REV. JOHNSON HOLDS REVIVAL, OPENING SUNDAY

Rev. Ray Johnson, popular Methodist pastor from First Church, San Angelo, will make a return visit to Eldorado Sunday to open at 8-day revival at the Eldorado Methodist Church.

Rev. Johnson, well known throughout the Southwest as an outstanding speaker and evangelist, needs no introduction to people of Eldorado, as he conducted a successful revival here last fall, and has appeared on the platform as speaker on other occasions in this city.

Rev. Roy Shilling, pastor of the local Methodist church, who is in general charge of the revival, announces that Rev. Johnson will be in the pulpit Sunday night, June 19, and will preach each night thereafter, closing the revival with the June 26 night service.

Next Sunday morning Rev. Fred Brucks, district superintendent of San Angelo, will preach in the absence of Rev. Shilling, who will spend the week end at Kerrville with a Methodist youth planning group.

Services during the revival will be held at night only, opening at 8 o'clock.

His brother, Sam McDonald of LaFeria, is here for a several weeks visit and will help him celebrate his birthday, and a number of other relatives are expected during the day.

WILDCAT, OFFSET RE-ACIDIZING IN OIL NEWS

A wildcat, an offset, and re-acidizing of a producer are in the oil news this week, as the county's oil activity widens out into new territory.

Tom Henderson's place will again provide the site for a wildcat, location for which was made by a Globe Oil Co. surveyor Tuesday. This location is in what is known as the north Schleicher pasture, on the east side, near the old Russell well, drilled about ten years ago and reported at that time to have had an oil showing.

Lovelace Test
A shallow test which if successful would mean much to Schleicher County, will be made as an offset to the Lovelace well, which was brought in recently as a small producer.

Morgan and Groehl have made a location on Lovelace land, 467 feet from west line and 467 feet from South line of Survey 4, block M, which will make it a diagonal offset (less than an offset) between the well and the southwest corner of the block.

Scheduled depth of 1,000 feet will provide additional interest in this test. It is hoped to pick up a lime encountered in the Lovelace producer (6 or 8 barrels per day) at about 950 feet, which is the reason why the new test is less than an offset away from the No. 1 Lovelace.

Should this test make a producer, at scheduled depth of 1,000 feet or less, it would create extensive activity in that part of the county, as it would stimulate drilling over a larger area.

Skelly Re-acidized
Skelly has centered their efforts in the past week on their Skelly No. 1 Mary L. Jackson, which was brought in this spring, later put on a pump, now pumping about 50 barrels of oil per day.

Re-acidizing of this test has been completed and the crew are swabbing to recover old oil and acid. If natural flow is established officials will consider their efforts well worthwhile; if not it will be placed again on the pump, probably as a better producer.

It is understood that should new tests be made in that area, the locations will be determined by the outcome of their work on Skelly-Mary L. Jackson No. 1—and the coming few weeks should provide more oil news from that field.

Producers in County
In addition to the 35 to 40 oil producers and gassers on Page and Koy ranches, production has previously been established in other tests in Schleicher county as follows: Lovelace, a few barrels; Ohio-Baugh, a wildcat, about 52 barrels; Sadie Weddell, on extreme edge of county, a small pumper; Tom Henderson's, a gas-er.

Architects Employed To Plan New School

A firm of architects was employed, a site for the new high school building was selected, and other tentative decisions on related questions were made at a meeting of the Board of Education Monday.

Of the numerous decisions which must be arrived at in the coming year, during which a \$475,000 building program will be carried out, one, the employing of an architect, came first.

The group selected the Abilene firm of David Castle and Son, with whom they had worked preceding last year's school election. Some of the plans presented by the Castles at that time will be used, and others discarded or changed to meet the latest needs of the growing school.

The architects have built or have under construction, new elementary schools at Ozona and Big Lake, high school at Monahans, a \$1,000,000 hospital at Midland, and many buildings at the three colleges at Abilene—also have put up such older buildings as the gym at Sonora, and high schools at McCamey, Big Lake and Barnhart.

The architects had received outlines of Schleicher County's school building needs, and at Monday's meeting presented sketches, to be re-worked and revised into plans. These sketches will be presented again at the next meeting of the board.

Site Selected

There was much discussion preceding and during the board meeting concerning the advisability of building the new high school on another site, on land to be purchased for that purpose in another block.

After discussion of various sites, and the pro and con of using a new location, it was decided, considering purchase price, difficulties in gymnasium and cafeteria set-ups, etc., to build the high school on the part of the present grounds selected last year: along the Mertzon highway facing the Bauer residence.

Elementary Extension

The grade school extension will be added on the east side of the old grade building. It will form an ell with the present building and will probably contain a number of classrooms, cafeteria, restrooms, and other rooms needed. Plans for this extension have not been completed to date.

It is expected that the extension will be built first, though this is not definite at this time.

The grade building will be repaired and improved also, as a part of the school project.

Six-Hour Meeting

The general public may gain an idea of the planning time which the board must devote to the project, from the fact that members were in session for six hours last Monday!

The details of the entire project must be worked out with the architects, who will be here again next Monday to meet with the board.

First REA Line Built in Crockett

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-op has completed a line to the T. Albert Bailey and Brock Jones ranches in Crockett County. This is the first REA line to be built and energized in Crockett county.

The Co-op has over thirty miles of line staked and right of way cleared in the Southeast part of Crockett County, this being part of Sonora Juno lines, on which new bids will be opened about July.

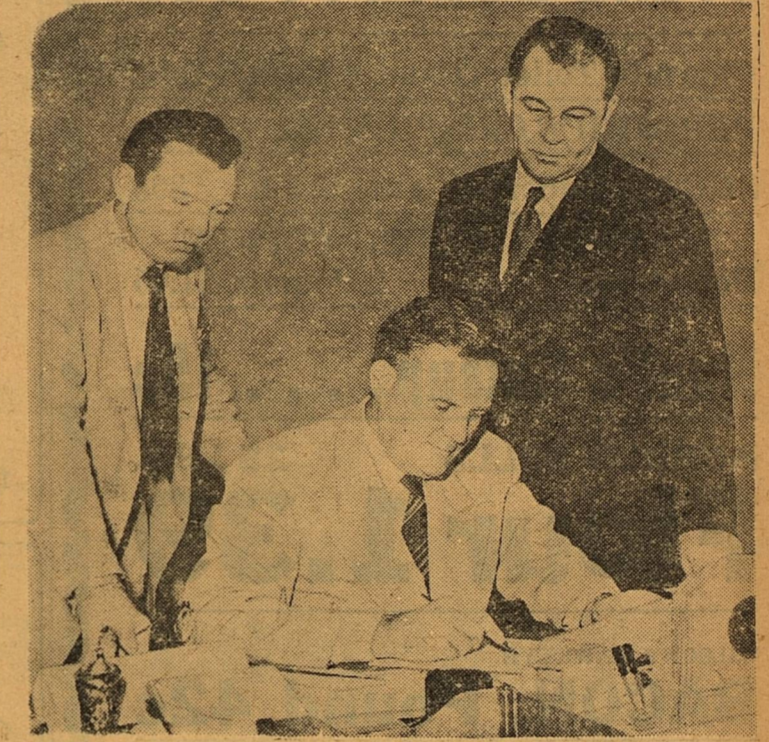
4-H BOYS ATTEND DISTRICT ENCAMPMENT

Senator James E. Taylor of Kerens, pictured on Jester's left, sponsored the legislation through the Senate. House sponsor was Phillip L. Willis of Kaufman. Covered by the law are all public officers of the state, counties, cities, and school districts. Governor Jester signed the bill into law June 8, and it became immediately effective.

ROADS IMPROVED IN PRECINCT 4; PRE. 1 IS NEXT

After another week of road work in Precinct 1, the Schleicher county road equipment will be moved to Precinct 4, announce the commissioners' and County Judge C. L. Meador, Jr., who made plans for the summer road work schedule at the regular meeting of Commissioners' Court Monday.

While the main Bailey Ranch road is not included in recent improvements, it is scheduled for working in the future.

The Ozona road has been worked almost to the county line, and now goes through to Jim Willoughby's, Milton Baugh's and Henry Speck's. About a week's work remains in that locality before the equipment is moved.

In Precinct 4, the improvement program will include the present main road, and other roads leading west, many following old lanes—the entire schedule to include calicheing of as many as funds will pay for.

It is expected that in the coming six months noticeable improvements will be completed in the county's road system, due to the fact that the county now has better road equipment.

Garbage Collection May Be Financed By Small Meter Fee

A city election has been set for June 30 at the City Hall, to determine whether water meters should be assessed an additional small amount to pay expenses of regular garbage collection.

It is explained that a 25c fee would take care of collections in the residential areas, for service twice a month. The business houses would be assessed a maximum of \$1.00, scaled down to a much lower figure in some cases, for daily collection.

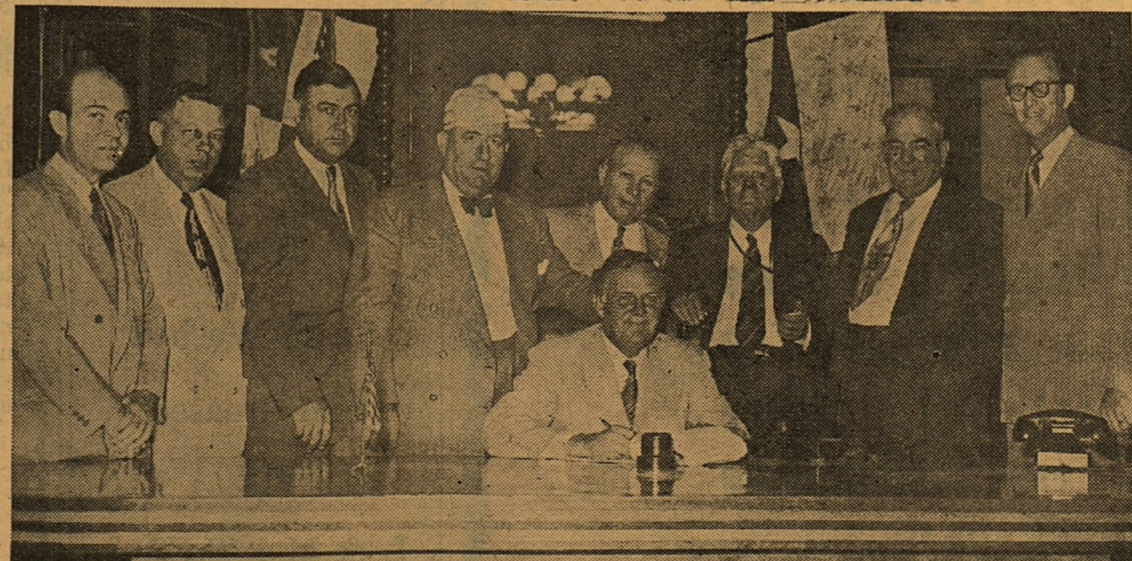
The small fees assessed for this collection service would take care of the expense of employing a responsible collector regularly for the job.

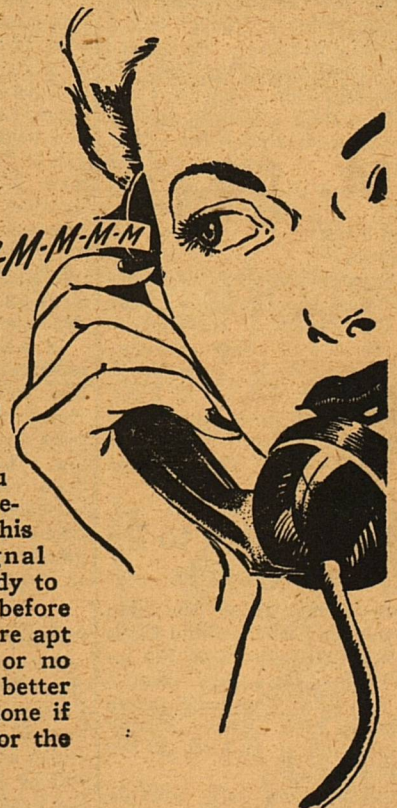

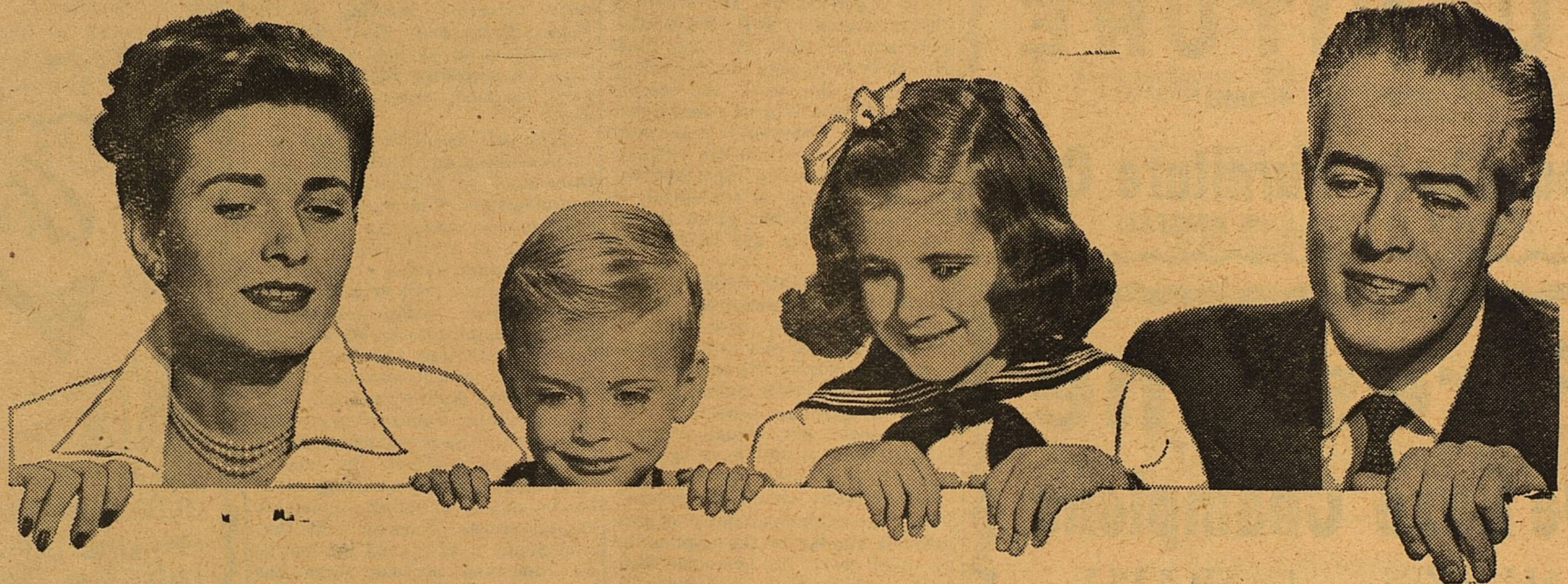

Fly Spraying Should Include Clean-Up, Says Health Officer

During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, many Civic Organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended. However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed? Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of toilet water to overcome B.O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

Washington News Letter

At this season of the year thousands of people, including many Texans, route their vacation travels through the Nation's capitol. A million people visit the National Art Gallery annually, and Dr. Luther Evans, himself a native Texan, and Librarian of the Library of Congress, says more than a million Americans viewed the interior of the Library of Congress last year. Exhibits there include such immortal documents as the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence. An even greater number tramp through the corridors of the Capitol building.

Speaking of the the Capitol, the building will be practically closed to sight-seers after July first when construction begins on the re-roofing of the House and Senate wings. The old roofs were condemned some years ago and have been supported temporarily by rather unsightly steel superstructures. While this work is going on the House will meet in a spacious caucus room in the Office Building and the Senate will carry on in the small room which years ago was the Senate chamber. That was before the Senate wing of the capitol was built. The space was then used by the Supreme Court until 1935 when the new Supreme Court building was constructed. Since then the old chamber has been preserved as a historic memento of bygone days. It was in there that Lincoln delivered his Emancipation Proclamation and Daniel Webster proclaimed the constitution.



Pointers For Better Pastures Given

Schleicher county ranchers are well aware that better pasture means better stock, and consequently bigger profits. Good pasture grasses, however, have a pretty tough time of it fighting their way through weeds. And many times weeds win out in the plant war.

Mowing is generally considered a good practice for getting rid of the weeds in pastures. Mowing the brush, brambles, vines and the husky weeds that spring up on newly-cleared, fertile land puts them on the way out and gives the desirable pasture grasses a good chance to take over.

At the same time, mowing pastures freshens the over-grown, stemmy grasses. But, often, too much is expected of weed eradication by mowing, especially on poor-land pastures.

Pasture weed control in the humid regions of Texas usually calls for fertilizing, and in some cases reseeding. Until the pasture grasses are thrifty enough to replace mowed weeds, mowing is hardly worthwhile.

If you're going to mow to control weeds, mowing must start when the first of the worst weeds begin to bloom, or soon enough to mow all of them before the seed can form. Bitterweed, a common pest in bermuda grass pastures, may hold enough vitality to mature seed from the bloom even after it has been mowed. So the way to stop this. Lancaster says, is to mow early and often. Cut high enough the first time so the sprouting stubble can be mowed again and again as it blooms repeatedly.

Clovers volunteer best in short grass. The fall clover stand and spring lespedeza stand in permanent pastures depend largely on enough sunlight for germination and growth of the seedlings. This indicates close grazing or mowing in both seasons to favor these crops.

Grazing too close in both fall and spring might injure the pasture. To avoid this, two pastures might be grazed alternately.
