CHARLIE TRIGG MAKES PURCHASE OF CARROLL STA.

Charlie Trigg, proprietor of Charlie Trigg Motors has expanded his business and increased his motor service by purchase of Vernon Carroll's Magnolia Station, adjoining his business at the South.

The deal, which was at first planned to become effective on the first, was put into effect Wednesday morning, when Trigg took over the station at Carroll's request.

Mr. Trigg has no definite announcement to make today concerning employees who will operate the station, but will probably have his plans worked out in the coming few days.

The buildings housing the Ford business and the station are both the property of Mrs. McWhorter. The deal will enable the Ford man to give one-stop service, with buildings and driveway arranged for the maximum convenience of the mechanics and the driving public. A street entrance now gives easy access to the mechanics' room in which are housed the repair and and testing equipment and washing and greasing racks.

Vernon Carroll has been in business in Eldorado a year and a half, opening the shop in February, 1946, after he returned from service to make his home in Eldorado. He added a welding shop to the service station and has been operating both. Recently his brother, Tom Carroll, returned to this city from San Angelo and has been assisting with the work.

Mr. Carroll sold his station with plans in mind for immediate re-establishment. He bought a 30 x 100 foot lot from the Townsite Co., almost across the street from his present location and at the rear of the Harris Magnolia, and on Tuesday morning three carpenters went on the job laying the foundation of a 30 x 40 foot stucco shop building. Here the welding shop will be reopened, along with a mechanical department for motor repairs, about August 10. The new building will have tin roof, stuccoed walls and cement and asphalt floor.

The back of the lot will be reserved for a residence which they may build later.

STANFORD BROS. SELL TOP PRICED CORRIEDALE RAM

Three young Schleicher County boys lived up to the reputation established by their father and their grandfather when they sold the top-priced Corriedale yearling ram in the 11th Corriedale sale at San Angelo Saturday.

The ram went for \$350 to P. F. Fitzgerald of Sabinal, vice president of the Association.

The Stanford brothers are the three sons of Truett C. Stanford, secretary of the Association. Sonny is 17, Truett Kent is 13 and Jack is 11. Their grandfather, S. L. Stanford, has bred Corriedales for years.

Though their animal placed 4th in the show, it brought top price in the sale, which is partially accounted for by the fact that the boys sheared it before showing it, to reveal its body contour.

The boys have been raising Corriedales several years, the venture netting them considerably more than pocket money each year.

The Texas Corriedale Sheep Breeders Association met in regular session Thursday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock immediately following the Corriedale Sheep Show at the Fields and Johnson Sale in San Angelo. Plans for an all Texas Corriedale sale in 1948 were discussed and a committee was appointed to look into the advisability of such a sale, and to have a report ready not later than the meeting which will be held next spring at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show.

Another committee was appointed by the president to investigate the possibility of having the stud rams that are consigned annually to the Corriedale Sale at San Angelo, shorn either at time of the sale or at a prearranged date in order for it to be possible for the man who buys his studs to see the sheep out of the fleece before being sold. This committee diligently went to work and conferred with the consignors who were present at the sale this year and had a report ready the following day as to tentative agreement with the consignors as to just how this should be done. The final arrangement was that these stud rams be shorn to the skin by machine on a specified date (probably after January 1, 1948) and this shearing date to be certified to by some public official, a county agent or vocational agriculture teacher. This arrangement to be made compulsory with any breeder who wishes to consign Stud rams to the 1948 show and sale.

Another tentative plan worked out by this committee is to have a show class for yearling stud rams that will be delivered to the grounds in full fleece, then shorn and judged out of the wool. This committee composed of P. F. Fitzgerald, Sabinal; W. F. Volkmann, Menard; Art King, Cheyenne, Wyo. and Wesley Wooden of Dixon, California. The first committee to look into the possibility of an all-Texas Sale was composed of T. E. Bergman, Round Mountain; and Dean Hopf of Harper. These two men were instructed to try and engage the services of Guy Powell of Kerrville, county agent for Kerr County, to act as secretary and manager of the sale. Bergman and Hopf contacted Powell the next morning and he was in agreement and consented to take the job.

Officers elected for the new year are: H. C. Noelke, Sheffield, President; P. F. Fitzgerald, Sabinal, Vice President; T. C. Stanford, Eldorado, Secretary Treasurer.

New directors are: Dean Hopf, Harper; H. H. Angel, Plano; G. C. Magruder, Merton; Sparks Rust, Del Rio; W. M. Arnold, Blanco.

Tax Rate Set

The state tax board has set the new tax rate at 72 cents as compared with 37 cents last year, and Schleicher County court set the rate at 99 cents, which is three cents lower than last year's \$1.02. This makes the county and state tax rate \$1.71 for the coming year.

EQUALIZATION BOARD MEETS ALL DAY SAT.

Whether the school board of equalization will twiddle their thumbs or require assistance in untangling traffic snarls is anybody's guess, as the special board prepares to hold an all-day session Saturday.

Appointed to act officially on school tax complaints, the board is composed of Ervin Mund, Forrest Runge and L. D. Ochsner.

As have most neighboring districts, the local school has found it necessary to work out plans for increasing the total tax income for the coming year, heavy costs in teacher salary payments and other school expenses making this imperative.

The city having reworked the rolls recently, the school took their assessments from the city tax rolls, added one third, and then took forty percent of the total. This will be the school tax on city property.

Pasture land will all be rendered at \$6 per acre and farm land at \$12. The school recently mailed out rendition notices to all Schleicher County taxpayers.

HEART ATTACK PROVES FATAL FOR J. H. DEATON

John Henry Deaton, father of Mrs. Lewis Wilson of this city, died at 1:30 on the morning of July 27 at Shannon Hospital, San Angelo, after three weeks' illness. He had suffered a heart attack after an operation performed at Shannon Hospital, where he was taken when he became ill while visiting in the Wilson home. His death came as a surprise to his family as he was seemingly recovering well from his operation when he suffered the fatal heart attack.

The body was brought to Eldorado where it lay in state at the Ratliff Funeral Home, from where it was taken overland Wednesday to Comstock, for funeral services at 4:00 Wed. afternoon. The funeral was held at the community church in Comstock, with the Rev. F. B. Faust of the Eldorado Methodist Church officiating. He had been a Methodist for thirty-five years, and was a steward and trustee. He had worked for thirty years for the TN & O Railroad, living for awhile at Comstock and later moving to Longfellow.

He was born in Val Verde County and spent all of his life in Texas. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mattie Bell Deaton; four sons, T. L. of Del Paso Heights, Calif.; M. L. of Concord, California, C. A. of Port Chicago, Calif.; and C. H. of San Demas, Calif.; a daughter, Mrs. Lewis Wilson of Eldorado; four brothers, Arthur of Comstock, Ira of Del Rio, Clyde of Sierra Blanca, and Fred of Ozona; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Wyatt, Comstock, and Mrs. Dick Brotherton of Del Rio; nine grandchildren, and other relatives and friends.

Cars leaving Eldorado Wednesday morning were driven by Arthur Deaton, Dick Brotherton, M. V. Deaton, T. L. Deaton, Marvin Logan (a pallbearer), Lewis Wilson and C. A. and C. H. Deaton—the relatives having gathered here when informed of the death.

Bracketville picked up six easy scores in their first line at bat, but after that they had to play ball. As the game moved on through its nine innings Eldorado cut down their opponent's lead, and the game ended 11 to 12.

In spite of the fact that Sunday's game had to start at 12:00 o'clock noon, it opened before a large crowd of spectators and proved to be a hum dinger. It was a hard-fought pitchers battle and ended with a score of one to one at the end of nine innings, when the field had to be released. The Black Cats got their score in the first inning and Bracketville got their lone tally in the sixth.

Bill Bilbo of San Angelo did the pitching for the Black Cats on Sunday, and Arel Jones of Angelo was on the mound Saturday. Red West of Angelo did the catching.

The tally sheets show that in Sunday's game the Black Cats got five hits and the Panthers four. Plans now are that Bracketville will come back for another contest here on August 16 and 17. These dates will be confirmed later.

There was a large crowd of spectators and a great deal of enthusiasm at both games. Manager McNeal says that a number of fans among the white folks have come forward and guaranteed the cost of new uniforms for the entire team.

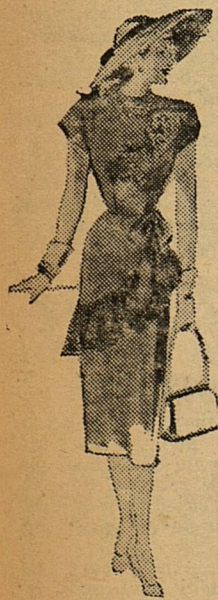

New Remedy For Fleece Worms

The County Agent's office presents a new and efficient remedy for fleece worms.

The remedy consists of a proper mixture of Benzine as a killer, diphenyl as a protective chemical, Triton 770 as a wetting agent, and n-butyl alcohol as a combining agent.

Use of the remedy

In treating a sheep infested with fleece worms the extent of the infested area should first be determined. Sufficient of the remedy should then be poured onto the area to wet the wool, not only in the infested area but also for about two inches beyond. It is best to treat the outer portion of the infested area first to prevent worms from crawling into the uninfested wool. It is not necessary to rub or otherwise work the mixture in, as it penetrates the wool readily. The liquid may be poured from a bottle or small-mouthed can. Whatever container is used, it should be a type that can be tightly closed when not in use. Approximately a pint of the liquid is needed to treat the average case of fleece worms. However, if care is taken to wet thoroughly the infested area and the bordering region, a single application is usually sufficient to effect a cure. Additional applications of the remedy should be made whenever the wound becomes reinfested. —W. G. Godwin, County Agent.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

Last week I took part by invitation in a weekly forum and debate before the student body at Catholic University in Washington. The subject pertained to labor relations and the application of the Taft-Hartley Act. On the other side was Gerhard Van Arkel, until recently general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board. Also during the week, I addressed the Texas A & M Ex-Students Club in Washington at their monthly dinner. Mr. James A. Williamson, formerly on the A & M faculty, now with the Department of Agriculture is President of the local group and Congressman Olin Teague of Bryan is Vice-President.

One of the hardest-working congresses in modern history ended its first session last week. The special-interest pressure groups will find much fault with what was done. The same will be true of the isolationists who think America should ignore the rest of the world in planning the peace. The same is true of the pro-Russians like Henry Wallace who think the Soviets should be encouraged to gobble up and communize most of Europe.

In this column next week will appear a brief summary of this session's accomplishments and some of its failures. I plan to return to the district early in August and will have an office in the Post Office Building in San Angelo, where I will be each Monday. It happens, however, that about the middle of August it will be necessary for me to go to the west coast for three weeks. There I will join a

sub-committee which has been assigned the task of investigating racketeering in connection with the marketing and distribution of food. Many complaints from that area have come in, and the investigation may expose some very bad practices that call for legislation where interstate commerce is involved.

join the Washington Redskins for a try-out in professional football this Fall. The team will leave this week for a month of training in California.

On the last day of the session the House passed the wool bill, and sent it to the White House. It continues the purchase program through 1948 at the same prices that were paid for 1946.

Our fear is that the State Department will reduce the wool tariff later this year. The present

tariff on wool brings in about \$130,000,000 a year in revenue. President Truman, when recently asked about a possible reduction in the tariff, discounted that likelihood. But it remains a threat.

The agriculture appropriation was finally agreed upon last week. It provides for \$265 million for soil conservation practices this year, and contains a provision this amount will be cut to \$150 million next year, and also provides that next year no individual can receive more than \$500.

Hot Weather Hints On Health

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take, to prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits ninety five degrees and above. Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as forty to fifty grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Heat cramps is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating.

It is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramps.

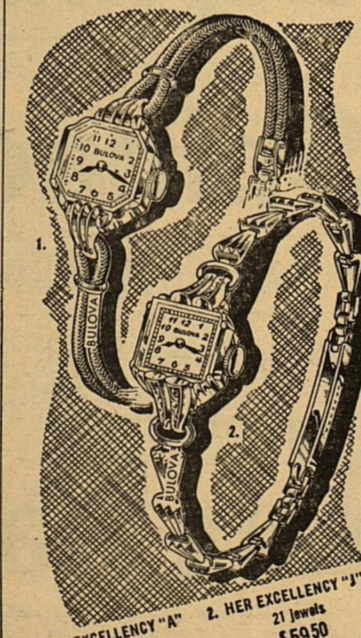

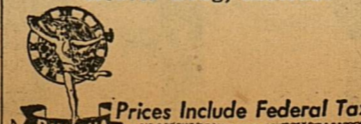
