-financed co-ops to Texas consumers has increased 41/2 times—from 30 million to 135 million kilowatt hours a year -although the number of consumers served by the co-ops only a little more than doubled during that per-

The increase occurred during the war years, when electrical equipment was scarce, and the co-op managers are certain that as more equipment becomes available and new farm production devices are perfected, the consumption of electricity per rural consumer will increase at great speed.

Substantial increase in the state's over-all power supply will be required when the needs of thousands of additional consumers soon to be served by the Texas co-ops are adled to the power demands of present rural consumers.

With these potent facts firmly stablished co-op officials and rural consumers look to the Interior Department's Southwestern Power Administration for relief from what easily could be an acute power shortage within the next few years.
The SPA is bending every effort to speed its proposed program which when completed will assure an abundance of low cost power for rural consumers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, SW Missouri and SE Kansas.

Since early last summer field survey work has been progressing on the project wherein the SPA is s to coordinate the power generated at the hydroelectric plants at the Norfolk and Denison dams by means of heavy transmission lines. The power program also includes other multiple-purpose reservoir projects scheduled for construction in the future. Once all the government built dams and their hydroelectric plants have been completed and tied into the proposed power grid system, which probably will onnect with the transmission faclities of private utility companies, the Southwestern Power Administration will be in a position to serve adequately any future power demands the co-ops might originate.

Texas coops now have available sufficient REA loan funds to construct facilities that will serve more than 42,000 new rural consumers. Approval of loan fund applications now pending in REA neadquarters or in preparation in eo-op offices will make possible service to 38,000 more Texas consumers. Eventually the co-ops ex-



> AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SHOOTING of FIREWORKS

An ordinance regulating the use and shooting of fireworks within the City of Eldorado, Texas, pro-Columbia, Mo., Nov. 12.—Miss hibiting the shooting of fire works for violation of this ordinance.

> BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS

Section 1. Definition: The term "Fireworks" referred to in this ordinance shall include, toy pistol, toy gun, toy cannons, detonating canes, roman candles, sky-rockets, blank cartridges, fire-crackers of any size and kind, or any substance of an explosive nature and device

The 2. The shooting of fireworks prohibited. It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person or persons to set off or shoot any fire works within the fire limits of the city of Eldorado, as the same is now deined or may hereafter be defined.

Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to set off or shoot any fire works anywhere within the city limits of the city of Eldorado between midnight and 6:00 a. m., of any day cf

the year. Section 4. It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person or persons to set or shoot any fireworks within 300 yards of any hospital, school or any other public building; in any street or public park; or within 300 yards of any stand or store where fireworks are kept or sold.

Section 5. All ordinances or part of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and apon conviction thereof shall be ounished by a fine of not less than One Dollar nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publicaion according to law.





Maple Tree

Fifteen gallons of sap is a good average production per maple tree. Forty gallons of sap, or the yield from about three trees, is necessary to produce one gallon of syrup. Maple sugar is obtained by further boiling the syrup; one gallon of syrup yields eight pounds of sugar. Sugar maple sap yields twice as much as soft maple.

Thin Fillets

Thin fillets are delicious when rolled in egg and crumbs and then cooked in deep fat. Use the same method as for frying oysters and shrimp. For a special taste treat, try serving a combination of fried oysters and fried shrimp with plenty of good chili sauce.

Smoked Turkey

Smoked turkey and poultry meats have been known for centuries but have only recently been publicized as a delicacy; this is partly because recipes for smoking have either been handed down in certain families, or developed by individ-uals and held as trade secrets.

Clear Drain Pipe


