CARRS EXPAND THEIR BUSINESS WITH NEW LINE

A metalizing laboratory has been installed at the Carr Studio, to provide a metalizing service for perishable articles, and especially of baby shoes.

After months of planning and work on installing of equipment, Aris and Bernard Carr, joint owners of the business, have samples on display in their office, and are ready to take orders.

In connection with equipment installation, the proprietors remodeled their studio, and announce that they will continue to operate their photographic business. Bernard will spend his working hours in the metalizing rooms and out on photographic assignments, and Aris will do the studio photographic work. Mrs. Aris Carr will continue to be receptionist, in charge of the office and retail sales.

For the time, the proprietors expect to spend most of their time filling local orders for metalizing of baby shoes and other perishable items in bronze, gold or silver. Later they expect to develop a mail order business, with Aris in charge of direct selling and direct mailing, with dealers in other places. Soon also they expect to be prepared to re-plate silverware and jewelry as well as other keepsakes.

Bernard opened the photograph studio in 1945, and was joined by his brother Aris in 1948. Both have diplomas in electroplating. The business is located in the Patton building.

Better - than-Average Wheat, Oats in County

A better-than-average crop from the 10,500 acres in small grain is estimated for Schleicher county by Eddie Brown and W. G. Godwin, who are in close touch with agricultural conditions.

Of the 35,000 in cultivation, 30 percent, or 10,500 acres is in small grains — 3,780 acres in wheat and 6,720 in oats.

The estimated yield today is 50 bushels of oats per acre and 15 to 18 bushels of wheat.

Planting of cotton, delayed by a heavy rain last week, is proceeding, and some of the county's farmers are running their tractors 24 hours per day. Some cotton planted last week is already up.

The 1949 spring is one of the wettest the county has had in many years.

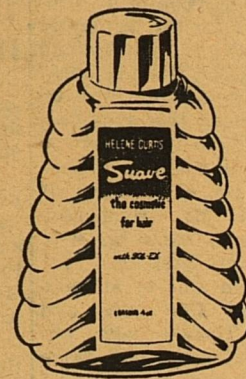

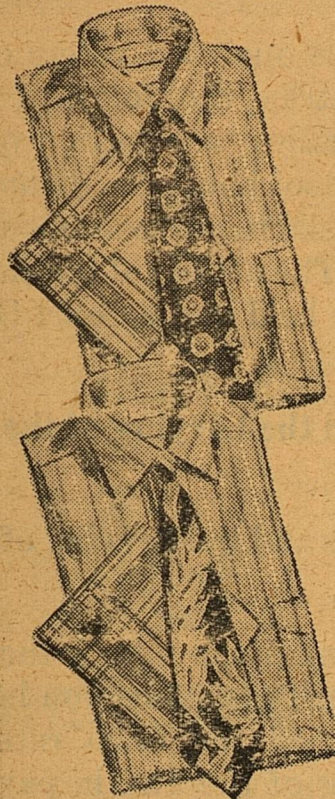

To The Voters of The Schleicher County Rural High School District

As a result of a petition signed by 108 qualified voters of the Schleicher County Rural High School District, the Board of Trustees of this District passed a resolution calling an election on the proposition of the issuance of \$475,000 school house bonds and the levying of a tax in the payment thereof, said proposition to be voted upon on the 28th day of May, 1949. The notices of the election have been posted and the election will be held at the Court House. The Ballot will read as follows:

"For The Issuance of the Bonds and the Levying of the Tax in Payment Thereof"

"Against The Issuance of the Bonds and the Levying of the Tax in Payment Thereof"

I wish to take this opportunity to remind the voters that the maximum tax of \$1.50 was voted last August at an election held in this District and the Board of Trustees levied the \$1.50 rate last year. I want to explain that "The levying of the Tax in payment thereof" in the ballot simply means that you are giving the Board of Trustees the legal right to set aside in a sinking fund the necessary amount of money each year to pay principal and interest on the Bonds as they mature. This amount of money will come out of the \$1.50 rate, leaving ample money for school maintenance, therefore in voting for these bonds, you are not increasing your tax rate, nor raising your valuation. It will take approximately 37c to service this issue of bonds. The amount of \$475,000 was decided to be the very least amount necessary to make the needed improvements in our school plant, which amount was determined from advice and plans of several architects along with the plans and requirements offered by the State Department of Education.

An intense study will continue to be made by the Board of Trustees of many new school plants which have been built in West Texas during the last two years. Every effort will be made to spend the money wisely and efficiently.

The Board invites the public to express their ideas for the building program before the contract is let instead of after the building is finished.

The following is a copy of a letter from the State Board of Education which explains the condition of our school and the immediate need of a new building.

The work of classifying and accrediting the public schools of Texas is under the direction of the State Committee composed of twenty-one members representing the elementary and secondary schools and colleges of the State. This Committee, by establishing educational standards, determines the conditions upon which high schools are classified and accredited and is interested in encouraging schools to attain these standards and in certifying those that have attained them so as to facilitate the transfer of students to any other secondary school or college.

The regulations as prescribed by this Committee are administered by the State Department of Education through high school supervisors. In the visits of the supervisors and in their reports to school authorities, recommendations and helpful suggestions are offered in the spirit of cooperation, with the earnest desire that school authorities will join with the State Department of Education in their efforts to maintain the established standards of secondary education in Texas.

In order that schools may be properly certified, it is essential that minimum requirements be met. To that end the supervisor who recently visited your school makes the following report:

1. Credits Added: None. 2. Credits Dropped: None.

3. Observations, Recommendations, and Comments:

The superintendent and faculty have the school well organized, and with the assistance of Dr. Speer, the progress is being made in a study of Child Development and Growth Within the School

Most of the teachers are well qualified and are teaching in their major or minor studies.

It is, however, impossible to maintain a first class high school in the present condition of the building as the walls are cracked and in need of paint; the entire building is poorly arranged to serve the needs of the student body; crowded conditions exist in some of the classrooms and the deputy feels that this condition should be improved at once. He, therefore, recommends that the Eldorado Schools be placed on the advised list with the understanding that they will be dropped from the accredited list if the housing conditions are not improved within the next 18 months.
