# **Talented Musicians Present Recreation Benefit Program**

The musical concert which will be presented Monday night at the First Baptist Church will be one of the biggest of its kind ever offered the public in Eldorado-this is the concensus of opinion today in this city! Four outstanding musicians have been engaged to present an eve ning of music, each a specialist in his field, capable of presenting alone a program which would be received as a musical treat. The four together, it is agreed, make a winning combination.

Committee members are at work this week arranging details of the varied and interesting program, which will consist of organ, piano, and voice selections.

At the new Hammond organ. recently installed by the Baptists, will be Duwain Hughes, Jr., of San Angelo, who has had extensive training in pipe organ. He received his B A from SMU, Dallas, where he studied under Miss Dora Poteet, head of the organ department. He is a member of the American uild of organists. This summer did research work at Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass., on his Master's degree, and will re-turn to SMU this fall for further work on his Master's. In the spring of 1946 he gave a recital at Linden, when the First Methodist Church of that city dedicated their new organ, and he has played in public on numerous other occasions. While in Eldorado he will visit his sister, Mrs. Charlie Trigg.

Joe Kreklow, who has been featured pianist with name bands, and who has toured the United States and Europe as a professional musician, will be pianist for the evening. A student of piano since he was seven, when he started to play on a neighbor's instrument, he early exhibited unusual talent, ap pearing on the platform professionally long before he was grown, and is one of those rare possessors of absolute pitch. Outstanding teachers through his boyhood years helped to lead him to the top in his

As a featured player with Russ Morgan, he was accorded many honors, and has played for numerous recordings.

A number of years ago he met Vita Moore, daughter of the L. Moores of Schleicher County, when he was playing at the Casa Manana, Ft. Worth, and she was a member of a party taking in the show. The romance culminated in marriage and the pair moved to Schleicher County where the pianist is now a dirt farmer; since 1942, when Joe first climbed onto the seat of a tractor, his music has been only a sideline, but his friends here have always enjoyed hearing him play.



This good yield shows what will happen, even in a dry year, when water is held where it falls.

### SCHOOL OPENS SEPTEMBER 8 IN ELDORADO

The school bell will ring September 8 for the hundreds of grade and high school students who attend the Eldorado school - this opening date was set at the regular meeting of the board of trustees July 21, when other important business was also transacted by the board.

The resignation from the board of W. R. Bearce was accepted by the trustees. Mr. Bearce was the oldest member of the board from the point of service and had only recently been re-elected to serve a three year term.

Th resignation from the Elementary faculty by Mrs. Ruth Prince was accepted by the board. Mrs. Prince, teacher in the primary department for the past five years resigned to accept a teaching position in Brown County.

Mrs. D. C. Royster was elected by the board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Prince. Mrs. Royster, a graduate of Howard Payne College taught in the Eldorado Schools last year and has had several years experience.

It was voted by the board to make a contract with the Southern Steel Company of San Antonio to install two fire escapes on the high school building to comply with the State fire escape law. Negotiation was started before the war to replace the fire escape removed from the building when the new band hall was built, but due to the shortage of steel the escapes have been unavailable until recently. 





### SGT. LEWIS KERR **BUILDS HOUSE** IN FURLOUGH

M-Tech.-Sgt. Lewis Kerr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Kerr of this city, has broken into print in a big way by building his own house at Costa Mesa, California, during a sixtyday furlough, in spite of the fact that he never did anything of that sort before.

A California daily carries the story of his adventures, together with a picture of him and his partly completed house: The story reads

Houses have been built many times in the past within a period of sixty days, but Marine Master Technical Sgt. Lewis Kerr of El Toro Marine Base, who never laid one brick upon another until a few weeks ago, is determined to complete his pumice brick home in Costa Mesa within a period of two nonths-because he must.

Sgt. Kerr, a native of Texas, is working alone in the construction of his new home, except for the id of his wife. The haste with which the place is being constructed s due to the fact that the sergeant is on a sixty-day leave from the Marine corps before he is once again shipped overseas. The Kerrs decided to build the

house in Costa Mesa after a recent experience of paying a sky-rocket figure for a three-room apartment in Santa Ana where he and his wife had to share a bathroom with nine other people.

Construction of the four-room house is doubly difficult for the sergeant because of the fact that prior to building the house he knew absolutely nothing about laying bricks or construction.

A friend who was building a similar-type home permitted Sgt. Kerr to mortar three of his pumice bricks together. That was the extent of his training before stepping up with several hundred blocks of pumice, plaster, lumber and a large amount of energy to tackle his own

The four-room home is approximately one third completed at the present time, with Kerr confident that it will be finished before he must leave. Veteran of twenty-one months service overseas at such familiar places as Midway, New Hebrides, Russel Islands, 5½ months aboard the Bunker Hill, and recently taking part in the Bikini tests, the overseas trip will be nothing new to the sergeant, not as new as building a home without much else besides gumption.

Kerr and his wife have been sleeping in a tent on the rear of the grounds while work has been in progress. He has seen six years service with the marines and recently reenlisted for another four He visited home folks a number of months ago.


