ELDER OIL CO. MOVING TO **NEW BUILDING**

The Elder Oil Co., are moving today to their new tile service station, in Block Y, and are now ready for business, though some work remains to be done on the exterior of the building and the grounds and driveway.

The building is of tile, 28x30 feet in size, with plenty of driveway From C. Alexander space at the front and sides. The business houses Phillips 66 products, Westinghouse goods, station-and has excellent facilities for washing and greasing cars.

The lots had been owned by 7 individuals, none of whom are now living and none of whom knew each other, and there was no record of sale of the lots since 1909. Gaining title to the property necessitated hours of time spent on clearing title and contacting the heirs. After clear title was secured, the ground was leveled, tanks installed and the foundation for the building laid in a short time. Construction of the building was started in late January, and has proceeded steadily with minor delays caused by unfavorable weather.

Because of the fact that some work remains to be done, the formal opening will be held at a later date. Meanwhile the Elders are conducting their usual business, while finishing touches are being added to building and grounds.
