The Eldorado Air Field is coming into its own as an important Don McCormick phase of civilian life for a group of Schleicher County veterans New Commander who are learning to fly here, under direction of the Southwest Air College of San Angelo.

As ex-GI's, the boys are enrolled under the government training program, and will receive free flying lessons from beginners' instructions to receiving of a commercial license. Instructors from San Angelo come to Eldorado daily to give the lessons, enabling the boys to go to school at the home field. Those who continue long enough to require advanced training will take their final instructions at San Angelo.

In addition to practical lessons n the field, Angelo instructors re conducting night classes each Wednesday and Friday night in the fire station.

It is expected that the enrollment will grow. Others who are not G. I.'s may pay their fees and take the lessons also if they so desire. Application may be made to Chester Wheeler in Eldorado, or the instructor at the field.
