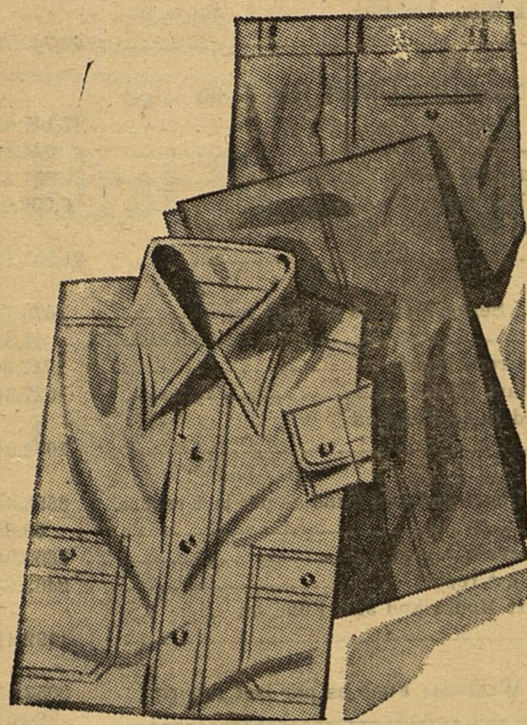

Sonora May Get Memorial Hospital

From Devil's River News, Sonora, July 17:

Virtual abandonment of the proposed Veterans' Memorial Building, for which some \$14,000 has been raised, seemed assured this week with the announcement by members of the soliciting committee, headed by R. A. Halbert, that "there is good reason to believe that a memorial hospital is to be built in Sonora in the not too distant future."

The statement was made jointly by Halbert, George H. Neill, L. W. Elliott, Fred T. Earwood, Bryan Hunt and J. M. Vander Stucken, all members of the soliciting committee, follows:

"Due to the fact that the committee has good reason to believe that a memorial hospital is to be built, we, the members of the Memorial Committee, have decided that it would be wise to discontinue efforts to build the originally proposed Memorial Building, and instead, to now erect buildings for the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and erect the memorial hospital in the not too distant future. This, we consider, will be of much more benefit to our veterans.

"We wish to take this opportunity to thank those who have supported us in our efforts. Someone will see each donor soon relative to final disposition of his donation."

No further details on location, probable starting date, cost or method of financing of the memorial hospital were forthcoming Thursday when the announcement was made.

Comment from many citizens was practically unanimous in favoring such an undertaking. A hospital here would serve Eldorado, Ozona, and a large population for miles around.

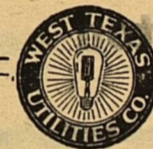

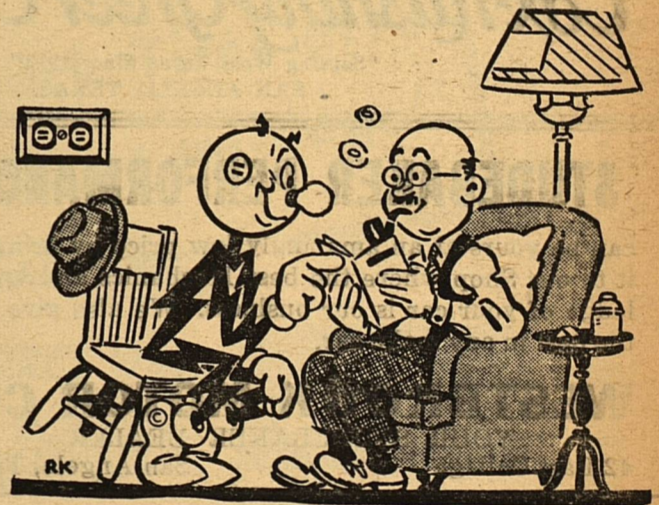

SGT. LEWIS KERR BUILDS HOUSE IN FURLOUGH

M-Tech.-Sgt. Lewis Kerr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Kerr of this city, has broken into print in a big way by building his own house at Costa Mesa, California, during a sixty-day furlough, in spite of the fact that he never did anything of that sort before.

A California daily carries the story of his adventures, together with a picture of him and his partly completed house. The story reads thus:

Houses have been built many times in the past within a period of sixty days, but Marine Master Technical Sgt. Lewis Kerr of El Toro Marine Base, who never laid one brick upon another until a few weeks ago, is determined to complete his pumice brick home in Costa Mesa within a period of two months—because he must.

Sgt. Kerr, a native of Texas, is working alone in the construction of his new home, except for the aid of his wife. The haste with which the place is being constructed is due to the fact that the sergeant is on a sixty-day leave from the Marine corps before he is once again shipped overseas.

The Kerrs decided to build the house in Costa Mesa after a recent experience of paying a sky-rocket figure for a three-room apartment in Santa Ana where he and his wife had to share a bathroom with nine other people.

Construction of the four-room house is doubly difficult for the sergeant because of the fact that prior to building the house he knew absolutely nothing about laying bricks or construction.

A friend who was building a similar-type home permitted Sgt. Kerr to mortar three of his pumice bricks together. That was the extent of his training before stepping up with several hundred blocks of pumice, plaster, lumber and a large amount of energy to tackle his own project.

The four-room home is approximately one third completed at the present time, with Kerr confident that it will be finished before he must leave. Veteran of twenty-one months service overseas at such familiar places as Midway, New Hebrides, Russel Islands, 5½ months aboard the Bunker Hill, and recently taking part in the Bikini tests, the overseas trip will be nothing new to the sergeant, not as new as building a home without much else besides gumption.

Kerr and his wife have been sleeping in a tent on the rear of the grounds while work has been in progress. He has seen six years service with the marines and recently reenlisted for another four. He visited home folks a number of months ago.
