SEVERAL NEW **OIL WELLS DUE** TO COME IN

> Two new Koy wells, both of which promise to be good produc-Much interest centers around the

Groebl-Koy, a semi-wildcat, which if it makes a producer, will extend the field three quarters of a mile north. Pipe has been cemented at around 6750. The Schlumberger test was made in the open hole, pipe was set, and a gambora test

made inside the pipe. Unofficial reports indicate that the well is logging higher than the last Koy tests in the proved field and that it looks like a good well. Perforating and acidizing will probably be week end jobs on this test, and the coming few days may

"tell the story." (Location of above - CNW SW 34-L-GH and SA - Groebl No. 1 Jess Koy).

George D. Morgan of San Angelo, trustee No. 2c Jess Koy (C SE NW 38-L-GH & SA), tested in the lower zone, was squeezed off when oil and water were encountered, and will be tested in higher pay. This test looks promising according to today's reports. The derrick will be moved soon from this test to 3c Koy, which is ready for the rotary, and other locations have been made. **Two Wildcats**

The surface hole in No. 1 Hayden Baugh Estate, (660 SE 8M GH & SA, on a 7800 A block), has been dug and pipe cemented, in preparation for arrival of the rotary this week. The wildcat is 41/2 miles northeast of the Koy wells, and is being drilled by Al Groebl.

The water well has been dug on the Luke Robinson wildcat, and surface hole is being spudded in since Tuesday. Agent Recommends Skies are cloudy and light rains **DDT As Fly Killer**

A nationwide drive is underway to kill out millions of pests that have been hampering health since Adam and Eve. Flies are the pests, and DDT is the weapon. W. G. Godwin, County Agent, states that the people of Schleicher County, both urban and rural, have never had

the chance they have this spring to make war on flies. DDT has proved Section C, starting at Tom Wilton's itself a fly killer.

Recent research has shown that pasture north of town and extend-ing to the H. C. Williams ranch toward Christoval. The first strip of twenty-three and one half miles around places where the flies rest. Not only should producers spray their sheds, barns, pens, pig pens and cow lots, but city officials are urged to spray garbage cans, curbsand gutters, stock yards and other places where flies swarm. New Highway Ruling May Effect County A new ruling on farm to market

The State Highway Commission has released details of a new statewide policy on Farm to Market roads, which will permit an expansion of the present state operated Farm to Market Road Program. It was explained in the Highway Commission's new policy that the Federal Funds made available by the Postwar Highway Act of 1944

for the construction of Secondary FOR RENT-Three room house or Farm to Market Roads, covering a three year period, have all been earmarked for specific roads throughout the state. Approximately one-half of this work has been placed under contract and, conse-quently, no additional funds from this source are now available.

He said, "Two additional laws vere passed that will tend to yield additional revenues for Farm to Market Roads on the county level. One of these covered the distribution of the surplus of the one cent of the gasoline tax that goes to the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness. This law will tend to give more money from this source to the smaller counties of Texas.
