Agent Discusses Garden Insects

There are two classes of insects that are likely to attack your garden this year. The chewing insects, which chew holes in the leaves of fruit, and the sucking insects, which suck juices from the foliage, stems nd fruit. Horticulturists tell us that, gen-

erally, DDT will control both types of bugs, except the plant lice and the red spiders. Of course we all know by now that DDT is not the answer to all our prayers on insect problems, and in fighting vegetable insects, there are some things to watch. For example, DDT will burn the foliage on vine crops like squash cucumbers and melons, so we'll be wise to use some other insecticide ored Mrs. Bates Wagnon of Station on these crops.

DDT cannot be safely used on leafy vegetables that are harvested every day, or even each week, since the residue of the insecticide is hard to remove from the leaves. This residue can be harmful if eaten.

Now, you can use DDT on beans, peas, tomatoes and cabbage, proz vided you apply it early in the season. The horticulturists say that it cannot be safely used within three weeks of harvest time. So there's a rule for us, no DDT on beans, peas, tomatoes and cabbage later than three weeks before the vegetables are ready for harvest.

On root vegetables, potatoes, car-rots, beets, onions and the like, you are safe in using DDT throughout the season.

DDT can be used either as a dust or spray. Three to five per cent dusts are good for garden insects, and an effective spray can be mixed with two ounces of 50 per cent wettable powder in a gallon of water. -W. G. Godwin, County Agent.
