## Scouts To Have Rec and Patrol Rooms In New Building

A large building, complete with recreation room and patrol rooms is to be provided for the Boy Scouts of Eldorado.

Half of the 100 x 20 foot barracks purchased from the building fund is already on location at the Scout lots, and the remaining half is expected at an early date. When on foundation and ready for Scout activities it will provide a large central room for general meetings and recreational events, and a mat for boxing and wrestling; four Scout patrol rooms; one (and possibly two) rooms for the Senior Air Scouts; and probably a hobby room, which will be furnished with equipment for making hobby items, and for displaying the same as desired.

Various men of Eldorado are donating labor, to help the boys stretch their building fund as far as possible. The assistance of anyone who can spare the time will be appreciated, announce the boys and additional funds will be welcome.

### Senior Troop Organized

Aris Carr was chosen leader of a newly organized Air Scout senior Boy Scout troop, at an organization meeting of the older Scouts here Friday night. Assisting with the organizing was Field Scout executive J. B. Morris, who explained qualifications and duties of boys interested in this phase of Senior Scouting.

Boys who take the course must be 15 years of age or over. They will still be considered members of Troop 18.

Leader Aris Carr will teach the boys some of the things he learned during the war. Objections of several parents to actual flying by the boys have been removed by announcement that they do not need to fly. All will take prescribed study courses, and later may fly if parents' consent is obtained.

The Air Scouts will take some of their work here, and in addition will make numerous field trips to various air fields to study planes.

If plans materialize as indicated today, a membership of 15 is to be expected — and these may be divided into two patrols.

If 15 take Senior Scout work there will be 25 remaining Scouts in Troop 18. The Scoutmaster is Pat Joiner, and assistants are Bob McWhorter, Billy Frank Blaylock and Joe Wagley.

The Scout Committee is composed of J. M. Christian, W. M. Patterson, Charlie Trigg, Dick Bearce, Don McCormick, Skeet Mace, E. W. Brooks, Jerry Pennington and Rev. Roy Shilling.

The Lions Club sponsors the organization and assists with building plans and carrying out of the year's work.

### Eldorado Band Attends Festival At Brady Recently

The Eldorado school band was among the 19 bands present for the Heart O' Texas Music Festival and Clinic held in Brady on March 5. The Brady Chamber of Commerce and the Brady schools were sponsors for the event.

In the morning, the various bands did contest work. Schulerberg won first in the beginning band division, Iraan won first in Class B, and Brady won first in class A. The Eldorado band, who played for the judges in the morning along with the other bands, are using the judges' impartial criticism to correct their weaknesses and find that this impartial judging is of great benefit.

In the afternoon, the group listened to an hour concert by the McMurry College Band, which presented novelty numbers and other entertainment to the large audience.

Each section of the band attended a class taught by an expert in that instrument. The twirlers studied with the twirling majorette from Hardin-Simmons; the brasses, with Maurice McAdoo of the North Texas State faculty; the reeds, with Mr. Dreibröd from the San Antonio high school band; and the drums, with Fred Hoey of Southern Music Co. in San Antonio.

At the conclusion of the day's activities, all of the bands present were massed into one large band and these 1200 musicians paraded, then played four numbers. The presentation of awards followed.

The entire Eldorado band made the trip to Brady on a school bus, accompanied by C. F. Jones, band director, and his wife, and Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Griggs.

Eldorado students were surprised and pleased to see Bertram Geeslin, who organized the first band in the Eldorado schools, among the band directors present at the Brady festival. Geeslin left here in 1940, and now directs the band at Burnett.

All bands in this area, including the local band, are working to prepare numbers for the state contest, which will be held April 29 and 30.

Brady plans to make the band festival and clinic an annual affair.

### Teachers Attend District Meeting At Brownwood

Almost all of the teachers of the Eldorado school system were present in Brownwood Friday morning, where the annual meeting of District 11, Texas State Teachers Association, was held. Theme for the convention, "Better teachers for better schools" was brought out by the outstanding speakers who talked to the 1500 teachers on hand for the two-day session.

No classes were held in Eldorado grade schools or high schools Friday.

Dr. Bracken, superintendent of schools at Clayton, Mo. stressed the need for better health in order to have better teachers and pupils, in the first address of the day Friday. Dr. Haskev of the University of Texas emphasized the need of respect for human personality.

In the afternoon, the teachers attended section meetings, where problems pertaining to the teaching of the various subjects were discussed, and teaching methods demonstrated.

At the night session, J. W. Edgar reported on the Gilmer Aikin committee, and the teachers went on record as approving the bill. Josh Lee, member of the Civil Aeronautics board, was the main speaker on the subject "The Sky's The Limit".

Richard West of the Dallas News stressed the need for moral integrity among teachers in a talk before the assembly Saturday morning. Dr. Kenneth Williams, who is connected with the education services of the Air Corps at Maxwell Field, Ala., said that teachers are greatly helped by continued supervision and training after they have begun to teach.

Several Eldorado teachers attended a luncheon given for members of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association while in Brownwood. The national president spoke to this group on "What Do You Have To Sell?"

Of interest to local residents is the fact that Avis Deavers, a former Eldorado business teacher, occupied the position of advertising manager for all of district 11, for the convention. Miss Deavers left here several years ago and is now head of the business administration department at the Brownwood high school. Mrs. Edgar Spencer, secretary, read the constitution, and the group voted unanimously to adopt it. The Constitution and By-Laws committee, composed of W. G. Godwin, Mrs. Archie Mittel, Mrs. Arthur Mund, Miss John Alexander, and Rev. Roy Shilling, had drafted the document, and believe that it will enable the organization to work most efficiently.

### SENIORS PRESENT WESTERN COMEDY TWICE NEXT WEEK

An old-fashioned Western comedy, with cattle rustlers, a sheriff, a love affair, and several Indians, is promised for audiences who see the senior class play, to be presented at the school auditorium next Thursday and Friday nights, March 25 and 26. Miss Gloria Henshaw, senior sponsor, is director with Betty Sue Williams as assistant.

The plot centers around a group of cattle rustlers and the efforts of the sheriff (David Allen) to catch them. His partner (Donald Dannheim) becomes infatuated with a beautiful but evil woman (Joyce Ann Van Horn), and it takes a great deal of time to convince him of his error.

Yow Kee, the Chinese waiter in the hotel, played by Wayne McGill, is always getting into trouble and tries to escape it by hiding under tables. Harlan McAlpine plays Hezekiah Bugg, who is the biggest liar in Arizona and also has the most domineering wife (Mimi McAngus).

Two unusual scenes are used in the four-act comedy. The first scene, which is used for the first three acts of the play, shows the front porch of the Palace Hotel in Purple Dog, Arizona. The seniors plan to build a platform at one side of the stage, which will form the porch of the hotel, and will paint a backdrop of mountainous scenery. Several trees and a stump will complete the setting for these acts.

The last scene, which takes place inside a cave in that vicinity, will be formed by wire screen, bent in to the proper shape, and covered with brown paper. Dim lighting will provide the proper atmosphere. Dale Waddell and his partner will play guitar and fiddle music between the third and fourth acts, while the scenery is being shifted. ### Latin-American Dies at Age 97

A 97-year-old Mexican woman, one of the first settlers in the Eldorado Latin American community, and mother of 24 children, passed away quietly Wednesday at 9:25 a. m., after a week's confinement to her bed, preceded by three years of illness, during which she was confined to her house and yard.

Mrs. Anastacia Hernandez Alvarado will be buried in the Eldorado cemetery this afternoon, March 17, 1949, the Rev. Darrell Tapley, Mission Baptist pastor, in charge of funeral services at the Mission Baptist Church.

The time of the funeral could not be set this morning, until the arrival of a daughter from Old Mexico, whom Nicolas Robledo, a son-in-law, is meeting in Eagle Pass. The deceased had been a member of the Catholic Church until three years ago, when she joined the new Baptist Church built to serve the community.

She was born in Queretaro, Mexico, in 1852, the daughter of native Mexicans — her father, a Cherokee Indian, her mother a young woman of French and Spanish descent. Several of the 24 children born to her were native Mexicans.

In 1898 the family came to Texas, and lived at various times in San Antonio, Austin, Wichita Falls, and Del Rio before coming to Eldorado in 1911.

When they and a few other Mexican families settled here, they lived in tents, building houses later as they could do so. Her family built what is thought to be the first house in the Latin American community.

Occasionally the family joined the ranks of migrant laborers, but most of the time they remained here.

She developed a wide reputation in Schleicher County for her love of color, which she expressed in planting and cultivating of flower gardens which were a riot of color; and in needlework, into which she wove the rich combinations of colors which are the pride of all Latin Americans. She also did a great deal of crocheting.

She worked for ten years for the late Mrs. Kate Robinson, pioneer Eldorado business woman, and for Mrs. Sam Jones and others.

Of unusual interest to all who knew her is the fact that her eyesight remained good. She could still thread a needle without glasses when she took to her bed last week.

She was known as a kind friend to her neighbors and the entire Mexican community.

Most of her 24 children preceded her in death. The living include Mrs. Marcelina Gomez Ramon, Mrs. Manuela Alvarado Minor, Mrs. Maria Robledo Cardona and Mrs. Nicolas Robledo of Eldorado, and two who live in Mexico. Surviving also are her 3rd husband, Pedro Alvarado, age about 79, 43 grandchildren, and 24 great grandchildren.
