## ICE STORM

(Continued from Page 1)

### Shell Lines Out

The Shell telephone service is being restored in record time, due to the fact that Company officials anticipated the trouble and placed men in strategic places in this district before the ice formed. W. T. Huber and another Shell telephone maintenance man went to Big Lake. Walter Humes and two others were stationed at Eldorado and Tony Lynn of Houston went to Menard. The two main lines, each with three-way service, went out Tuesday night. Acting on Company orders the trouble shooters started out at daylight. Their repairs are temporary and breaks must be permanently repaired later. Fortunately there has been no pipe line trouble during the ice storm.

### Utilities Report Damage

The West Texas Utilities report a primary line down in the negro district where the company has eight customers, and repairs could not be made until daylight came today.

Yesterday several 2,300 volt lines were out, and several 110 volt lines, but all are in working condition today. Local manager Jerry Pennington states that some repairs will have to be made as soon as construction crews can be released for the job.

### REA Service Out

REA service may be restored to many customers by noon, reports REA Manager Don McCormick. He states that he hopes service can be completely restored by Saturday. Repair men are working today on a break in the line in Eldorado.

The only area yesterday which had disrupted REA service was the Reynolds community, where ice was several times thicker than it was in Eldorado. There were two line breaks on line three, which serves that community. Two overhead quides by the Reynolds school house were broken. A crew of men from the local office was out Wednesday and repaired all of the broken lines, and service was restored to the area by nightfall, but the melting ice caused heavy damage during the night.
