LOOPHOLES in the Law

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated criminal code and code of criminal procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.)

The Big Boss of the slot machine racket in one of Texas' larger cities where gambling is prevalent was very unhappy when law enforcement officers raided his warehouse and confiscated 150 of his one-armed bandits. He was indicted for keeping and exhibiting slot machines for the purpose of gambling.

But when the Big Boss came to trial he was happy, for he gained a prompt acquittal.

The Texas law prohibiting slot machines provides that the machines must be actually exhibited and accessible to players before there is a violation of the law. It was held that the slot machines stored in the warehouse were not being used or exhibited, and thus the law was not violated.

This places an added obstacle in the way of law enforcement agencies. They have great difficulty in stopping the traffic in slot machines when they can confiscate and prosecute only when the machines are actually exhibited. This is a legal loophole that ought to be plugged up.

If the State Bar of Texas succeeds in its efforts to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes, criminals will find it more difficult to escape punishment for their misdeeds, and society will receive more adequate protection.

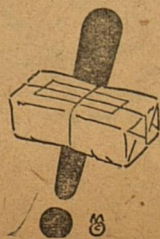

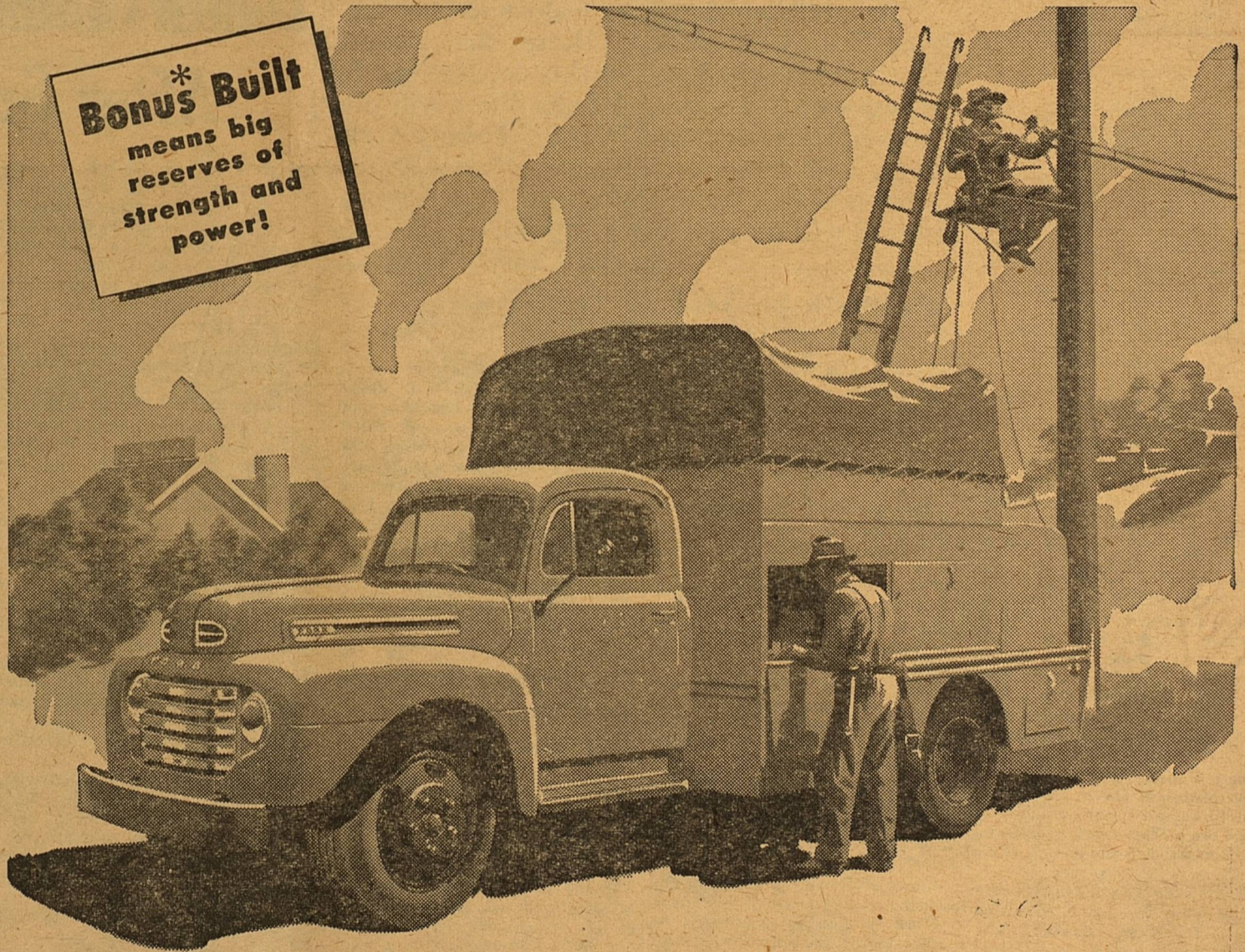

Want A New Iron? Consider These Points Before You Buy

If you're in the market for an electric hand iron, you might take into consideration these points listed by extension home management specialists at A&M.

Most homemakers, when buying an iron, will lift it first to test its weight and ease of handling. An iron weighing no more than four pounds saves energy in lifting and will do the work as well as a heavier one. The handle should be shaped to fit the hand comfortably and made of a heat-resistant material, such as plastic or wood.

A power rating of about 1,000 watts is desirable for fast heating, the specialists say. A dial to control heat is desirable, located where it is easy to read and move when ironing.

A beveled or slanting edge is useful for ironing around buttons. A large sole plate saves time when family ironing includes considerable flat work, although a smaller, narrower iron is sometimes more convenient.

Look the cord over, the specialists suggest. It should be well-insulated, with a secure, flexible connection where it is attached to the iron.

The Oregon Experiment Station recently conducted a time and motion study, in which it was proved that a side support, heel support or a flat, heat-proof pad to set the iron on proved equally good as time and energy savers. However, the metal stands that are relics from the days of stove-heated irons waste both time and energy.

Quarter Horse Show Changes To Be Made At Fat Stock Show

Schleicher county quarter horse enthusiasts are advised that several changes have been made in the quarter horse division at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show. General dates for the show are Jan. 25 through Feb. 5.

Quarter horses will be in two classes—halter and performance. Performance, in turn, has two divisions—cutting horse and roping horse competition. This is an innovation which was begun last season.

Roping and cutting will be divided into two classes, junior (foals of 1946 or later) and senior (foals of 1945 or before), another innovation made a year ago.

There will be the usual halter classes for yearlings, two-year olds, three-year olds, four-year olds and older, for stallions and mares. There will also be a halter class for geldings. All geldings are required to show in the performance class.

A new procedure will be instituted at the 1950 show; the dividing into two classes of aged mares—a class for maiden mares and a class for mares which have produced one or more foals.

In halter classes, in response to requests from a great number of exhibitors, all stallions and mares 3 years old and older (except mares that have produced one or more foals) must be brought into the arena under saddle and shown at walk, trot and canter and will be judged on way of going and manners. No penalty will be given unless the entry is very fractious or has a poor way of going. Then the entries will be called to the center of the arena, saddles removed and judging for conformation will take place.

The quarter horse show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association. The judge will be Orville B. Burtis of Manhattan, Kansas, who operates the Davis Ranch, well-known for its good cattle and quarter horses. Closing date for entries is Jan. 5. Horses must be on grounds Jan. 26, which is a day ahead of the opening of the Stock Show, the reason being that, beginning at 10 a. m. on opening day, quarter horse performance judging will be held. Premium lists are now being prepared and will be mailed in the near future.

The name, quarter horse, goes back to early days and comes from the speed that this horse displayed at a short distance, usually a quarter of a mile. A quarter horse's temperament adapts him to the handling of cattle and to rodeo contests and general pleasure use.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR CHRISTMAS BIKE, FOLLOW RULES TO AVOID ACCIDENTS

Do Johnny and Mary want a new bicycle for Christmas? Or are they already the proud owner of a streamlined bike?

In either case, every bicycle owner should know the simple rules for care of his bike, and should also know the safety rules for bicycle riding.

Owners should keep their bikes in good condition. Don't risk an accident through faulty brakes or other mechanical defects.

If the bicyclist is not mechanically inclined, he should take his bicycle to a service man at least once a year for inspection and repair if necessary.

For those who are mechanically inclined, the following should be done: oil all moving parts; bearings may be cleaned by loosening the cones and flushing the bearings with kerosene or gasoline. Be certain, however, that the kerosene or gasoline are used outdoors with no flames nearby.

The bicycle chain should be kept clean. To do this, soak it for one-half day in kerosene; remove it, wipe dry and soak it in light oil. When the chain is being replaced, adjust it so that it is neither too tight nor too loose. A loose chain is dangerous. The bearings in the

pedals should be oiled frequently and readjusted.

Do not attempt to adjust coaster brakes. An experienced service man should do any work necessary on this mechanism.

All damaged and worn parts should be replaced immediately. Equip the bicycle with all necessary safety equipment.

Good safety rules for every cyclist to follow are given by the National Safety Council:

- (1) Obey all stop signs and traffic signals.
- (2) Ride on the right side of the street, as close to the curb as possible.
- (3) Ride single file on all streets.
- (4) Don't carry another person on your bicycle.
- (5) Don't hitch onto trucks or stunt or race your bicycle.
- (6) Walk your bicycle across heavily traveled streets.
- (7) Don't weave in and out of traffic.
- (8) Always be alert for moving or stationary objects.
- (9) Make sure sidewalks and streets are clear before coming out of alleys and driveways.
- (10) Be sure your bicycle has good brakes and is equipped with a horn, a rear reflector and a headlight.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Coconut Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

Broadcast: November 12, 1949

1 1/2 cups Baker's Coconut
1 1/2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
6 tablespoons cold water
3/4 cup brown sugar, lightly packed
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, separated
2 cups Pet Milk
1 cup cooked or canned pumpkin
3 tablespoons dark molasses

Spread coconut thinly on baking sheet. Place in moderately slow oven (350° F.) and toast about 10 min., until light brown. Stir now and then to toast evenly. Soften gelatin in cold water. Mix brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves and egg yolks, mixture of slightly beaten egg yolks, milk, pumpkin and molasses. Place over boiling water; cook and stir 3 min., or until slightly thickened. Stir in soft-ened gelatin until dissolved. Remove from heat; cover; chill until slightly firm. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and 3/4 cup thicker than unbeaten egg whites and 1/4 cup in stiffly beaten egg whites. Sprinkle with re-toasted coconut. Put into a cold 9-in. baked pastry shell. Sprinkle with remaining toasted coconut. Chill until firm.

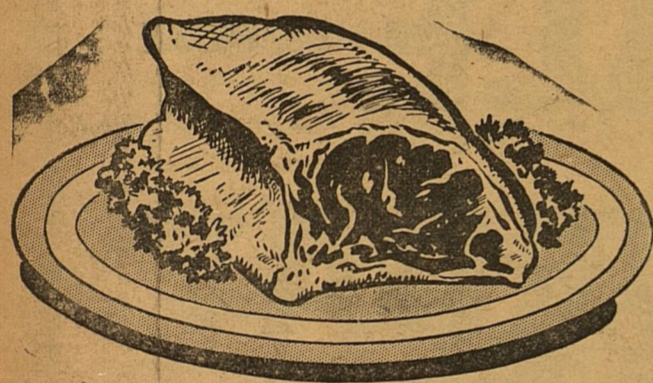

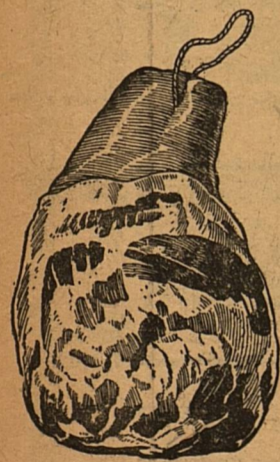
