Guidance Clinic **Held Here Tuesday**

The San Angelo College guidance service for high school graduates was brought to Eldorado on Tuesday, March 15, by Harold F. Bright Director of Guidance and Registrar and Mrs. Maxine Yearwood, Dean of Women.

This personal guidance counseling follows last week's preference test given to the same group Harold Barnes, Director of Public Relations for San Angelo College.

The Kuder Preference Test used to measure the interests students and to compare them with the interests of persons already in various vocational fields. The tests help him to determine the sort of job for which he should prepare.

Preparation for many vocations includes training beyond high school. West Texans have a college of high standing near home: San Angelo College.

Child Guidance **Extension Class Finish Course**

Dr. J. B. Speer, director of public relations and extension work at Sul Ross, closed his extension class in Eldorado Thursday night.

In appreciation of his services and of the benefit derived by those who completed the class work, the group presented him with a fullsize El Dorado blanket for himself and a smaller one for his grandchild, and also insisted that he keep the lecture stand provided for his use here. Several members of the class served refreshments at this closing meeting.

About 25 have been taking the course on Child Guidance, listed in the Sul Ross catalog as Education 431. Many enrolled for graduate credit, a few for undergraduate. and several for aid in rearing their family and for self-improvement.

Throughout the course Dr. Speer stressed the importance of use of various guidance techniques in teaching children at school or in the

Dr. Speer also mentioned often the importance of a world outlook for the citizen of the future. "It isn't enough that he learn to be a citizen of his home community or state - he must develop a world outlook; unless our citizenry will learn to be world citizens, we will eventually be outclassed," he stat-

ed.
"The reason for the need of world training is the fact that new means of transportation have made all nations neighbors."

If you have only one train a day, you seldom expect to see

That fact was brought forcibly home last week to Eldoradoans and especially to two Eldorado women whose car collided with the daily train at the Rudd Road-Latin American settlement crossing; in the second it takes the engine to cross the road, the car managed to be there.

Mrs. Tom Johnson, owner of the car, was taking some of her prized china out to the ranch of Mrs. Robert Milligan, who is interested in china painting, and who owns her own kiln. Mrs. J. D. Ashmore was accompanying her as her

The train had made its morning trip to Sonora and was passing through Eldorado at about 1:00 Thursday afternoon, when the engineer saw the Johnson car, occupied by two women approaching the tracks. According to reports he used all the whistles he had, but failed to attract the attention of the women.

From all appearances, the car and its occupants _might have been completely demolished if the automobile had gone a foot or two farther. As it was the train struck the car at the side, throwing it off onto the

right-of-way embankment. The car was whirled around, thus opening a door, which caused Mrs. Ashmore to be thrown out, Mrs. Johnson re-taining her hold on the wheel. Neither had seen the train until it struck.

Mrs. Johnson was not injured, but Mrs. Ashmore was immediately taken to a San Angelo hospital, where she is receiving treatment for severe bruises. The car was not badly



I have been taking some goodnatured (and some not so goodnatured) ribbing about my bill to request the Postmaster General to ssue a commorative stamp on the 100th anniversary of the advent of the Angora goat in America, You, see, the first Angora to set foot on American soil occurred in 1849.

It's amazing how uninformed people are regarding the Angora. Winifred Nelson, a writer, upon learning of my bill, came over to interview me about this strange animal! "Do goats actually have long whiskers?" she inquired at one point. Then I got my album of goat pictures out which Mr, Schreiner of Kerrville sent me four or five years ago. She could hardly believe her eyes when she beheld herds and close-ups of the Aristoanimals.

The other day I got a letter from Los Angeles, referring to the bill,

"Why not make a stamp in connection with the aged and blind?
"You political parasites have

been making them the goats for Another one in a less serious

vein came from Jakey Lutz of Brooklyn, who wisecracked:

"Say, that's a hot one-a goat stamp. If you get away with it you'll be popular with the kids."

A man in Boston sent me a clipping about my bill, and also a clipoing of a "Grin and Bear It" caroon. The latter showed the rotund Senator Snort, with cigar and briefcase, inside the office of the "New Stamp Division" of the Postoffice Department, with the man behind the desk gently denying the Senator's request for a new stamp, in

"I agree it would make a fine, nexpensive anniversary present for your wife, Senator-but we got too many new stamps already!"

Well, the newspapers have picked up the cry for a slow-down on commorative stamps. Last year there were 39, which we will admit maybe was a bit too many. They commemorated nearly everything from the centennial of the American poultry industry to the Fort Bliss centennial. The Washington Star, commenting on the stamp fever and pending bills the other lay, said in an editorial:

"One of the stickers demanded would glorify the trotter Hambeltonian; another would advertise the centennial of the Angora Goat!' (What I didn't like was the exclamation point.)

But the pay-off came the other day when, in the House cloak room I saw my friend, Representative Tom Murray of Tennessee, chairman of the Committee to which my bill was referred. I said: "Tom I've got a little bill before your committee and I want you to help me on it. It's a little stamp bill. Murray said he'd be glad to look into it, that the committee is swamped with bills for stamps this year, maybe 60-odd pending; that the Postmaster General had asked him and the Chairman of the Senate committee to hold up action until a policy limiting the number can be worked out. 


