CHILD INJURED IN ACCIDENT AT RUST RANCH

Joyce Ann, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. King, had her big toe almost cut off in an accident this past weekend while the family were visiting with Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Donaldson near Menard. The group were attending a barbecue on the Rust ranch 17 miles from Junction, and the children were wading in the river when a large rock which she was attempting to crawl on, fell on Joyce Ann's foot, almost severing the toe.

A Mr. Long, who was attending the barbecue, rushed the child and her parents to Junction where a physician took eleven stitches to close the wound. The Kings returned home Sunday night, and Joyce Ann is doing very nicely although it will be some time before she can walk on her foot.

Gardening Questions Discussed By Agent

It's fall gardening time again, and the questions have begun to roll into the County Agent's office. "What do I plant, when and where, in a fall garden?" That is what most gardeners are asking.

In August and early September, plant only your heat-tolerant vegetables, that is, the ones that can take late summer and early fall heat and do well. These include onion sets, mustard, turnips, green beans, potatoes, squash, radish and cabbage. Don't wait too long to plant the frost-tender vegetables like potatoes, beans and squash.

And don't fill up all your garden space now. Leave room for your later planting of spinach, beets, carrots, and lettuce.

When you start planting, put in only a few feet of row space at a time, wait a couple of weeks or so, and then plant some more, repeating the same job at two to three week intervals. Get those planting dates scattered out a bit, and you'll have fresh vegetables for a long time this fall. If you want vegetables to grow off fast and tender, apply four to five pounds of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer to each 100 feet of row space.—W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent.

Local Men Buy House Trailers

Two Eldorado men, Norman E. Fred and C. C. Novak, were listed among the 9 successful bidders attending the sale of twenty-two surplus government house trailers, conducted by War Assets Administration at Brady this week. Both of the men live at Doc's Place in Eldorado.

A total of 39 bidders attended the sale which saw George LeHue, WAA sales officer, dispose of the house trailers to the highest bidders in only 29 minutes. Fred obtained one trailer for \$300 while Novak with a bid of \$425 likewise obtained one.

Largest purchasers were two Monahan bidders, J. C. Gauvey and L. E. Shisler, who were successful in buying eight and six trailers respectively. Gauvey intends to establish a trailer camp for truck drivers at Monahan. Other successful bidders came from San Angelo, Brownwood, Coleman, Alpine and Brady.

H. P. Strauss, representing the Fidelity Detective Agency with offices in San Angelo, was here this week offering ranchers protection against cattle and sheep theft. He reported that such thievery is becoming wide-spread in nearby counties.

SUTTON GETS WILDCAT

Lloyd S. Parker, San Benito, last Thursday staked a 4,100-foot combination rotary and cable tool wildcat in east-central Sutton Co. as No. 1 Meta B. Rieck, 2,310 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 26, block C, GH and SA survey.

Located on a farmout from Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company, Fort Worth, the new wildcat is five miles west of Roosevelt, which is in western Kimble County.

ALL-TIME HIGH IN WATER USE IS ESTABLISHED

Following a record month in water consumption, the past month established another new all-time high, according to report from the city office. While exact totals are not available as yet, it is estimated that the month's water revenue will be \$250 more than for any previous month in the history of the city.

A drop in the next month's totals is anticipated — not because of rain, but because most gardens have passed their productive stages and the highway work is over.

COLORED TEAMS AT IT AGAIN HERE THIS WEEK-END

The Eldorado Black Cats and the Bracketville Panthers—the two colored baseball teams who put on a rousing tie game here several weeks ago—are out to settle it once and for all this weekend with two more games scheduled on the Eldorado ball grounds.

The white team will be out of town with a game scheduled at Lockett, and the colored teams have scheduled their games at 3:00 p. m., on Saturday and Sunday, August 16 and 17.

Clarence McNeal and Jack Hoskins, managers of the Eldorado Black Cats, have secured six of the best players at Angelo to build their team including "Red" and Bilbo as pitcher and catcher. The Bracketville Panthers are reported to be importing players from San Antonio.

The admission price for each of the games will be 75c and 25c, and a large crowd is expected.

The manager announces that an order has been sent in for new suits for the Black Cats, and expresses his appreciation for the many nice donations made by the white folks. It is not likely that the suits will arrive in time for this week's game.

LIGHT SHOWERS FALL

Scattered showers fell in the county Monday with precipitation measuring an inch or more in some places. The moisture was greatly welcomed as hot dry winds blowing for the past month, have dried out grassland, and cotton is beginning to show the need of rain.

A good shower fell from L. Kent's place to Archie Mittel's in the Bailey Ranch community; Tom Alexander received about an inch and the Milton Baugh ranch west of town report three-fourths of an inch. A hard rain fell at the J. H. Boothe farm measuring about 1½ inches, and Edwin Childers at the Page Gas wells, received about ½ inch. Scattered showers were reported in other parts east of town.

Lions Club

Lion W. O. Alexander discussed the possibility of building a hospital with federal aid. Lion Hext proposed that the Lions sponsor an electric water pump at the cemetery. Other projects submitted were a camp for high school football boys to be held before school, and a manual training program for the local school. Committees will be appointed at the next meeting to investigate the costs of these projects.

Lion H. T. Finley reported on the progress of the Memorial Building, stating that impediments to the starting of the project had been removed and that the Commissioners' Court will receive contractors' bids at their meeting August 25.

New Grain Elevating Machine Received At Eldorado Wool Co.

The Eldorado Wool Company installed and placed into operation this week an Ona Air-Flow grain elevating machine capable of handling 10 to 20 tons of grain per hour. In a test run Wednesday, the machine loaded to a box car 503 bags of maize in an hour and 30 minutes.

This is a facility long needed in Eldorado and provides rapid handling of all kinds of grain, either in bulk or from sacks. Labor and sacks have always been a major cost item to the farmer and handler of grain, and this machine will eliminate that factor to a great extent.

The elevator is equipped with a twin cylinder gasoline engine, in a portable compact unit, and may be used at any place or location, irrespective of the availability of electric current.

TAX INCREASE HEARING SET FOR SATURDAY

Upping of valuations of ranch land to \$6 and farm land to \$12 will be followed by increase in valuations of the Utilities Company, telephone, Humble and Shell pipe lines, railroad, gas and similar properties, according to decision reached at a recent joint call meeting of the school board of equalizations.

Decision to do so followed discussion of the question in which it was brought out that of the \$6,000,000 in rendered value of the entire Schleicher County Rural District, \$4,000,000 was on land.

The board of equalization will meet August 16 for a hearing on complaints concerning increasing of the valuation on such Schleicher County properties as the railroad, Shell pipe line, Humble pipe line, telephone and others. This is two weeks later than the hearing on other increases, held on July 2.

The school has increased the valuation of ranch land to \$6 and farm land to \$12; in increasing valuation of city property they arrived at figures by taking the city's recently re-worked rolls, adding a third, then taking 40% of the total.

The equalization board is composed of Ervin Mund, Forrest Runge and L. D. Ochsner.

COMMISSIONERS AND ARCHITECT IN MON. SESSION

An architect meeting Monday with the commissioners to discuss plans for the memorial building, reported that contractors have been too busy elsewhere to place their bids for the job. The time for receiving bids has been extended to August 25, when there will be a call meeting of the court to open bids. Judge Meador reports that the court will reserve the right to reject any or all bids if they are not satisfactory.

Commissioners reported that road equipment of precincts 1 and 4 is at Reynolds, working on caliche of that road, which will probably be completed before school opens.

MANY ATTEND REA MEETING

The second annual meeting of the Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative, Inc., was here Tuesday, August 12, with business meeting, election of directors, electrical appliance display and big barbecue highlighting the day's program.

P. K. McIntosh, president of the board of directors, presided at the business meeting which was held in the court house. Ford Oglesby was elected to the board of directors to succeed T. W. Johnson, who has resigned; with the other members, consisting of Mr. McIntosh, Forrest Runge, W. R. Bearce, Joe B. Edens, W. W. Sheen and J. V. Drisdale, elected for another year. Don McCormick, manager, in his annual report, emphasized the great increase in number of members during the past year. He discussed shortages of materials as they affect the building of new line; gave his opinions on future shipments of material from latest information gathered at the meeting he had attended in Austin; and introduced members of the local crew and office force. Mr. Zimmerman of the Westinghouse Electric Supply explained reasons for shortages of aluminum wire, which is the big "bottleneck" now in the building of new lines here.

Mr. McCormick reported that seven carloads of poles have arrived in Sonora with twelve or fifteen carloads more to go. All of these poles will be used in Section C, which extends south through Juno. After the business meeting the members adjourned to the barbecue pit, also to the Parker Motor Company building, where a large display of electrical appliances was shown by local dealers, including Elder Oil Company, Westinghouse; Cameron Hardware, Maytag; Boyer's Electric Shop, Philco and Norge; Blake's Electric Shop, Frigidaire; and Williams and McAngus, Launderall, Gibson, and Myers.

A large crowd attended the barbecue on the courthouse lawn, plans for which were made by a committee consisting of Joe B. Edens, W. R. Bearce and W. W. Sheen.
