## S. W. Texas Electric Co-Op Gets Biggest Wire Shipment; Two Cars Go To Sonora For Line To Juno

The last of many shortages which have plagued the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op for years is now history! The arrival of two cars of wire, with promise of more, has definitely cracked the last remaining bottleneck in REA construction.

The wire which arrived recently was ordered in November, 1946. It was unloaded at Sonora for use on the Sonora Juno line.

There will be a slight delay before contract can be awarded. Notices have already been sent to prospective bidders, and bids will be opened in the office of the co-op at 10 a. m. April 21. Work must start soon afterward, as contract states that the 151 miles of line must be completed in 90 days.

All other materials were received 18 months ago. Parts of Crockett, Sutton and Val Verde counties will be served by this Sonora-Juno line, and a sub-station will be located in Sonora to take care of the area. The Co-Op has never before received more than one carload of wire at a time.

The delivery on two cars will be followed (possibly this week) by a third, which will be used in the Cliff and Rudd communities, where the poles have been set for several months. The Co-Op will start stringing this wire the last of this week or the first of next. A fourth car of wire will be strung in the Menard-Ft. McKavett locality, when the final okay is given that 100-mile line.

News of immediate delivery of wire has been welcomed by the REA force here and their many prospective customers, as it means more rapid building of lines. Post-war shortages have been acute in all REA materials at some time, but some progress has been made, as construction could proceed when small deliveries of essential materials were made from time to time.

"But wire was always the biggest bottleneck, and sometimes we wondered if we'd ever get all we needed," states Manager Don McCormick.

## West Side Church Adds New Rooms

Members expect to finish work this week on the addition to the West Side Church of Christ which was begun recently. The new rooms being built on to the back of the present structure include two rest rooms, two dressing rooms, and a baptistry.

Outside construction is frame to match the rest of the building, and the inside walls are being sheet-rocked and enameled. Fluorescent lights are being installed in both the new addition and in the main auditorium. The outside of the main building will be repainted at the same time the addition is painted.

The addition measures 10x24 feet and church members are doing their own carpenter work.

## MEMORIAL BUILDING COMPLETED

Today, Thursday, March 31st, marks the completion of the Schleicher County Memorial Building. The actual construction on this building started on April 15, 1948 requiring almost a year to build. It was constructed of Austin stone, tile, and concrete, and was built under the direct supervision of the Commissioners' Court of the county; N. H. Hilyard being employed as construction foreman and O. R. Young doing the stone and tile work. This building was erected at a cost of \$53,500.00.

The Commissioners' Court of this county is very happy to inform the people of the county that this building is now ready for the use and benefit of the public, where they have provided facilities which will meet the requirements for a meeting place for any church, school, civic club and any organization, or individual group of this county. A large auditorium, stage, library, Woman's Club room, boys and girls recreation room, quarters for the American Legion, memorial room, and a large banquet hall are included in this building.

According to the provision of Article 6081e, Vernon's Annotated Texas Statute, under which Article the construction of this building was financed, the Commissioners' Court must have direct supervision

Mrs. Cora Ann Putman, 78, died at her home in Eldorado Thursday afternoon, March 24, 1949, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Methodist Church, of which she was a member, with Rev. Roy Shilling, pastor, in charge.

Pall bearers were E. W. Mund, Jim Hoover, J. E. Spencer, E. W. Brooks, H. E. Finnigan and J. M. Christian, all of Eldorado.

Miss Lucille Farmer sang a solo "Blessed Assurance", Mrs. Putman's favorite hymn, and a quartet, Willie Whitten, Nolen McDonald, Ervin Mund and Mrs. John Stigler also sang. Mrs. Joe M. Christian was organist.

Interment was made in the Eldorado Cemetery beside her husband, who died on August 29, 1916.

Cora Ann Johnson was born September 9, 1870, in Williamson County, to Mr. and Mrs. John Johnson. In her early childhood she moved with the family to Gonzales County, where she attended school and grew to womanhood. On July 18, 1894, she was married to Rufus Harvey Putman, in the Methodist Church at Cheapside, the couple being the first to wed in that church.

They began housekeeping in their home community and later buried their first child in the cemetery there.

In 1906 the Putmans moved to Eldorado, and except for the period from 1919 to 1925, when she lived in San Angelo, Mrs. Putman spent the rest of her life in Eldorado. Her husband was for many years a farmer and carpenter here.

In her early girlhood she joined the Methodist Church, moving her membership to the Eldorado church in 1925.

She was intensely devoted to her home, and for many years spent much time with the flowers and fruit trees around her house.

Survivors are a son, Clarence M. Putman, San Angelo; two daughters, Mrs. Hermon Carter of Merton and Mrs. H. H. Murchison of Eldorado; three sisters, Mrs. J. E. Conner, Kingsville, Mrs. C. F. Lee Cheapside, and Mrs. J. F. Young Galveston; and two brothers, E. S. Johnson of Abilene and T. W. Johnson of Eldorado.

## Two Audiences See Senior Class Play

A fast-moving plot and a number of comedy situations insured the success of the senior class play, "An Arizona Cowboy," which was presented to local audiences at the high school auditorium last Friday and Saturday nights. Directed by the class sponsor, Miss Gloria Henshaw the play was set in Purple Dog Arizona, and its western plot moved through the four acts to a traditional happy ending.

A western backdrop, painted by Mrs. Jack Elder, was the background of the setting for the first three acts. The outdoor setting, in addition to mesquite trees, rocks, tumbleweeds, and other western props, featured a realistic entrance to the Palace Hotel along one side of the stage. Much of the action took place around an outdoor table placed near the hotel entrance.

The last scene, laid in the cave hide-out of the villain was illuminated only by lanterns, providing an appropriately murky atmosphere for the climax of the play.

The plot centered around the efforts of the sheriff, Farley Gantt, played by David Allen, to convict the villain, Duke Blackshear (Buddy Baker), and his henchman, Grizzly Grimm, played by Kurler Mund. The sheriff's partner, Paul Quillan (Donald Ray Dannheim) became infatuated by the Duke's sister, Coralie Blackshear (Joyce Ann Van Horn), and did not find out her true character for some time. Also part of the plot was the rivalry between Fawn Afraid, an Indian maiden, played by Ebba Ann Finley, and Marguerite, a ranch owner, played by Pat Humphrey, for the affections of the sheriff. Paul Quillan befriended Young'un, 16-year-old inmate of the poor house, and finally fell in love with her.

Much of the comedy interest was provided by Hezekiah Bugg, (Harlan McAlpine), and his domineering wife, played by Mimi McAngus. Hezekiah, known as the biggest liar in Arizona, spun fantastic yarns about his own courage and exploits "back in '89" but his wife, who had to make the living for the couple, was never impressed.

Young'un (Frances Williams) changed during the play from a harrum-scarum child to a lovely young woman, the change taking place after she left the poorhouse to live on Marguerite's ranch.

Jim Martin, who was called upon to fill the part of Yow Kee at the last moment, due to the illness of Wayne McGill, played the part of the Chinese waiter with assurance and ease.

In the climax of the play Fawn Afraid was accidentally shot in the villain's hideout and her father, Big Elk, a Navajo chief (Wayne Davis) saw his only child die. The villains were taken to jail and the play ended happily for the other characters.
