Thursday's Big Blow Causes Some Damage

Fields and pastures in Schleichen County and other counties of the Southwest played a fast-moving game of "fruit basket turn over" Thursday evening, as priceless tor soil took to the air in one of th fastest moving sandstorms experi enced by this locality in many years

A barn belonging to Sheriff E H. Sweatt, which he had just recently moved to his farm in the Bailey Ranch community, blew over during the storm, knocking over a windmill tower, causing ex tensive damage to both the barn and windmill. As far as is known this is the only serious damage done here by the wind.

The storm lasted from late Thursday afternoon until nearly midnight. It covered a wide area of Texas. causing motorists to stor along the highway for safety's sake and inconveniencing ranchers, farmers and businessmen in many ways. By midnight the winds had ceased, but after daylight Friday they began to blow again, continuing on throughout the day.

Cultivated fields which suffered most serious soil loss, are in need of heavy rains for spring growth as are also pastures and grazing land throughout Schleicher County and the entire Southwest.

Fish Ears Fish have no external ears or spe-

cial mechanism for conducting sounds to the internal ears, which are embedded deeply in the skull. Sounds in the water are conducted through the bone of the skull to the inner ears of a fish. However, ears of fish do not have a cochlea, as do human ears. For this reason, it is believed that the hearing of fish is poorly developed.

Noise Deafens

A study of more than 1,000 persons working in noisy factories indicates that a high level of noise tends to impair hearing, according to the Sonotone research laboratories. When the study was started about 10 per cent had appreciable loss of hearing. A year later tests indicated that about 25 per cent of the men and women had hearing impairment.

Ironing Pads

Today, almost every woman's or child's garment has shoulder pads for styling and at times these are a nuisance, particularly in wash clothes if left in the garment when washing. To simplify the ironing job. remove the pads before washing and sew snaps on so that they will be easily replaced. This little trick saves a lot of work, and the pads are always in the right place -smooth and slick-the way they were meant to be.

String Rug

Try making an ordinary string rug. Take a piece of canvas 27x36 inches and mark it off in lines 1 inch apart. Wind string 20 times around a piece of cardboard 5 inches wide. Cut the string at both ends; place it across the first line marked on the canvas; stitch down middle of string. Repeat this process until all the ends are covered. You will find you have an attractive rug and one that can be laundered very easily.
