COTTON ACREAGE Estes' Daughter Dies, CONTRACT LET IN THIS COUNTY IS INCREASED

A larger acreage in cotton is indicated by reports of growers this week, who admit that last year's price of \$200 per bale influenced them in their decision to plant more in 1947.

Some cotton is planted and sprouted, but many are awaiting another rain before putting in their

What the percentage of increase will be is anyone's guess-and the guesses vary from 30 per cent to 100 per cent. Some have increased their acreage, others are returning to cotton after choosing other crops during several war years, and some are trying it out for the first time.

It is conceded that an attractive price has been given first consideration. Other factors are adaptability of the soil, and supply of local labor at picking time.

There is no adequate record available concerning the increasebut it is expected that last year's 1600 Schleicher County cotton acreage will be upped to at least 2500

Among those who are increasing acreage or planting for the first time are Halbert on the L. T. Wilson place, W. M. Davis, Wm. Jarrett on the Joe Edens place, Buck White, L. Kent, Jim Tom Roach and others.

Remodeling Proceeds On Army Barracks

Army barracks have arrived in Eldorado-as many as 15 or 16and are undergoing remodeling to take care of the city's surplus population.

It's a debatable question-and good for an argument any time: are they good for the town or will an eyesore in years to come! Opinion is divided-nevertheless hammers and saws are being plied in widely separated sections of town. The buildings are arriving whole or knocked down, and will be remodeled or completely rebuilt, as the imagination (and pocketbooks) of the owners will dictate. Some made the trip better than others; one arrived in town with beams sagging and plywood flapping in the wind—the result of a highway accident. Remodeling costs will vary from a few hundred dollars up.
