#### BIRTHDAY PARTY

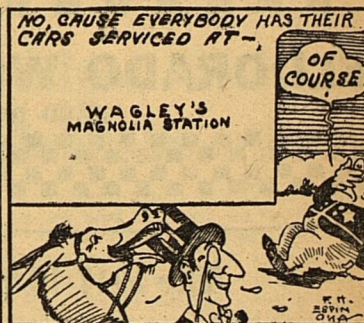
