New Remedy For Fleece Worms

The County Agent's office preor fleece worms. The remedy consists of a proper mixture of Benzine as a killer,

liphenyl as a protective chemical Triton 770 as a wetting agent, and n-butyl alcohyl as a combining

In treating a sheep infested with fleece worms the extent of the in-fested area should first be determined. Sufficient of the remedy should then be poured onto the area to wet the wool, not only in the infested area but also for about two inches beyond. It is best to treat the outer portion of the infested area first to prevent worms from crawling into the uninfested wool. It is not necessary to rub or otherwise work the mixture in, as it penetrates the wool readily. The liquid may be poured from a bottle or small-mouthed can. Whatever container is used, it should be a type that can be tightly closed when not in use. Approximately pint of the liquid is needed to

treat the average case of fleece worms. However, if care is taken







Hot Weather Hints On Health

If your work is such that it couses excessive perspiration add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take, to prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible invesce in the property of heart. le increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits ninety five degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat pro-fusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as forty to fifty grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Heat cramps is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the ab-dominal muscles begin to cramp Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating.

sweating. It is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramps.


