## R. L. McWHORTER BUYS OUT LONG IN RECENT DEAL

Robert L. McWhorter, college graduate, veteran of World War II, and son of a pioneer Eldorado businessman, has completed a deal for purchase of Long's Variety Store, and is reopening the establishment Saturday as City Variety Store.

The business has been closed from June 29 through July 4, while inventory was being taken and stock rearranged, but doors will open again under the new management and ownership Saturday.

For the comfort of shoppers and the sales force, two large air conditioners have been installed and some other changes and improvements may be made later.

McWhorter will run the store on a strictly cash basis and will carry somewhat the same line of goods as has his predecessor, Mrs. Rose Brannon will continue as clerk.

McWhorter, son of W. L. McWhorter, a merchant in Eldorado early in the century, was born and reared in Eldorado, and was graduated from EHS. He attended A & M from September, 1940, to May, 1943, then was in service three years, part of that time in ETO. He received his discharge from service in February, 1946, and spent the past school year at A & M, where he received his degree this spring, with a major in accounting.

## NEW PAGE WELL BIG PRODUCER

Cooper Page 5A came in during the weekend at 42 barrels per hour, from a new zone, 5655 to 5695 feet, a stratum heretofore not tested. This well moves up in the scale of production as one of the best wells in the field. The location is C NW 32 - L GH & SA.

The rig from Page 5A has been moved to No. 1 Hayden Baugh Estate, 660 SE 8M GH & SA, a wildcat in the Rudd Community 4 1/2 miles northeast of the Koy well, to be drilled by Groehl.

The rig from the Groehl Koy, which did not make a producer, has been moved to Page E3, a new location. This is just east of Koy C3, spudded in two weeks ago, and drilling Monday at 1825 feet.

Surface holes on two new locations have been dug and the tests are ready for the rotary. Page E4, recently dug by rotary, and Koy A5, drilled at 200 feet Monday and completed for the rotary to take over.

A Jonah test has been Groehl Koy No. 1, C NW SW 34 - LG & SA, which in spite of a fine showing has at last ceased operators to admit defeat. Tested at 5540 to 5560, there was only salt water; 5490 to 5510, no salt water, and no oil and a little gas; 5637 to 5650, tested Sunday, salt water; 5495 to 5520 acidized Monday, no oil.

## NEW WATER LINES ARE COMPLETED IN THIS CITY

Eldorado's water line extensions and improvements are at last completed after long delay due to shortage of pipe, and Alan Sanders, Beavers and Lodal engineer, here, representing the city of Eldorado while the sewer and water extensions were being made and city paving being laid, leaves this week with his wife for Taylor, Texas. He also assisted with the REA's proposed new sections while in the county.

The water system, most recent of Eldorado's series of improvements which have been under way nearly two years, consisted of addition of 5,975 feet of six-inch border pipe, five fire hydrants and three six-inch valves. The water lines have now been extended to the center of the Latin-American settlement and to the south part of Eldorado, known as Camelie Flat. The total cost of the water project was \$15,425.92.

Mr. Sanders, in leaving Eldorado, states that this is the longest time he has ever lived in any one place since 1932 and that he has enjoyed his work with the city council and his various business and social contacts with the people of Eldorado.

## WOOLEN MILL IMPROVED

A new napper has been installed at the West Texas Woolen Mills, enabling the management to make wider blankets and to improve the finish. Installation of the machine took place during the weekend.

## NEW ROAD STRIP IS TURNKEY JOB BY NEXT WEEK

That the first strip of new Eldorado Menard highway will be a turnkey job by the 15th is the opinion expressed by B. W. Wynn, San Angelo highway engineer and Glen H. Harris, Junior engineer in charge, in Eldorado Tuesday.

Grading on the 1 1/2 mile strip has been completed and next week will bring final application of caliche and the asphalt on about nine miles remaining to be surfaced.

Final cleaning up is under way. Rocks have been rip-rapped around the culverts and provisions made for numerous shade trees on the right of way. The road camp is expected to be dismantled and workmen are already leaving for a new job.

Of the forty men on the regular payroll the common labor was supplied locally. The first rock was turned January 13 and since then there have been few delays.

No word has been received on status of the second strip, a 14 1/2 mile stretch on which low bidder last week was Burnham Construction Company. Whether the state paves it or awards it to a private company, work is required by law to start in a few weeks.

Another thirty days are required on Menard's strip, according to reports this week.

Surprising to Schleicher County is the beauty of the new highway. Built under difficult conditions, through rocks and mesquite, and leading through picturesque ranch country, the road provides pleasant driving and attractive scenery and promises to be a most popular thoroughfare.

The highway department is raising the island in front of the post office, to separate traffic which will be routed according to a plan the city will work out.

## VISITS HIS PARENTS

Edwin Johnson, formerly of Cutbank, Montana, who has been a visitor for the past three weeks in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. K. Johnson, left Tuesday via air for New Orleans, La., and from there will go to Venezuela South America where as Pipe Line Superintendent of the Texas Petroleum Company, he will be in charge of the construction and operation of the company's pipe facilities there.

Mrs. Johnson and children will join him at Christmas.

Oscar Burden, a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Johnson, who visited over the week end here, will leave July 24 from New York for Beirut, Lebanon, where he will supervise the construction of the west half of the Trans-Arabian thirty-inch pipe line. Mrs. Burden and son, Tom, returned to their home at Wichita Falls, Tuesday, after a visit of several days here with her parents, and will leave at Christmas to join Mr. Burden in Beirut.

## AGENT ATTENDS SCHOOL

W. G. Godwin, Schleicher County Agent, was among the county agents selected from District 7 to attend the Range School June 30th to July 16 inclusive.

The course, under the sponsorship of the A & M Extension Service, is being taught by Dr. Vernon Young, head of the Range and Forestry Department; Dr. E. O. Sperry, Range and Forestry Dept., Mr. L. B. Merrill of the Sonora Sub-Station, and the men will be given a three hour credit for the course.

The Pecos County 4-H Club bus is being used for housing and transportation between locations, and several cars accompanying the bus, furnish transportation from the camp location to and from the field. The following is a schedule of the stops: Experiment Station, Sonora, June 30 to July 16; Crit Clark Ranch, Water Valley, July 9 and 10; E. L. Ranch, Pecos County (tentative, July 11 and 12; Cap Yates Ranch, Brewster County, July 13 and 14.

## Dr. Granville Dies

Dr. J. B. Granville, prominent Brady physician, died Wednesday night, only two weeks after he had returned from Temple where he had been undergoing treatment.

Funeral services will be held July 4 at 10:00 a. m. at the First Presbyterian Church at Brady. All of the relatives from here plan to attend, including the Tom Joneses, Sam Jones, Bert Page, H. T. Finley, James Page, and John Williams' families and others from here, and the Cleve Joneses of Sonora.

He was a prominent Mason, an elder and leader in the Presbyterian Church, and an active civic worker. His widow is the daughter of the late Ray King, and a sister of John Irvin King of Schleicher Co. and Mrs. Allen Robinson (Georgia Brittain) of Dallas. Three sons survive: J. D., Jr., Dallas; Billy King Granville, Brady; and Dr. George Ellis Granville, Houston; also two grandchildren. He was in his early 60's when death occurred.

## Terraced Wheat Crop Pays Good Dividends

"In spite of the dry spring, my 105 acres of oats on terraced land produced 3,150 bushels, or an average of 30 bushels per acre," Gene Edmiston, cooperating with the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District stated last week. Mr. Edmiston attributed the yield largely to the fact that all the rain received since October 15 of last year was held on the land and stored in the soil with a proper designed system of level closed end terraces.

Edmiston stated that the oats made 40 to 50 bushels on the first 40 feet above each terrace and that his grain was as good above terraces as it was in lake. Terrace construction was completed in Edmiston's 131 acres of cultivated land October of 1946. The 131 acres of cultivated land is protected with approximately 3.4 miles of level, closed terraces. These terraces distribute the rainfall evenly, hold water where it falls and prevents drowning out of crops in lakes. The oat yield in the Edmiston farm is an example of the value of properly constructed level closed end terraces for increasing crop production. This yield shows what will happen even in a dry year, when water is held where it falls.






