COTTON ACREAGE IS ON INCREASE IN SCHLEICHER CO.

Farming is like a teeter-totter—when one crop goes down another goes up! This year Schleicher County farmers played teeter-totter with cotton and feed. Cotton acreage was increased at the cost of feed.

It is estimated that there is a 50% increase in cotton acreage in Schleicher County, tho there is little increase in the amount of cultivated land. Two factors are responsible — last year's \$200 per bale cotton was attractive to farmers, and drouth this year caused a cut in feed acreage, causing some to sell some stock and turn to cotton.

Cotton, given growing impetus by recent rains, is up to a good start and is looking fine. Planted late, it was not damaged much by the spring drouth. Practically all cotton growers are fighting weeds this week after last week's rains in an attempt to clean out their fields before the stalks put out more growth.

Feed is looking fine, tho the crop was planted after small grains failed to make the grade this spring. Some headed prematurely but is expected to sucker out and make a good crop. Main feeds are combine maize and hegari, as usual.

Feed growers will keep as much feed as they need for their stock and will sell the rest to Schleicher County ranchers. Many of the feed growers are in Reynolds and Bailey Ranch communities, tho some, such as John West and others in all directions from Eldorado, live nearer town.

Grain cutting and combining is expected to be over this week. Wheat and oats are making better than expected.

Fire Boys Sponsor First Aid Course With Angelo Teacher

A standard Red Cross First Aid Course, sponsored by the Eldorado Fire Department, opened Monday night at the City Hall for its organizational meeting. Fifteen men were enrolled for the course, with a possibility of more entering Thursday night. Women are welcome to enroll in the class which will meet each Monday and Thursday evening for nine sessions, of two hours each.

Mr. Teague of San Angelo is instructor for the course, and is using the revised text book on First Aid.

STOVALL CONST. REBUILDS LINES FOR UTILITY CO.

For the first time since the war opened, major repairs and improvements are being made in West Texas Utility Lines.

In charge of the work is a Stovall Construction Co. crew of six men, working out of San Angelo and Dallas. The men are replacing wire and poles where needed, adding several new transmissions, and extending lines to places not heretofore served. The company expects to add a number of new customers to the 471 already receiving service, when Stovall work is completed.

Jerry Pennington, local West Texas Utility manager, states that Frigidaires are still scarce, that ranges and washers have been received in sufficient quantities to catch up with demand, and that smaller appliances are arriving in small amounts.

TELEPHONE CO. MAY IMPROVE RUDD SERVICE

Officials of the San Angelo Telephone Company have been meeting with Rudd residents to work out plans for improved telephone service in the Rudd neighborhood.

It is the hope of the company that the Rudd telephone users will pay for poles and wire leading to Eldorado, this being a contract job. The company would install the dial phones, work on the entire project to start this year.

Telephone service to Rudd has long been a problem for the telephone company and Rudd residents as the community is sparsely settled, and service at present is poor.

TWO PRECINCTS HAVE ROAD WORK NOW UNDER WAY

Two spots in Schleicher County's light network of roads are being worked and improved this summer.

A 2½ mile strip to Station A, Precinct 1, is being calicheed, to provide an all weather road from Eldorado to the station, about twenty-five miles southwest of this city. Completion of this strip will provide better road facilities to and from that point and will enable the local school to provide transportation for the increasing number of scholastics from Station A and ranch vicinity who will attend school in Eldorado.

The other county road grader is at work on the long stretch of old highway from the Tisdale corner, where the new road branches off, to Ft. McKavett, all in Precinct 1. Soon to be discontinued as the main route to Menard, this road will still be needed and used by oil field visitors and employees and by ranching families from Tisdale's, through Page and Frensd pastures, and Middle Valley, to Ft. McKavett.

Work at present is near Ft. McKavett where draws have been washed.

Highway Bid May Be Too High

That the state may build the remaining 14.5 miles of Menard Highway looms today as a possibility in view of the fact that low bid is \$162,607.55, submitted by Burnham Construction Co. when bids were opened in Austin yesterday. The figure is generally thought to be high, and may cause the state to take on the job as they did the first stretch, to be completed by the 10th.

What the highway department will do has not been announced. If the state does the work, they may start it at once, as equipment is on the ground, and available soon.

This is the last gap in the Eldorado to Menard road.

EQUALIZATION BOARD AT WORK ON VALUATIONS

An Associated Press survey on the \$2,000 minimum teachers' pay for the coming school year reveals a fact which Eldorado and Schleicher County school officials had already learned: the only way to meet the minimum is through increased evaluation of county taxable property and real estate.

A board of equalization for the local school, composed of Ervin Mund, Forrest Runge and L. D. Ochsner, is doing spade work on the mammoth task of scrutinizing every tax bill in the entire county with the view to upping every property owner's assessment.

Every tax payer in this county will have an increase in school taxes on his next bill. It will be the task of the board to study each rendition and decide upon the amount of increase, smoothing out inequalities where possible.

The Legislature recently increased the \$35 state apportionment to \$55 with the expectation of enabling schools to pay the minimum, but even this increase will not be sufficient to foot the bill for the bigger pay roll throughout the state.

OIL ACTIVITY CONTINUES TO SPREAD OUT

The attention of Schleicher Co. residents and those members of the oil fraternity who are interested in the ever-increasing oil activity in Schleicher Co., centers on two wildcats in the Rudd community.

The Luke Robinson wildcat has the derrick on location and the rotary rig is expected to arrive any time during the coming weekend. Scheduled for immediate testing with Chapman and McFarland doing the drilling, this wildcat will go to Ellenburger. The location of the test is Cities Service Block, 660 ft. E & 660 ft. S of line SE¼, Sec. 49, Block I.

About fifteen men, some single and some with families, will arrive here soon for this test.

It is expected that No. 1 Hayden Baugh Estate test (660 SE — 3M GH & SA) will be drilled with equipment from Groebel-Koy, but no announcement to that effect has been made. The spudder has completed the surface hole and all is in readiness for rotary to take over.

That the oil game is erratic and unpredictable is proved by late developments in the Al Groebel 1 Koy, slated to make a good producer, but spoiled at the last with salt water.

Thorough preliminary testing had indicated that operators had a real producer in the making — and testing is continuing in the hope of making a well out of this wildcat. Location is three fourths miles northeast of 1c Koy, —C NW SW 34—L—GH & SA.

A temporary halt in drilling activity is possible because of an acute shortage of pipe. Operators had to use 5½ inch pipe instead of 7 inch on the Groebel-Koy, hence were unable to go to Ellenburger.

A Schlumberger was run in Cooper No. 5-A Page this week and casing has been set — testing of the well to take place during the week-end. Location is C NW NW 32-L-GH & SA.

BERNARD CARR TO OPEN STUDIO IN PATTON BLDG.

Bernard Carr has completed a major renovating job on the Dr. Patton office building, which he has leased, and on July 5 will open a photograph studio there.

Mr. Carr, a returned veteran, has been interested in photography for some time, gradually gaining considerable recognition in Schleicher County as an able photographer. The opening of his studio is the result of his increased interest in an avocation which eventually became a vocation.

Death Strikes Twice In Dickens Family

Death struck twice last week in a well known Schleicher County family when two of its members passed away within a little more than twenty-four hours of each other. Jesse Dickens, 56, died at Menard at 2:00 p. m. Friday and his mother, Mrs. George Dickens, 74, followed him in death at approximately 6:00 p. m. Saturday, June 21, ten hours before her son's funeral.

Funeral services for Jesse Dickens were held at 4:00 p. m. Saturday, from the Menard Baptist Church with the Rev. C. H. Richards of Coleman, officiating, assisted by the Menard Baptist pastor. The Day and Loveless Funeral Home of Eden was in charge of arrangements and burial was in the Menard Cemetery.

Mr. Dickens, owner of a cafe in Menard, died suddenly shortly after closing his cafe for the night. 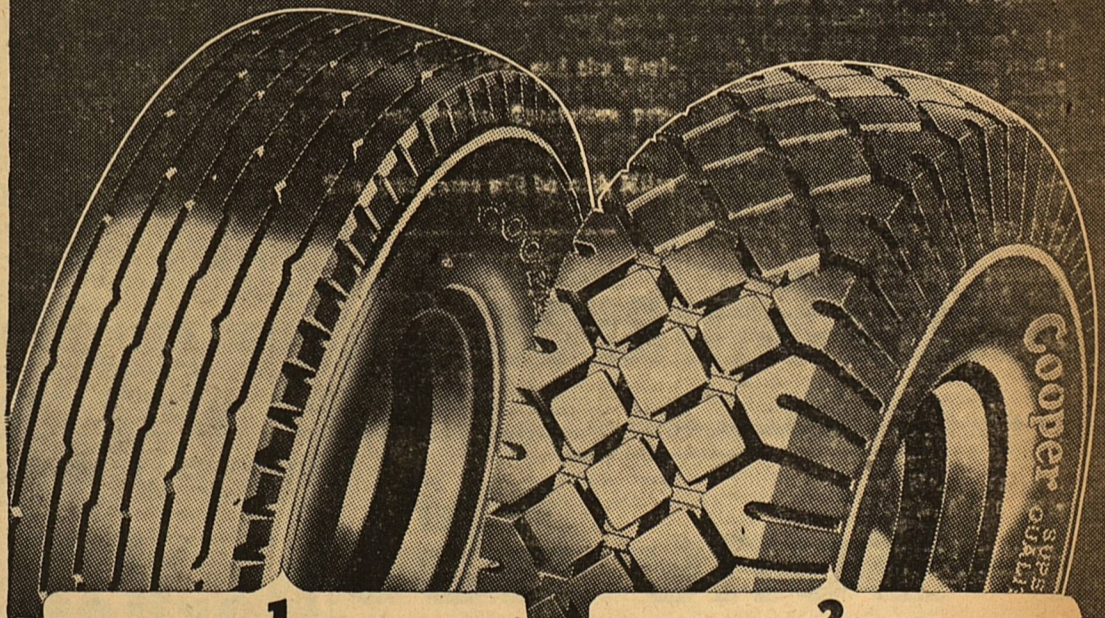

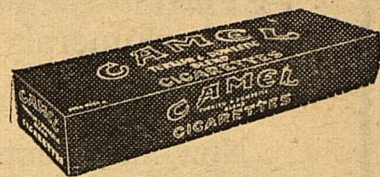
