Callison leaving as City Administrator

The Eldorado City Council met Monday night and, following an closed-door executive session, emerged into open meeting and voted to accept the resignation of City Administrator John Callison. Callison's resignation will be effective Sept. 25, 1998.

Following the meeting, Mayor John Nikolauk said the city had no concrete plans to replace Callison.

"This came at short notice," Nikolauk stated. "And, it doesn't give us a whole lot of time. I think the City Council's feeling right now is to operate without an administrator for awhile."

Callison's letter of resignation stated he had enjoyed working for the city and expressed his appreciation for cooperation he received from the "Mayor, City Council

Members and fellow workers."

The meeting was called to order shortly after 5:30 p.m. with Mayor Nikolauk and council members Jeri Whitten, Robert Bybee, Sherry Lux and George Gower in attendance. Councilmembers Tommy Minor and Dora Bosmans were absent.

First on the agenda for the council was a meeting with Don Foard and Lawrence Kennedy, representing Duncan Disposal. The two men proposed a contract between the city and Duncan which would call for Duncan to take over garbage collection duties within the City of Eldorado. They noted, however, the proposal called for the city to continue operating its landfill.

Foard told the council the contract could be very lucrative for the city, especially if Eldorado opted to accept trash from other towns.

One plan outlined by Foard would net the city \$176,000 per year, it was explained.

The council took no action on the matter, however, voting to table

School trustees study six cent tax increase

Schleicher County I.S.D. trustees met Tuesday night for its regular monthly meeting and, among other items, discussed the possibility of a six cent tax increase for the 1999 budget year. The impact of losing "Tier 2" money from the state was also discussed and it was noted that increasing taxes would generate even more funds from Austin.

A budget hearing has been called for Monday, August 17th to discuss the topic further. A Capital Acquisitions Program hearing

is set for the same night.

Present for the school board meeting were trustees Ilse Williams, William Edmiston, Phil McCormick, Steve Sessom, Berta Nicholson and Eddie Albin. Trustee Ruby Minor was absent.

When the meeting was called to order, the trustees presented the Eldorado Success with a certificate in recognition of the newspaper being appointed to the Texas Association of School Board's "Media Honor Roll". Kathy Mankin

Schleicher County Resource Center facing unsure future

For several years now out-of-county funding for the Schleicher County Community Resource Center has been dwindling. With each new budget cycle, Schleicher County Commissioners and the Eldorado City Council sought ways to fund the Center. Now, with additional funding cuts from the Texas Department of Health and other sources totaling more than \$20,000, the Resource Center's fate may be sealed.

Schleicher County Commissioners agreed Monday to fund the Resource Center only through the remainder of this year. County Treasurer Karen Henderson notified the Commissioner's Court that enough money remained in the Center's account to keep it open for a few more months.

"I don't want to see it close, but I don't see any way we can afford

to keep it open," County Judge Johnny Griffin told the Commissioners. "Just like everything else it comes down to money."

When the Community Resource Center opened in the early 90's as one of four "pilot program centers", most of the funding for it came from the State and Federal governments. Since that time, however, funding cuts have shifted more and more of the Center's financial burden to local sources.

The Schleicher County Community Resource Center was able to remain open long after the original pilot program ended due to the diligent efforts of the Community Resource Center's board of directors and additional funding from local taxing jurisdictions, Griffin said.

It was noted that efforts to lo-

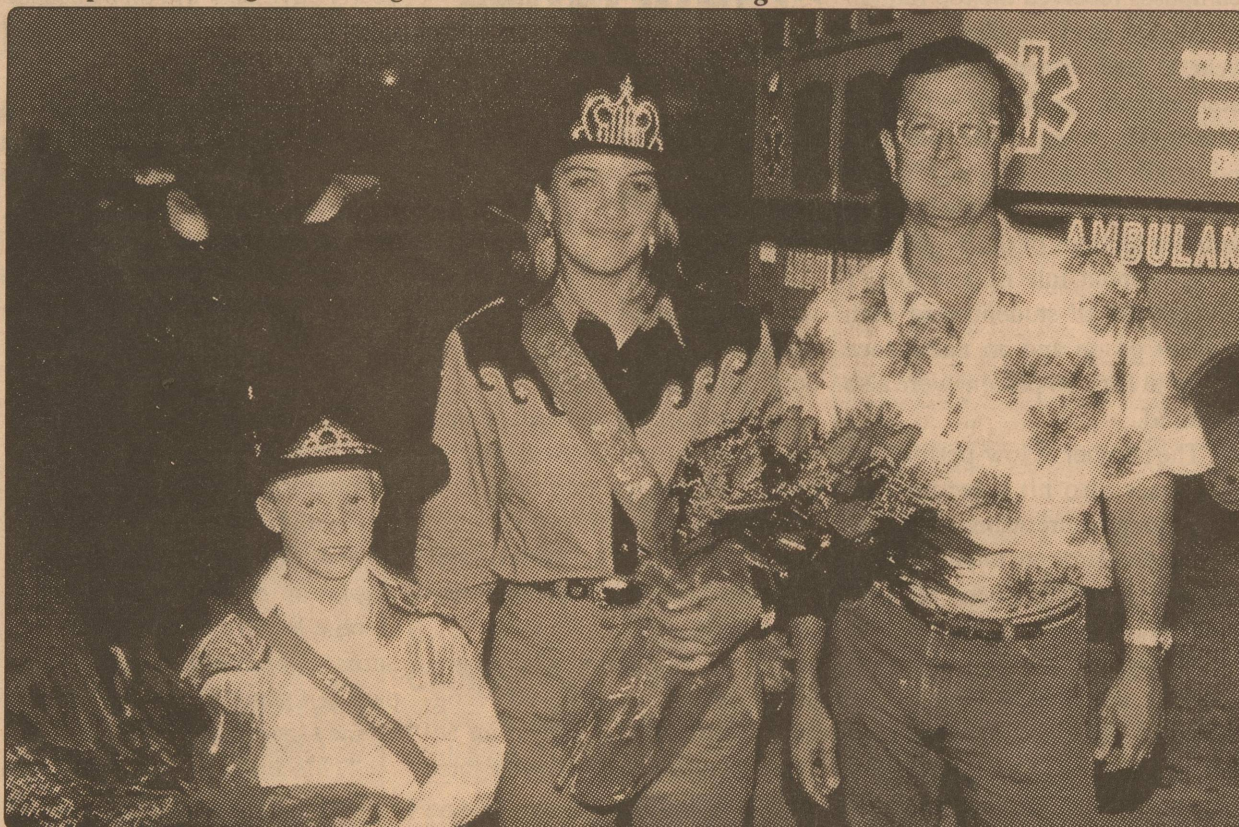
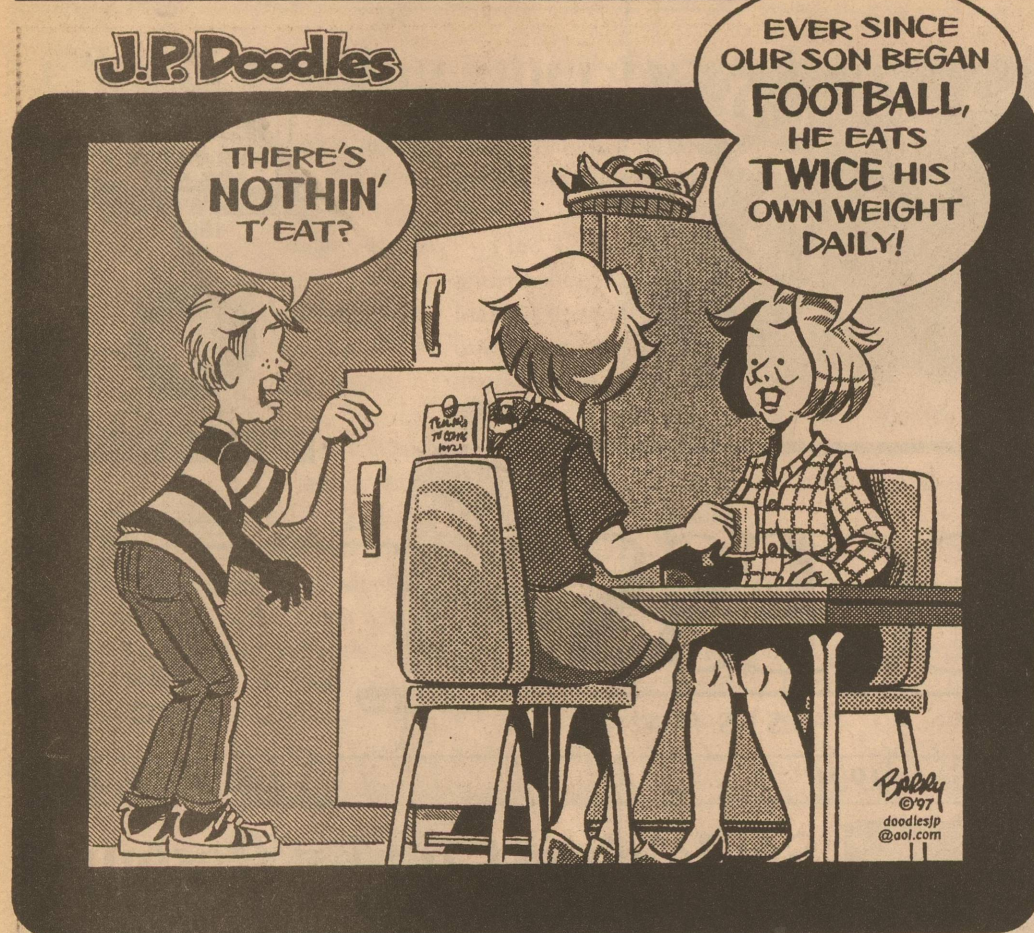


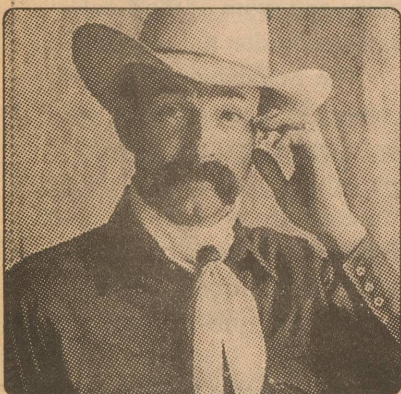

Charlton Heston's N.R.A.

ON THE EDGE OF COMMON SENSE

Q. What's going on with Charlton Heston?

A. He's the new president of the National Rifle Association (N.R.A.).

Q. Who is he?

A. For you young people, Charlton Heston was one of Hollywood's biggest stars 25 years ago. He played strong men with convictions and the nerve to back them up. He was as we imagined George Washington, Davy Crockett, Jim Thorpe and Moses to be. And, he turned out to be playing himself.

The press is having a field day covering him. Most of them are young enough to have never been exposed to a politician or public figure who speaks his mind. They never got to hear Truman, Goldwater, Nader or Nelson Rockefeller. They expect deception, double speak,

half truths, tricks and condescension.

Now, with Charlton Heston they are in the presence of a firebreather who makes Jesse Jackson's opportunist oratory seem pale, house-speaker Gingrich's fuddy-duddiness seem frivolous and Vice-president Gore's eco teapot sound like the Pillsbury Dough Boy throwing a tantrum.

Q. But what is Heston saying?

A. He is a believer in the right to bear arms and isn't timid about defending that right. But, in today's politically correct cocoon he is exposing himself to criticism with his raw out spokenness. me my call was important. I didn't feel very important because I couldn't talk to anyone.

I read on one of the bills that if you had any questions, you should call the Public Utilities Commission. I called that number and got the same treatment I got from the telephone companies. One of the voices at the PUC told me I should call the FCC. I declined, thank you.

I think it's a shame that businesses got rid of their telephone operators. It was so nice to have a real live person with a pleasant voice answer the phone and within seconds connect you with the person you were calling. Today you might stay on the line for what seems like an eternity and never get to speak to a live human being.

Does all this modern technology save money? Is it worth the aggravation to customers? Businesses need to go back to the basics of public relations. A helpful, friendly voice on the phone is worth a lot.

I got a telephone bill from Southwestern Bell the other day. The next day I got another bill from AT&T for the same telephone. It was the first time I had received two bills for that particular phone. I called Southwestern Bell and AT&T. I never got to talk to anyone. I was switched around to several departments by robot-sounding voices. One voice told

I'm going to call my friendly telephone man and ask him about the situation. I'll probably get his beeper. Or maybe his cell phone. Or maybe his car phone. Is everybody on call? Are we dying to get a call from SOMEBODY? I'm not. I really don't like to talk on the phone much anymore.

I once called up a credit card company and the taped computer voice told me right away I could not speak directly to a human. I could get my balance if I punched in the numbers of my credit card. Or I could apply for a card if I punched in the numbers of my social security number, my drivers license and three other credit cards issued to me. I tore up that card.

A friend of mine told me he called a bank the other day and was immediately put on hold. The taped voice told him it would be just 30 seconds before he got to talk to someone. He waited for half an hour, getting sales messages and ugly music through his telephone

ear piece.

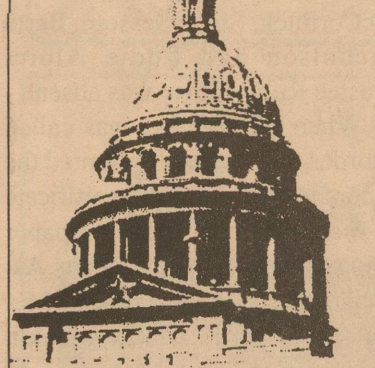
He was very frustrated when he finally got to talk to someone. All this taped stuff used by government and business has increased telephone time substantially. I thought the purpose of new equipment was to speed things up.

I've done many reports with people who pioneered telephoning. Old operators told me about running a switchboard. Owners of small telephone companies related stories about how they helped people. One owner in the community of Norton coined a phrase that went all over the telephone switchboard circuit. The phrase is MC & FC. When calls were made in the late afternoon if there was no answer, the operator would say MC & FC which means milking the cows and feeding the chickens.

I like to think of the telephone as a source of fun, not as a source of irritation. I really resent being told on tape that my call is important.

More schools earn top scholastic rating

AUSTIN — A record number of Texas school districts and campuses earned an exemplary rating, the highest rating possible, from the state's accountability system, Education Commissioner Mike Moses announced last week.

Fifteen percent, or 1,042 of the state's 6,654 public school campuses, were rated exemplary based on their performance in the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test given last spring. Last year, 683 campuses received the top rating.

To earn an exemplary rating this year, at least 90 percent of all the students and each student group (black, Hispanic, white and economically disadvantaged) had to pass the reading, writing and mathematics sections of the TAAS test.

A dropout rate of less than 1 percent for all students and each student group and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent were also required.

The number of low-performing campuses also hit a record low, even though more stringent performance standards are in place. Sixty schools (less than 1 percent) were rated as low-performing.

"We raised the bar for Texas schools again this year," said Moses. "They not only met the challenge, most exceeded it. The ratings show the strong improvement that is occurring in Texas public schools."

Accountability ratings are based on the percentage of students

ments in Texas' \$17.3 billion settlement with the tobacco industry.

"We now have the ability to dramatically improve the health care of Texans, especially our uninsured children, for decades to come," Morales said.

The documents were forwarded to the federal court in Texarkana. Thirty days after approval by the court, nearly \$400 million in initial payments will be deposited in the state treasury. Thereafter, yearly payments will then be made to the state treasury.

Texas recently won an additional \$2.28 billion in follow-up negotiations with the tobacco industry, as a result of a provision in the original settlement allowing enhancement of the Texas deal if other states obtain more favorable terms. The Minnesota settlement opened the door for Texas to renegotiate.

The additional money is to be distributed to Texas counties and hospital districts for costs associated with indigent health care.

Morales also announced the resolution of objections by Gov. George W. Bush and seven legislators to the contingency fee to be paid to the state's private counsel by the tobacco industry.

"This ends the war over the spoils of war," Morales said.

2nd Meningitis Death Reported

Two children have now died this summer from a rare and dan-

gerous form of meningitis.

A 10-year-old boy's death last week prompted the Texas Department of Health to issue a renewed warning about swimming in lakes, rivers and stagnant water.

The amoeba that causes the infection, *Naegleria fowleri*, thrives in fresh water when temperatures are high, usually above 80 degrees.

Swimming pools properly cleaned, maintained and treated with chlorine generally are safe, as is salt water.

In addition, TDH recommends that people never swim in stagnant or polluted water and that people hold their nose or use plugs when jumping into lakes, rivers, ponds or other bodies of fresh water.

Other Capital Highlights

• Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer's office has mailed about 500 letters to known Holocaust survivors in Texas, inviting them to give information that could lead to claims. This is part of an international effort to identify and compensate victims of Nazi financial chicanery, The Dallas Morning News reported.

• Democratic gubernatorial candidate Garry Mauro last week said 49 Hispanic mayors have endorsed him, but the Texas Poll shows 67 percent of Hispanics favor incumbent Republican Gov. Bush while 20 percent favor Mauro.

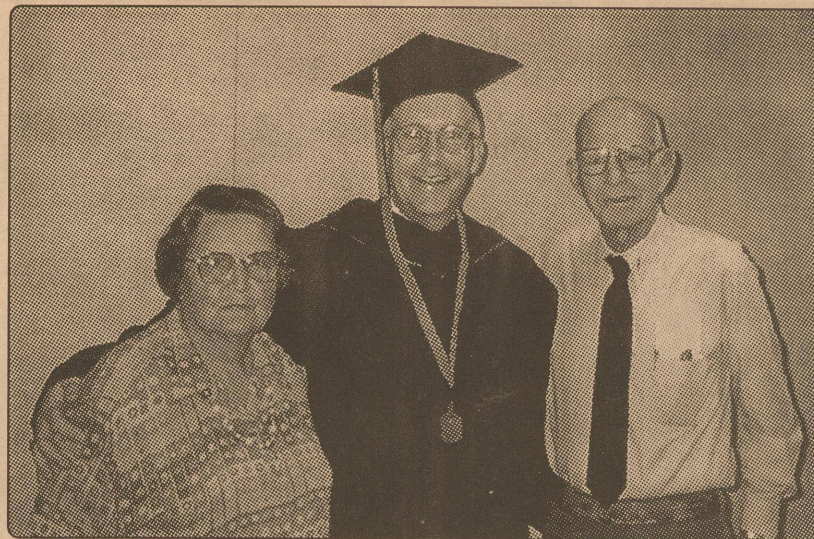

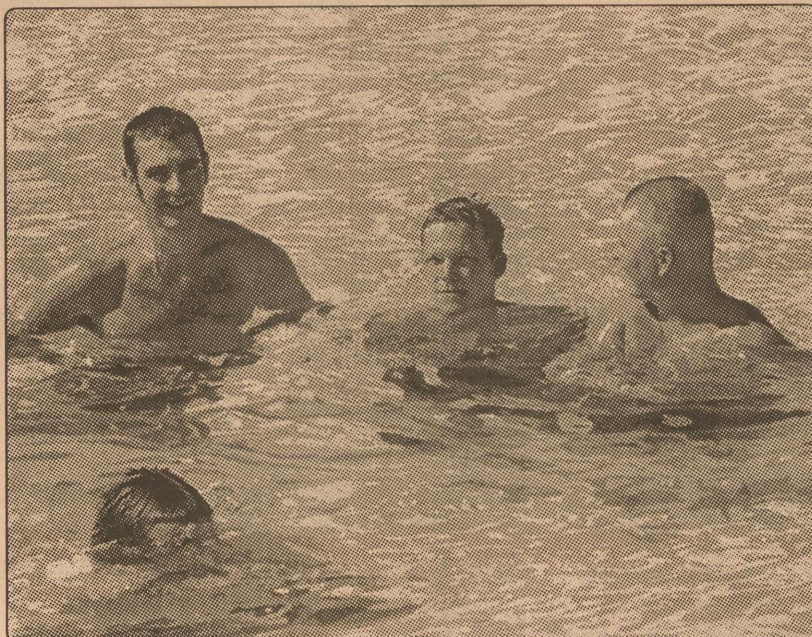

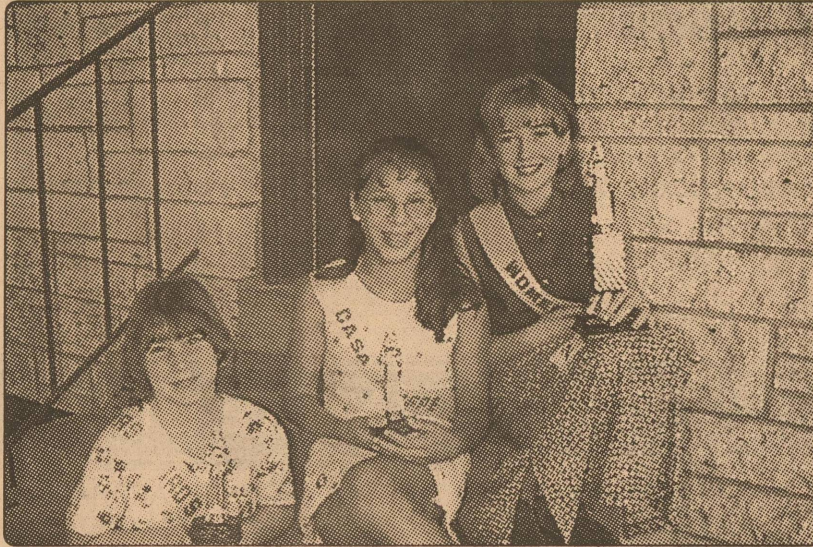

REAL future for Schleicher County students

While many teachers around the nation were taking time to enjoy their summer vacations, fifty-five educators from several states, including Chris McCravey of Eldorado High School, were learning and teaching at the REAL Institute of Texas, located at St. Edwards University in Austin.

Eldorado High School has been chosen as one of a select number of high schools and community colleges in the state to implement the REAL Entrepreneurship program. REAL (Rural Entrepreneurship through Action Learning) will provide participants in Eldorado the opportunity to plan and open small businesses through an experimental course to be offered beginning this fall.

"Covering all of the REAL training literature created a very fast-paced, intensive work environment," McCravey said, "This program has the potential to create opportunities for our students to learn business skills while also

playing an important role in community development."

The REAL Institute attracted a diverse group of participants, including teachers, administrators, and representatives from various community organizations. At the Institute, participants addressed the theory and methodology of experiential education: studied and used the REAL curriculum as they planned their courses: learned the basics of business planning, marketing, operations, and finance; and prepared for the implementation of the program in their schools.

McCravey, along with Vocational Agriculture Instructor Kent Giles, and Rural Challenge Director Mark Marshall will be working with REAL Enterprises to help students assess their own interests and skills and analyze the local community and economy. Students will be able to select promising business ideas based on their research, write comprehensive busi-

ness plans for the ventures, and (if they choose) actually open and operate the business they have created.

Businesses opened by REAL participants in other communities have included music sales, cabinet and furniture making, recycling, catering, dress design, small engine repair, pressure washing, and others. Participants, especially high school students, are encouraged to start with home-based businesses that require minimal capitalization.

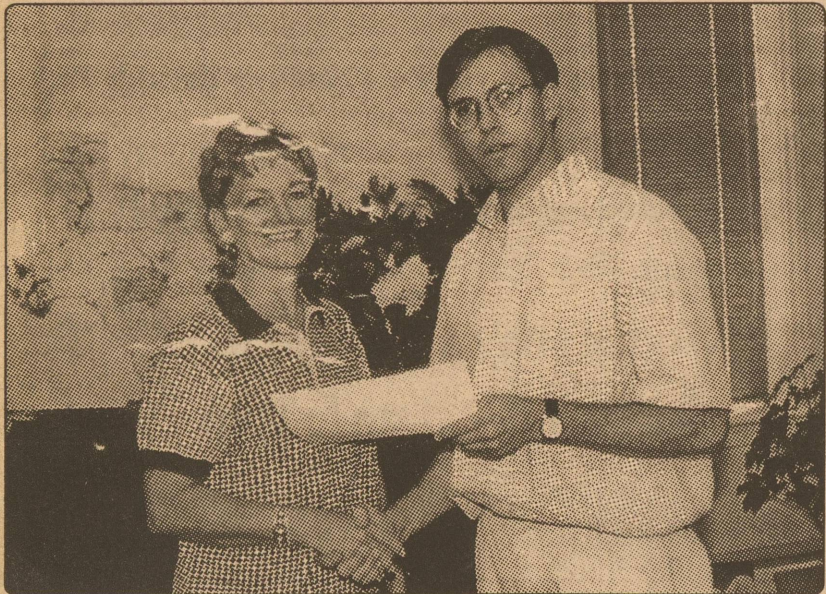

FSA accepting emergency loan applications

Applications for emergency farm/ranch loans due to damages and losses caused by drought, flooding, hail, and high winds are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency office located in San Angelo, according to FSA Farm Loan Manager Fred J. Greenway.

Schleicher County was just one of the counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman for loans to cover part of actual physical and/or production losses resulting from drought which occurred from June 1, 1998, through July 8, 1998, and continuing and flooding, hail, and high winds, that occurred in Tom Green, Concho,

Irion, Menard, Reagan, Runnels, and Schleicher County on May 25 and May 26, 1998.

Fred J. Greenway said farmers and ranchers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers and ranchers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer or rancher must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production and/or a qualifying physical loss, for an FSA emergency loan," Fred J. Greenway said. Farmers and ranchers participating in the

Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency destination will be accepted until approximately March 23, 1999, but farmers and ranchers should apply as soon as possible and contact your local FSA office for the last date to turn in an application. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season, Greenway said.

Eligibility is extended to individual farmers and ranchers who are U.S. citizens and to farming and ranching partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Eldorado is located at 510 S. Divide and it is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Applications are also available in the San Angelo office.

cate additional funding for the Center will continue as its operating funds are depleted between now and the end of the year.

In other business, the commissioners met with representatives from the Schleicher County Senior Citizens Center to discuss a shortfall in the Meals for Friends Program, which currently provides meals to more than forty elderly citizens in Schleicher County. Rev. Walt Griggs, Rev. Hawley Wolfe, Vernel McCalla, Delia Pina, Ives Swain and Ann Schooley were on hand to present the Sr. Center's case. It was noted that current donations from the Meals for Friends' clients average 38 cents per meal while similar programs in Menard, Mason and Kimble Counties are receiving more than a \$1 per meal in client contributions.

Discussion centered on the pos-

sibility of paring the program down from five to four days per week. Rev. George Lumpkin told the commissioners that his congregation at the First United Methodist Church were already distributing meals to the same clients on Saturdays. Lumpkin speculated that other churches might be willing to assume some of the responsibility for the meals.

The commissioners expressed doubt that a volunteer effort would be long-lived but agreed to study the possibility. They asked the representatives from the Sr. Center to encourage the Meals for Friends clients to increase their donations and to report back with further recommendations.

The commissioners then met with representatives from the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department. Jerry Jones, Robert Parker, Joey Jones and Rev. George Lumpkin discussed the department's campaign to fund a new pumper truck. They asked the court

to appoint a representative to meet with them and representatives from the city, school and hospital. Judge Griffin told the men to let him know when such a meeting could be scheduled so that he or one of the commissioners could attend.

Next, the commissioners approved construction of at least one new softball field adjacent to the county's current baseball complex on McWhorter St. Local attorney James Kosub told the commissioners that donations and grants were being sought to pay for the construction and asked only for the county to authorize the construction on county property and some initial dirt work.

Before adjourning, the commissioners appointed Pete Peters, Gene Jones and Orval Edmiston to serve in the local board of the Texas Veterans Land Board. They also agreed called for bids for a new pickup.

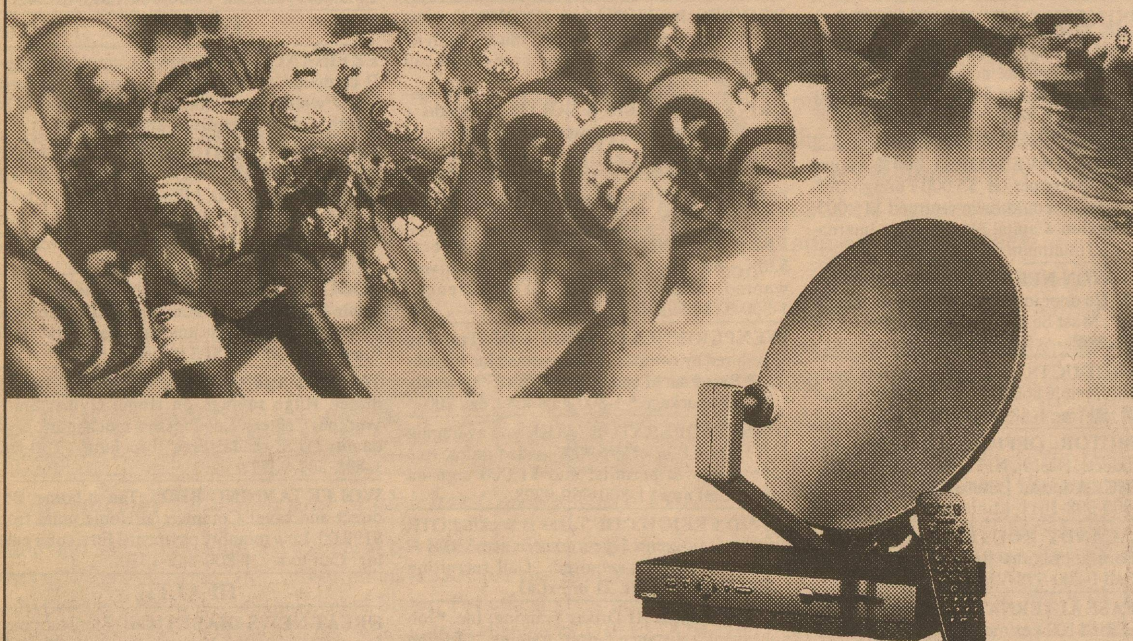

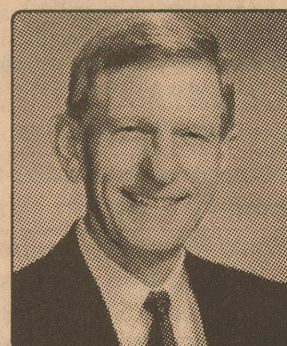
