

The speed indicated on the sign was determined by a scientific study of each individual curve and turn, and will vary because of the different elements such as degree each separate curve.



Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of cher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of \$15,000.00, payable serially within ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half (3-½) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of repairing and improving the Schleicher County Courthouse, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of \$25,000.00, payable serially within twenty-five (25) years, from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding four (4%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving county parks in said County, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including particularly Article 6081e, Vernon's Civil Statutes, 1925, as amended.

Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect an annual tax not exceeding five (5) cents on each one hundred dollars assessed valuation of property in said County, for the purchase and improvement of lands for use as county parks.

The said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed presiding officers for said election:

At the Court House Building, in Eldorado, Texas, Election Precinct No. 1, with tfc W. T. Whitten as Presiding Officer.






