## COMMISSIONERS COURT SETS CO. TAX RATE MON.

The Commissioners' Court of Schleicher county at its regular meeting Monday, July 11, adopted tax schedules for the county. Broken down into various funds, the tax rate for the county will be as follows:

The total county rate of 95c on the \$100 valuation for the current year is four cents lower than last year, when the rate was 99c. The average farmer or rancher will probably pay about the same number of dollars as before, since valuations in these classes have been adjusted slightly upward.

## Joe Tisdale Ranch Provides Location For New Wildcat

Pits and cellar have been dug for Schleicher's newest wildcat, Honolulu No. 1, Mrs. Willie Tisdale about seven miles northeast of Eldorado. It is understood that George P. Livermore will drill for Honolulu.

The test is in section 74, block LL, 1980 feet from west line, 1980 feet from south line, GC & SF survey.

Surface pipe has been set on Lone Star Producing Co. No. 1. Clint Pinson, Standard Fryer of Dallas will drill with rotary. This location is 660 ft. SE corner, Sec. 69-M-GH & SA survey and is 3 3/4 miles from the Phillips No. 1 Weddell. Hiss drilled the surface hole.

L. H. Morris and L. E. Scherck of San Angelo No. 1 Tom R. Henderson is drilling below 4200 feet. Southern Minerals No. 1 Webster is below 4200.

## FAIR EXHIBITS PLANNED

Plans are well under way for exhibits for the 1949 State Fair of Texas, and Schleicher county residents who expect to exhibit are urged to make entries early. The dates of October 8 to 16 have been announced for the fair.

In the livestock division, 126 new swine pens have been built in order to provide additional space; however, swine breeders are urged to make entries earlier than usual this year, since the demand for facilities is expected to be larger than last year. On October 15 there will be an all-breed swine sale.

## UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SCHEDULES CARPENTERS' COURSE

Carpenters' apprentices who have had to depend upon experience only to learn their trade will soon be supplementing it with "book learning" under a program prepared by the University of Texas Industrial and Business Training Bureau.

A standard course of study with instructional material is being readied. The Associated General Contractors of Texas and the State Council of Carpenters each chipped in \$1,000 and asked the Bureau to do the job. State and federal vocational funds brought the grants-in-aid up to \$8,000.

The program is being prepared in cooperation with the State Board for Vocational Education.

## STEEL-TOP CONVERTIBLE IS NEW OLDS PRODUCT

Oldsmobile's new Holiday Coupe, resembling a convertible but possessing a permanent steel top, is now in production at the General Motors plant in Lansing, Michigan. The new car will be available soon to motorists.

The Holiday coupe has the same lines as the series 98 deluxe convertible coupe, yet it has a rigid steel top which provides greater protection and comfort. Other innovations are the new rear window of curved glass, and the elimination of support pillars between the top and lower portion of the body, both of which give greater visibility.

The engine in the new Holiday Coupe is the 135-horsepower Rocket with Hydra-Matic Drive as standard equipment.

## TRACTORS AND TRUCKS INCREASE IN VALUE

The number of tractors in the United States has more than doubled, and the number of motor trucks on farms is up 83% from 1940 figures. The value of all autos, measured in 1940 dollars, was down one-third, while the value of other machinery is about 3.5 times pre-war.

## Trash Hauling Starts; Andrews In Charge

Eldorado's first city-wide trash hauling service, financed by a water meter tax, will begin this week end. Residential areas are to be serviced twice monthly and the business district daily.

At their regular session Tuesday night, the City Council agreed to put Roy Andrews in charge of this service.

Tin cans, junk, and other refuse must be put in boxes or sacks and left in alleys or along the streets to facilitate the work of the pickup men.

Roy Andrews has not yet divided the city into zones for this pickup service, but further details will be announced as they are worked out.

## Summer Band To Give Concert On July 22

A band concert will be presented Friday night, July 22, at the memorial building at 8:00, according to announcement made by C. F. Jones, band director. The band will be seated on the memorial porch, he states, and the audience will be assembled on the lawn and driveway in front of the building.

In addition to the personnel of the summer band which will form the nucleus of the group, all ex-band students are invited to take their old places and perform with the organization for the concert. Rehearsals are being held each week night (Monday through Friday) preceding the concert. The band students are taking over the responsibility of choosing the program for the evening.

This appearance of the band will close the summer band instruction period. Total summer enrollment is 63, states Jones, but the average attendance has been 35, due to the threat of polio in this community.

## Cotton Research Lab At U. of Texas Will Help Growers

Texas cotton merchants may get help in improving merchandising methods from a cotton research laboratory scheduled for completion at the University of Texas this fall.

The laboratory, to be equipped with the latest scientific instruments, is part of a broad program of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, composed of presidents of Texas A&M College, Texas Tech and the University of Texas. The merchandising portion of the research portion of the research program is carried on at the University.

Research under way is designed to help merchants make economical use of instruments now available for determining qualities of the cotton fiber important in merchandising, such as length, uniformity of length, strength, fineness and maturity.

By using instruments as aids in classifying cotton, researchers believe, it should be possible to reduce rejections and arbitrations, both costly to merchants and mills. Scientifically-selected lists of cotton are more uniform, resulting in better yarn strength and fewer "breaks" on the spinning frame. Temperature and humidity affect cotton fibers, so the laboratory will be air-conditioned for control of both, 70 degrees Fahrenheit and 65 per cent relative humidity being considered the experimental standard.

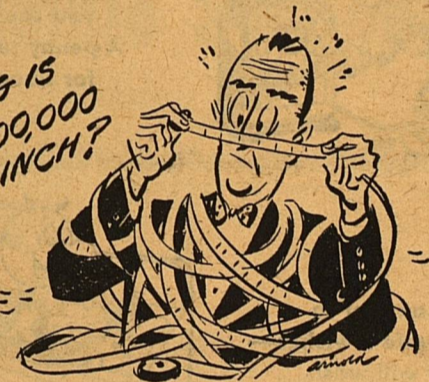

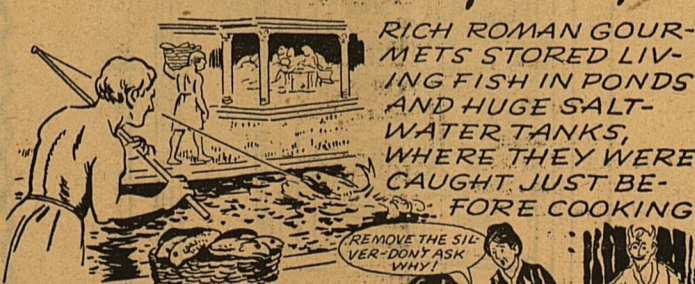

Windy fixed it all right. He "stopped the show" for us, and Buzz Ellis had to come over and do a \$20 repair job. I understand

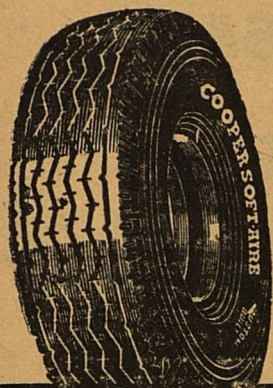
Windy feels so bad, that he's paying the bill and has apologized to the Judge for acting so smart.

#### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

**Butterscotch Meringue Puddings**  
¾ package butter-scotch pudding powder  
½ cup Pet Milk  
½ cup water  
1 egg, separated  
8 graham crackers, 2½ inches square  
¼ cup smooth peanut butter  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
Put pudding powder into saucepan. Stir in slowly a mixture of milk and water. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil slowly and stir 30 seconds. Remove from heat. Stir slowly into slightly beaten egg yolk. Cook and stir 2 minutes longer. Cover and chill. Stir occasionally while chilling. Grease 4 large custard cups or dessert dishes. Roll graham crackers into fine crumbs. Blend in peanut butter with fork. With back of spoon, press crumb mixture on bottom and sides of greased dishes. Fill with chilled pudding. Beat egg white until stiff. Beat in brown sugar, a tablespoon at a time. Put on top of puddings and continue chilling until ready to serve. Makes 4 servings.

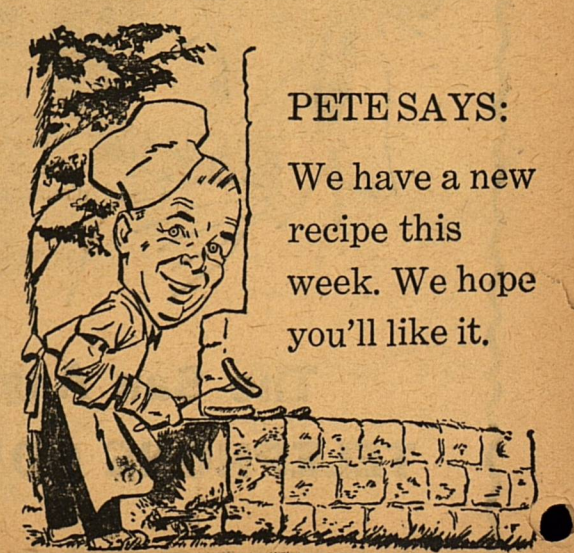
