Junction Sale Reported

Sale of the Hill Country Wool and Mohair Company property to Kimble Electric Cooperative, Inc., subject to approval of REA, was announced this week by Louie Ragland, local partner. Chester Kirk, manager of the cooperative, confirmed the announcement. The Hill Country Wool and Mohair Company, which opened for business in Junction more than three years ago, was owned by Hal and Charlie Patterson, W. S. Fawcett and Louie Ragland. —Junction Eagle.

Airport for Menard?

A special meeting of the commissioners' court will be held Monday, Dec. 5, at 10:00 a. m. in the county court room (better known as Judge Scruggs' office). Everyone is invited to attend. The meeting will be held for the purpose of making a final decision regarding the proposed airport. A representative of the Civil Aeronautics Administration will be present.

The airport bonds were voted in 1944, since that time nothing has been done. This meeting will give the general public a chance to speak up on the subject. Lawyers tell us that there is a chance of re-allocating these bonds. If this is true it means that if something is not done toward an airport, there is a possibility that these bonds may be reallocated and used for a youth center, swimming pool, or any number of worthwhile things. —Menard News.

Pecos County Wins

Fort Stockton and the Pecos county 4-H clubs won world renown and \$13,800 this week when "Judge Roy Bean," Hereford steer bred by the Allison Ranch Co., and owned by the 4-H Club, was crowned grand champion steer of the world's premier livestock show, the International, in Chicago.

Thursday, the champion was bought by the Dearborn Rubber Co. of Detroit on a bid of \$11.50 per pound, 1,200 pounds pay weight. The \$13,800 he brought was a record high for the show. When he left Fort Stockton two weeks ago he weighed 1,280 pounds. Apparently he had lost a little weight during the trip to Chicago and opening days of the show, for when he was listed as winner Tuesday his weight was given as 1,250. Allowable shrinkage cut this to 1,200 on the purchase. —Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

Buttons for Big Lake

In an effort to relieve the parking situation in the downtown area, the City of Big Lake has installed parking buttons on Depot Street, in the two blocks between First and Third Streets. The buttons outline parking lanes for cars to be parked at an approximate 45 degree angle, allowing a two-foot clearance between each vehicle. Chief of Police Ball is asking the co-operation of the public in conforming to this new parking method. —Big Lake Wildcat.

Play for Regional

This week's game for the Eden Bulldogs finds them "playing for keeps" with the chance of playing for the Regional championship at stake—a position attained only by one other Eden team, in 1946, when Early Hi nosed the Bulldogs out by one point in a 26-25 super-thriller. Friday night's affair is for bi-district honors, the winner to play in the Regional final, the ultimate game for Class-B teams. —Eden Echo.
