Lions Club

Fifty-seven members were present when the Lions Club met yesterday noon at the Eldo Hotel with Lion President Reynolds in charge.

Lion Fred Watson, who attended a Boys Ranch meeting Sunday, reported on the financial aspect of the Ranch set-up. Schleicher county is being asked for a total of \$2,500 as its part to make the Ranch a going concern. It is proposed to raise most of this money in the form of pledges—a citizen pledging \$1 per month for three years. Pledge cards will be passed out and solicitation for funds will begin in the near future. The drive for funds will be county-wide and everyone will be given an opportunity to pledge or to make cash contributions.

Rev. Roy Shilling reported on the formation of a county welfare association and stated that it was off to a good start.

Banquet Room
With the present attendance crowding every inch of space in the Eldo dining room, it was reported that this space will not be available for meetings much longer, and discussion centered around the feasibility of holding meetings in the new county memorial building, where a banquet room has been provided for the use of Schleicher county organizations. The room has been built, but has not been furnished, and the members discussed several methods of helping to furnish it.

"There is no such thing as a Lions Club room" in the county building," one member pointed out. The Club hopes to have the opportunity to use the new building for its meetings, on an equal—not exclusive—basis with all other Eldorado organizations.

It was suggested that the Lions make whatever donation they could directly to the Commissioners' Court, which would be charged with the responsibility of completing and furnishing the various rooms. The matter will be discussed further at next week's meeting.

ASH WEDNESDAY FORMALLY OPENS PRE-EASTER LENTEN SEASON WHICH CULMINATES IN EASTER, APRIL 17

Lent opened Wednesday, ushering in the 40-day pre-Easter season, in which the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ are observed throughout the Christian world. Yesterday was Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Easter will be 40 days later, not counting Sundays, or April 17 this year.

Predominance of Protestant denominations which do not fast during this season causes the Lenten period to pass here quietly, as local Protestant churches observe the season only with spiritual preparation for Easter. In predominantly Catholic and Lutheran areas of the United States those churches' stress of fasting, or one dinner per day, throughout the sea-

First Co. Welfare Board Is Organized In Eldorado

Eldorado's first county-wide welfare organization is now a reality.

At an organizational meeting held last Saturday afternoon in the First Baptist Church, representatives elected officers, named the objectives of the organization, chose a name for the group, appointed committees, and made plans for the new organization's first year of service among the needy of the county.

W. G. Godwin, County Agent, and representative to the organization from the Methodist Church, was elected president. Mrs. Kenneth Cheek, representative from the First Baptist Church, is vice president; Mrs. J. E. Spencer, PTA representative, is secretary; and Mrs. A. J. Mund, Woman's Club representative, is treasurer.

Objective of the organization, as approved by the group, is "to give immediate and urgent relief to Schleicher County people, and if deemed necessary by the investigating committee, to give aid to transients."

"Schleicher County Welfare Association" is the official name chosen by the group.

One of the most important committees named at the meeting was the Investigating Committee, which will investigate all reports of need and make recommendations for action to the entire group. W. M. Patterson is chairman, and other members are Mrs. Leslie Baker and Don McCormick.

No less important is the Campaign Committee, which will decide upon a course of action to raise money for the Association for the year. This group includes W. G. Godwin, Marvin McAngus, and Mrs. Bailey Montgomery.

Members of the committee to draft and constitution and by-laws are W. G. Godwin, Mrs. Archie Mittel, Mrs. Arthur Mund, Miss John Alexander, and Rev. Roy Shilling.

Credit for organizing the Association should go to the Lions Club, where various members introduced the idea of a welfare board, pointing out the need for an agency with funds and authority to take care of the various cases of need which arise in the county each year. A committee composed of Rev. Jim Hays, Rev. Roy Shilling, and W. M. Patterson was named as a Lions steering committee to direct organization of the new group.

Both Hays and Shilling, while not members of the Association itself, have agreed to continue acting as organizing officers until the constitution and by-laws have been adopted.

One representative to the Association was appointed by the president of each club, church, and other group in Schleicher County. In addition to the four officers mentioned above, representatives, comprising the Board of Directors to serve for one year, include:

Up until this time, there has been no place where residents could report cases of need, although various county officials, business men, and church groups have done as much as they could with money from their own pockets. The Association, with funds contributed from the whole county, will be able to do a thorough job of investigating each case, and will have money to work with when it is needed.

The group are planning to have a campaign for funds in the near future, and hope to raise enough money in the drive to last the rest of the year. It is pointed out that

all money contributed will be used for cases of actual want and need, since all the members of the board are serving without pay. Funds contributed by individuals can be taken off income taxes for this year, because the organization is a charitable one.

Members of the Association urge each Schleicher County resident to give his support to this newly-organized group, not only with a check each year but also in reporting cases of need to the Association.
