Pumping Stations Close During May

Humble Pipeline stations A and B, in Schleicher and Sutton counties, will close through May, announce company officials. Half of each crew of 16 men will be on vacation at a time through the month, the remaining half spending their time on repairs and maintenance. The line has been carrying about 80,000 barrels per month and the shutdown will cause a 50% decrease in flow. The line originates near Big Lake and ends at Ingleside, on the coast.

AAA Requests Data On Cotton, Wheat For Price Support

Farmers and ranchers who do not turn in crop acreage figures to the AAA office will not be eligible for price support on cotton and wheat this year, states Eddie Brown, administrator of the local AAA office.

"Many farmers have not turned in their crop acreage history for the years of 1945-46-47-48-49 to us," states Brown, "therefore they will not receive a cotton or wheat allotment and consequently will get no price support when they market their crop. This history is also important because there will probably be oat allotments in the near future."

The personnel of the Schleicher County AAA office is endeavoring to obtain the history of all farm land in the county, so that they may establish fair and just allotments; however, it is the responsibility of each farmer to bring this information to them.

AAA workers state that if anyone has trouble in filling out these forms, they will be glad to help him.

SAYLES INJURED

Mrs. L. M. Sayles has received word that her husband, who drives a truck for Western Drilling, injured his back last week end while loading the truck, and is in the Bell clinic at Monahans. Sayles was working with a crew at Fort Stockton when the accident happened. He sustained a back injury a number of years ago and the new injury may have been caused from weakened muscles. According to latest reports, Sayles is resting well and tests and x-rays are being made to determine the extent and seriousness of his injury. Doctors could not say when he would be able to leave the hospital.

Turner Completes 10-Weeks Training

Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, Calif.—Marine Private First Class Floyce C. Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Turner, Eldorado Texas has recently completed his initial 10-weeks of training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, California.

Upon completion of this training Turner was promoted to the rank of Private First Class, an honor that is bestowed upon every man who finishes his training with a clean record.

The Eldorado devildog spent his first three weeks of training here at the post where he received small arms, first aid, field sanitation map reading, military courtesy and infantry drill instruction.

The following three weeks the young Marine spent the Marine rifle range where for two weeks he was taught the fundamental principles of marksmanship and during the third week he made practical use of his training by firing the Marine Corps basic weapon, the M-1 rifle for a record score.

The new Private 1st Class spent his last four weeks in the Recruit Depot "boning" on additional subjects necessary to a Marine. These included bayonet fighting, combat formations of a rifle squad, digging of fox holes and a series of field problems where practical experience was gleaned through the application of classroom work.

Upon his return here after leave Turner will be transferred to one of the many duty stations where Marines stand always ready to protect their country in time of need.

Bond Election Set For Saturday, 28th

As the result of presentation of a petition circulated by Edwin Jackson and others and signed by 106 qualified voters, the school board ordered a \$475,000 bond election for school improvement at their regular meeting Monday night.

The petition as circulated and presented to the board calls for a new high school building and extensions and improvements in the entire system.

The board set the election date for May 28, at one voting box only, the courthouse, Walter Ramsay to be presiding election judge.

Present at the Monday night meeting were representatives of two bonding companies, Dewar, Robinson and Pancoast, represented by Chester Wheeler of Eldorado, and R. K. Dunbar and Co., represented by Jack Brown of San Angelo.

The contract would call for their handling of the legal procedure and purchase of bonds at the interest rates of 2½ percent on the first \$66,000, 3½ percent on the next \$103,000, and balance at 3½ percent. The last \$100,000 would be callable after five years at \$102,000 and all is optional at the end of 15 years.

The crowded condition of the school and the urgent need of repairs and improvements on the property caused the voters to circulate the petition for the election.

According to census figures for the coming year there should be at least eleven and possibly twelve sections for the first six grades. The increasing enrollment necessitates provision of additional classrooms, especially in the grades, if the school is to meet the educational standards set by the state department of education.

Details of the building plan will be worked out during the spring. It is understood by all that there may be changes in the Latin American school facilities, under new rulings made by the state.

The bond issue would NOT be a tax-levying issue, as the required \$1.50 tax rate already exists, as the result of the vote last year.

Mrs. Wilson to Handle Alarm Calls

Under an agreement made this week between Schleicher County and the City of Eldorado, Mrs. Bertha Wilson has been employed to handle fire alarms and any emergency calls for which the fire department is needed. The county and city will each pay \$25 to make up the salary.

Mrs. Wilson's number is 24242. When the fire alarm sounds the public is urged not to call this number for information, as this interferes with the work of the fire department.

Emergency calls were previously handled by Mr. and Mrs. Grover Lee Johnson, who have moved to Ozona.

Employment of a person or family to take care of fire and emergency calls was made necessary by the installation of dial equipment which eliminated the Eldorado central operator.

First Lions Luncheon In Banquet Hall

Practically all equipment needed was in place when the Lions Club held its first meeting in the new memorial building banquet hall Wednesday noon, 51 attending. The new equipment already delivered and in use includes 61 folding chairs, banquet tables which fold, silver, dishes, glasses, and some cooking utensils.

The club received with gratitude a check for \$5 from Mrs. Martha Jarvis, of Tampa, Florida, who asked that it be used for a chair in memory of her husband, first Shell engineer here, and an active Lion during his period of residence in Schleicher County.

Entertainment included a reading by Jerry Johnson, son of Mrs. Lavelle Meckel, and a talk by Bill Hall of San Angelo on the work of Alcoholics Anonymous. Reports from convention delegates were made.

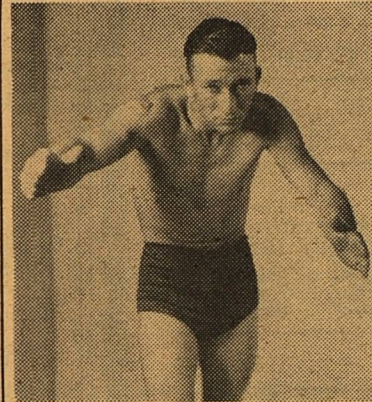

TWO NEW PRODUCERS EXPECTED IN FIELD EAST OF ELDORADO

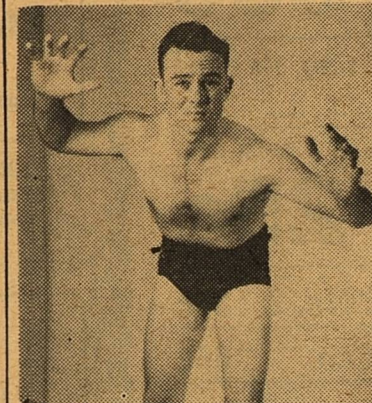

and when attempting to leave
the building, fainted, and
crashed into the glass door,
sustaining severe head and
facial cuts.

A nurse who witnessed the
accident summoned a doctor,
who sewed up the cuts, which
include a deep cut on his head,
another gash extending across
his forehead and down his face,
a deep cut from ear to ear, and
numerous other smaller lacer-
ations. As the wounds bled pro-
fusely the fact that doctors
were near at hand may have
saved his life.

Both he, his wife and their
fine new son expect to return
home this week.

Pioneer Resident Dies Suddenly Here

Herman H. Hooker, 75, died sud-
denly in Eldorado at 7:30 Wednes-
day morning of a heart attack. He
had not been ill, and his death came
as a shock to relatives and friends.

Funeral services will be held at
the Presbyterian Church at 4:00
Friday afternoon, the pastor, Rev.
F. E. King, conducting the serv-
ices, and interment will be made in
the Eldorado Cemetery.

He was born in Johnston County,
Texas, on January 8, 1874, and in
early boyhood moved to Sterling
City where he lived until 1924, when
he moved to Eldorado. His mar-
riage to Miss Mabel Gilmore took
place in Sterling City.

After moving here he bought the
Eldo Hotel, operating it until 1937
when he sold it and moved to San
Angelo; there he operated a cafe
for one year, moved to Sterling
City to live for a short time, and
returned to Eldorado where he has
since lived.

He was a member of the Metho-
dist Church and of the Masonic
Lodge.

Survivors include his wife; five
daughters, Mrs. Clyde Everett of
Sterling City, Mrs. M. O. Shaeffer
of San Angelo, Mrs. Jack Mims of

Business Census To Include Schleicher

Urban D. Welch of the San An-
gelo district office of the govern-
ment bureau of census, Department
of Commerce, will be in Schleicher
County the latter part of this week
to take a business census of the
county.

The Bureau of Census is taking
a business census of the U. S., in
order to bring their records up to
date on the types and number of
businesses in the country. The last
census was taken in 1939. It is plan-
ned to take a business census every
five years hereafter.

The information received will be
of great help to manufacturers who
can predict where their products
will sell best, as a result of the
census figures, and can therefore
concentrate factories and distrib-
uting points in those areas. The low-
ering of distributing costs will
mean an eventual lowering of the
sales price, and a saving to the
consumer.

Each business house will be asked
for information as to the number
on the payroll, the gross receipts,
etc. The government is not inter-
ested in the amount of profit of the
businesses, and all information is
strictly confidential and cannot be
used for taxation purposes. Mr.
Welch is a bonded government
worker, who is sworn to secrecy.

W. L. Roy Wellborne, assistant
district supervisor of the San An-
gelo district Bureau of Census, was
in Eldorado and in other towns in
the district to announce the coming
business census and to complete all
plans. There are 27 counties in the
San Angelo district.

Welch is from Christoval and is
well known here. He is related to
several Eldorado families.

hilarious entertainment.

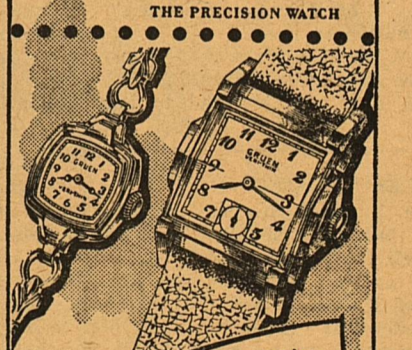

Resists Pressure To Vote For Wood Bill

By Cong. O. C. Fisher
Ten House Members became eligible for membership in the mythical "Flip-Flop club" last week when they voted one day for the Wood labor bill (which passed by a vote of 217-to-203) and then on the following day flopped over and voted to kill the bill they had approved the day before. They were admittedly under terrific pressure, the President even threatening to cut off patronage from those who did not stand pat for the Lesinski bill.

After the House voted to okay the Wood measure (which contains about 75% of the Taft-Hartley law), on the following day the reversal occurred, sending the whole thing back to the labor committee by a three-vote margin, presumably for further study.

The Lesinski bill, for which the Wood bill was substituted on the floor, would have repealed the Taft-Hartley law, re-enacted the old Wagner Act, and would have repealed all State laws on the closed shop and prohibited future ones from being enacted by the States. It was a close call and a hard fight to substitute the Wood bill and thereby prevent a complete break-down of our laws controlling and restricting the activities of labor unions as well as those of employers. Texans in Congress were sharply divided on the question of killing the Lesinski bill with the Wood substitute. Nine voted to keep the Lesinski bill alive by voting against the Wood bill.

I joined with ten other Texans in voting for the Wood bill, thereby voting to retain some controls over unions as well as management and against rubbing out our State laws on the subject of the closed shop.

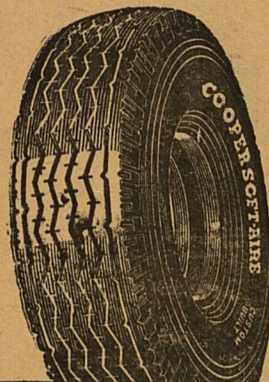

Public Land Still For Sale In Texas

(Austin—State Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, states there is still public land for sale in Texas. However, not much of it, as Texans measure land. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,025,875 acres. (The total acreage of the state is 172,687,000.)

The unsold land includes 164 acres in Sutton County. Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain is administered by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman.

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," Giles points out.

When there is sufficient demand, the School Land Board authorizes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale is advertised and information about the tracts supplied by the General Land Office upon request. Sale is by sealed bids. The high bidder, if conforming with all regulations, is the new owner.

The terms are 20 per cent down with 40 years to retire the balance at five per cent interest. The Permanent School Fund retains one-sixteenth free royalty in all oil production and one-eighth free royalty in sulphur production.

Edwards Plateau Sheep Discussed In National Magazine

The recent change from sheep-for-wool to mutton producing herds in the Southwest threatens to destroy the area as a dependable source of supply for the nation's wool buyers, according to Country Gentleman, national farm magazine.

Demands for lambs and sheep for eating purposes are fast transforming the Southwest herds from fine-wool Merino, Rambouillet and Delaine to Suffolks, Lincolns, Hamshires and Southdowns.

Because of this trend, the story says, wool buyers who once could depend on pig-in-a-poke buying in the area now need to inspect carefully all purchases to insure the purity of the wool fibres.

H. F. Schlemmer, author of the story, says, "although we have seen a lot of changes in farming and ranching during the past 25 years, none has taken place as suddenly as this one." Already in Texas' Edwards plateau area, he said, 40 per cent of all the ewes are reported being bred to English mutton type or dual-purpose rams, upsetting a pattern standardized in the Southwest for over 80 years.

British breeds had to be imported because the best meat-producing sheep are rare in the U. S. The story says the Texas ranchers have faced as great a problem trying to acclimate the British sheep to the rigors of our plains as the wool buyers have had trying to adapt themselves to the changes necessitated by the diminishing supply of pure wool from the Southwest.

Although the article explains the need and the logic for the sudden change, it warns against complete turnover in the event the meat demand decreases.

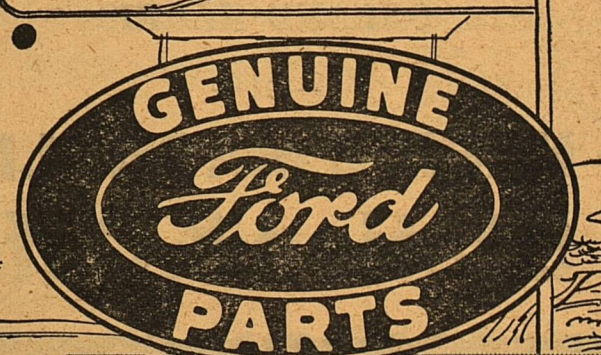

Pastel crepe paper and balloons in pastel shades carried out the spring theme in the dance room. Punch and cookies were served later in the evening.

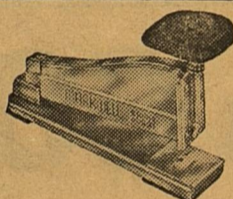

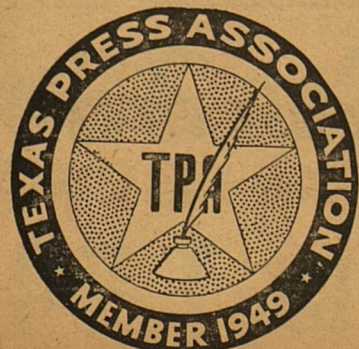
