## Luedecke Child Improving After Fall From Car

Sherry Kay Luedecke, who will be three years old September 4, is recovering at the Clinic Hospital in San Angelo from injuries which she received when she fell from a moving car last Thursday morning on the Sonora highway.

Given little chance to recover at first, the child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Luedecke, Jr., is making an apparently miraculous recovery from a brain concussion, but will be confined to the hospital for some time yet.

Mr. and Mrs. Luedecke and their two children, Mickey Jay and Sherry were accompanying Mr. Luedecke's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Redford and their two children to their home at Kent when the accident happened.

The two men and their sons were riding in a pickup, with Mrs. Redford, Mrs. Luedecke and the two girls following in the car. Noticing that the back door was not locked, Mrs. Redford told her daughter to lock it. Both children put their hands on the handle at the same time, the door came open, and the little girl fell to the highway with the car travelling at a rate of about forty-five miles per hour.

Although apparently not injured at first, Sherry was taken to Sonora for examination, and was sitting up playing with toys, when she suffered a brain hemorrhage caused from a head injury. The child was rushed to San Angelo accompanied by Dr. Browne, Sonora physician, who took an oxygen drum along to relieve her suffering. She was attacked by several convulsions enroute to the hospital, life almost leaving her at times.

After reaching the hospital, doctors immediately punctured the spine, draining the fluid to relieve pressure on the brain, and although she was unconscious for many hours afterwards, Sherry's condition began to improve. Sunday night when she recognized her parents for the first time. Consciousness returned much sooner than expected, and doctors and relatives are entirely hopeful of her early recovery.

Wednesday afternoon another rain, measuring 1 inch at Jackson's, .75 in Eldorado, .90 at Archie Mittel's, and 1 inch at Runge's,—covered much of the county.

The company offered to put in this main line and to install dial phones, with some concessions from the customers, and it is understood that enough signers to put over the project have already been secured.

## August Is Time For Child's Check-Up

School days will soon be here again. Thousands of Texas boys and girls and teachers will be returning to the schools. Each child entering school should be as free as possible of any physical defects which can be corrected. The earlier these are corrected the better chance the child has for academic progress and for good social and emotional development, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

August is the time for a complete medical and dental check-up. Eyes, ears, nose, throat, and teeth should be carefully examined by the family doctor and dentist, and all remediable defects corrected. If such defects are neglected, they may result in serious damage to growth and development.

Dental corrections often take time, but a person is repaid many times over for good dental care. Healthy teeth lend attractiveness to the personal appearance, enable thorough chewing of food, and promote general good health.

In schoolrooms, children expose each other to many communicable diseases, especially the common cold and diseases such as measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and diphtheria. Protect the child from diphtheria and whooping cough, as well as smallpox, by safe and dependable immunization.

Parents, see that your child has complete protective treatment against preventable diseases; a clean healthy throat and mouth; the best possible vision and hearing; adequate diet, sleep and rest to build up resistance against disease. It will pay good dividends, and your child will be ready for school.

### New Traffic Law In Effect Sept. 5

There is no reason why anyone should be confused by the new traffic safety law that goes into effect Sept. 5. The law itself is long and legal-sounding, but it boils down to good, sound horse-sense.

We are just getting rid of the old regulations, passed back in 1917 in the Model T days, and bringing them up to date. Ninety per cent of the things required by the new law are already being done by the average good driver, and the other ten per cent are things he knows he ought to be doing but isn't.

In the fewest possible words, here are the highlights of the Uniform Traffic Code, as the new law is called:

People walking are required to cross streets and highways at designated cross-walks where these are provided; to use sidewalks where they can, or to walk facing the traffic, on the left side of the road, where there is no sidewalk. A pedestrian in a cross-walk has the right-of-way over all vehicles. These are the first real pedestrian regulations we have ever had in Texas, and the observance of them will keep a lot of people from "walking themselves to death."

Drivers are required to stay on the right side of the road, with certain sensible exceptions; dangerous maneuvers in passing are outlawed; right-of-way rules are set out; teeth are put into the stop-sign law; the safe manner of making turns and stops is designated, and uniform hand-and-arm signals are required for these maneuvers.

Following radiator-to-bumper is forbidden, and so is racing trains to crossings. Parking on a highway is outlawed except when the vehicle is out of order and cannot be moved. Drivers are required to dim their lights 500 feet from an approaching vehicle at night.

Driving while under the influence of drugs is about the same as driving while drunk under the new law even if the drugs were given by a dentist or doctor.

One part of the law that will make it rough on deliberately dangerous drivers is the new reckless driving clause. As it is now, a man can drive recklessly without violating any specific law, such as speeding, and the officers cannot do anything with him. But under this new clause the reckless driver has a special noose to stick his head into.

The code requires every vehicle to have good lights and brakes and a horn. Trucks and busses must also have mechanical signalling devices when they are built so that hand-and-arm signals cannot be readily seen.

Anyone who has a highway accident must stop and identify himself, give any help that is needed, and immediately notify the nearest Highway Patrol or Sheriff's office. The driver must also make a written report to the Department of Public Safety within twenty-four hours if anyone is killed or hurt or if damage amounts to \$25 or more.

These accident reports are very important. They are confidential and are not used to get evidence against a driver, but to help the Highway Department figure out where and when and why accidents are happening, so that whatever

is necessary can be done to prevent future accidents—whether the remedy be engineering, education, or enforcement.

All traffic control signs and signals put up hereafter by any city or county or the State Highway Department will have to be like those used in most other states. This is to make it so that a person driving from one city to another, or from one state to another, can find his way around without being confused.

### Diabetes Takes Lives Of Several Hundred

Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While deaths from the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria, and small-pox are decreasing in this country, diabetes is still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group," Dr. Cox said.

"Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem, but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed."

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions apparently are factors, since it seems a fact that those persons whose occupations call for manual labor and simple living are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.

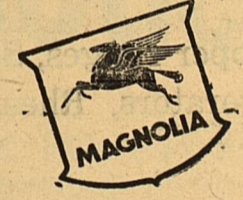

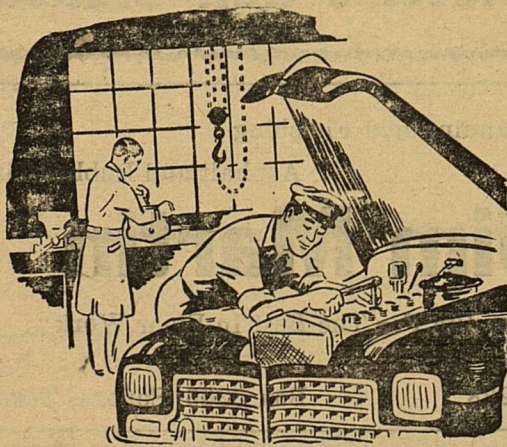

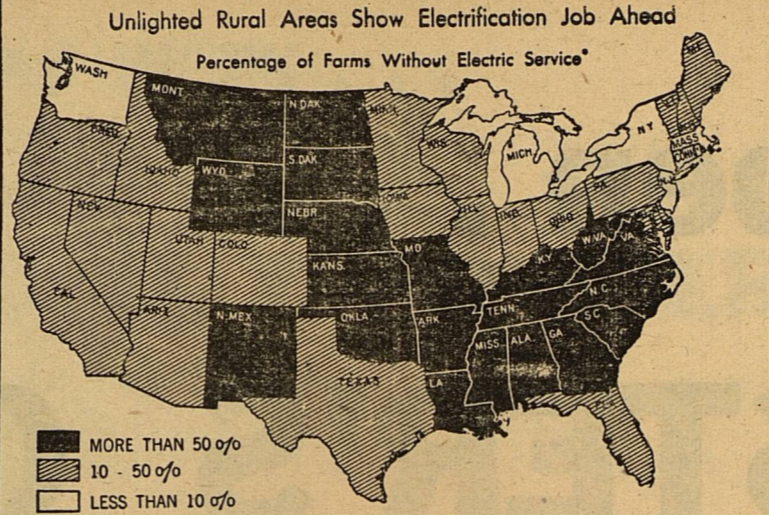

Much Unlighted Area Left For REA



Texas still has 178,300 farms without electric service, according to a report just sent by REA to the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op of Eldorado, President P. K. McIntosh announced.

About 2,500,000 of the Nation's farms still do not have service. Great progress has been made, however, during the past twelve years, when the percentage of farms with electricity increased from 10.9 in 1935 to 57.4 as of the first of this year. In Texas, the figure has risen from 2.3% in 1935 to 55.2% now.

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-op has plans for expanding service to 175 rural consumers in this area, most of them ranches, within the next few months, McIntosh reported, and eventually it expects to add 250 other consumers, bringing electric service to everyone in the whole service area who wants it. He reported that the cooperative, organized in 1941 and financed with loans from the Rural Electrification Administration, now has 262 miles of line serving 220 consumers in Schleicher, Sutton, and Menard Counties.

"Our construction program has gone ahead much slower than we had expected," Mr. McIntosh said. "Nevertheless, we added eighty families to our lines during the past twelve months. We are building new lines just as fast as we can accumulate materials, men and money necessary to do the work. A year ago we had about 200 applicants for service, and now we have 250. Our principal difficulty at present is getting wire; but so long as any rural family in this area cannot have electricity, our construction program cannot be considered finished. So long as Texas has 178,300 farms without electricity, we still have a long way to go."

Washington Letter

The score board on the first session of the 80th Congress shows a fairly good batting average.

1. It enacted a new labor law designed to give the public badly needed protection against the whims and abuses of certain irresponsible labor leaders. The success of the new law, like the success of any law, will depend largely upon the vigor of its enforcement and the efficiency of its administration. This measure had the overwhelming support of both democrats and republicans in the House which passed it 4-to-1 and the Senate gave it a better than two-thirds vote.

2. The Congress enacted a bill to outlaw the big \$7 billion portal-to-portal phony lawsuit racket being pushed by the CIO.

3. The session merged the armed services. This new law, designed to strengthen our defenses and eliminate overlapping of commands and procurement, is considered by Gen. Eisenhower and Admiral Nimitz as being of the highest importance to the strength and security of our country. For the first time, the Air Force is put on an equal footing with the Army and the Navy, all under one Secretary of National Defense who will be a Cabinet member.

4. On recommendation of President Truman, a law was passed making the speaker of the House next in line to succeed the President where there is no Vice-President.

5. War veterans were given the right to cash their terminal leave bonds if they desire. Nearly \$7 billion was voted to meet the annual budget requirements for the Veterans Administration. This includes hospital construction and all aid and benefits to war veterans.

6. Rent control, with some adjustments, was continued to February 29, 1948.

7. Upwards of \$75 million was provided to blot out the foot and mouth infestation in Mexico. The latter country is likewise a heavy contributor in the battle.

8. Congress passed a bill to continue the wool purchase program through 1948 on the same basis as in 1946.

9. The national budget was balanced for the first time in more than a decade and a payment was made on the national debt. A total of nearly \$3 million was lopped off the annual budget, and many wartime controls and restrictions were lifted or limited.

10. The budget for the armed services, involving our national security were hardly touched by the economy ax. Nearly \$9 billion was provided to carry our armed forces through the fiscal year. That supports an army of 1,070,000 and a navy of 500,000.

11. The first postwar treaties with Bulgaria, Italy and Rumania, were ratified by the Senate.

12. The so-called Truman Doctrine, putting America on the side of those who oppose being gobbled up by communism, was in effect given bi-partisan congressional approval.

The degree of success of a session is measured not alone by what laws are passed, but, of equal or more importance, by what it fails to pass.

This session refused to enact a law to break down our immigration law and allow 400,000 eastern Europeans from displaced persons camps to come in.

A proposal to socialize the practice of medicine was given a cold shoulder, and action on a bill to increase the minimum wage was postponed to the next session. Likewise, no action was taken at this session on proposed federal aid to education. A huge housing subsidy program, opposed by the American Legion, got nowhere.

A bill to set up a system of military training was given a favorable committee report but failed to reach the floor for a vote, and therefore goes over to the next session. The bill is important because it deals with our national preparedness program.

Prospects for slight tax reduction by 1948 went out the window with a presidential veto.

So, all in all, the degree of success of this session depends upon the way you look at it. It has been a session remarkably free from lobby pressure, as evidenced by the passage of the labor bill, the portal to portal bill and non-passage of the immigration proposal which was supported by twenty-three registered lobbyists. This latter group is highly financed and has a nation-wide organization at work.

This is the last Newsletter of the year. Our Washington office will remain open and one will be opened in the Post Office building at San Angelo. I plan to cover most of the district during the Fall and shall be glad to talk with anyone who has any problem wherein I may be of assistance. It will be necessary for me to go to the West Coast about August 15 for some committee hearings, and other hearings on proposed amendments to the Wage and Hour Act are set in Washington for mid-October.

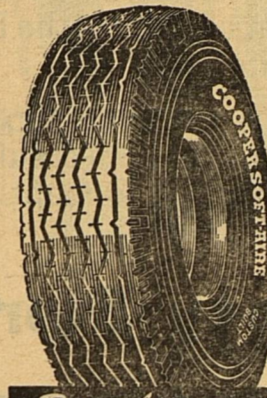

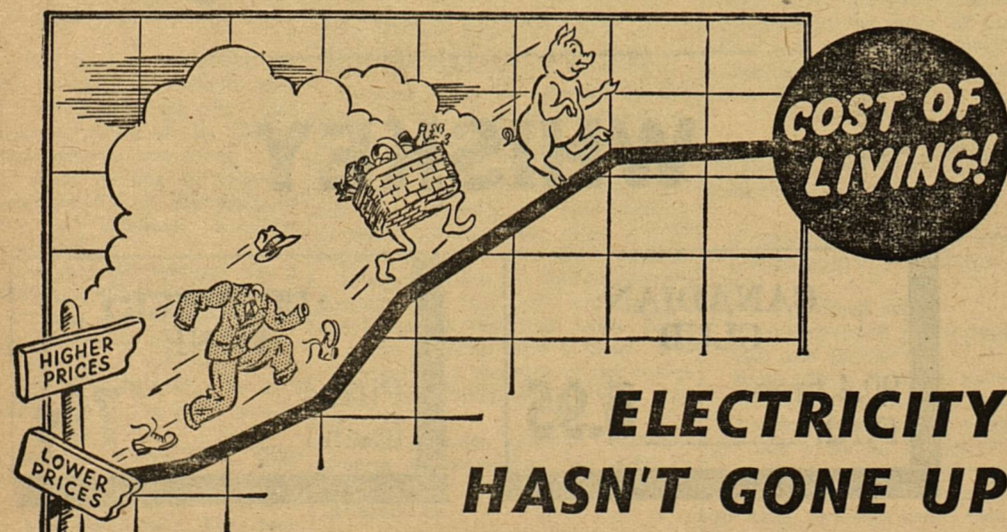

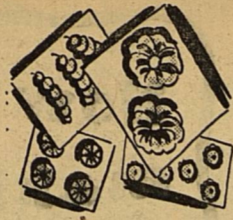

Mrs. Williams served refreshments to fourteen members.

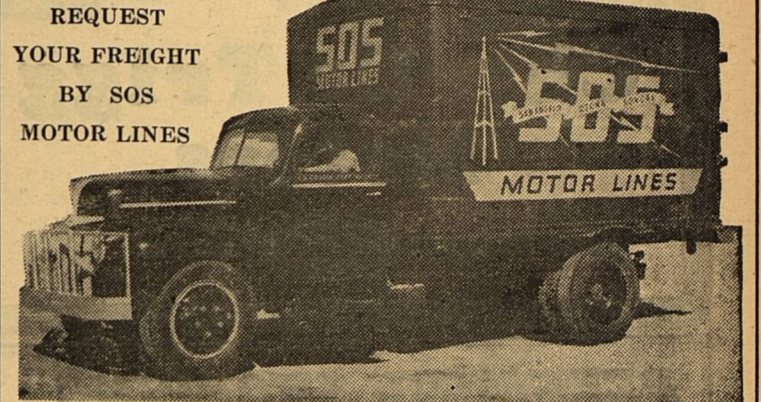
**MAJOR ELDER VISITS MRS. WEST, GRANDMOTHER**

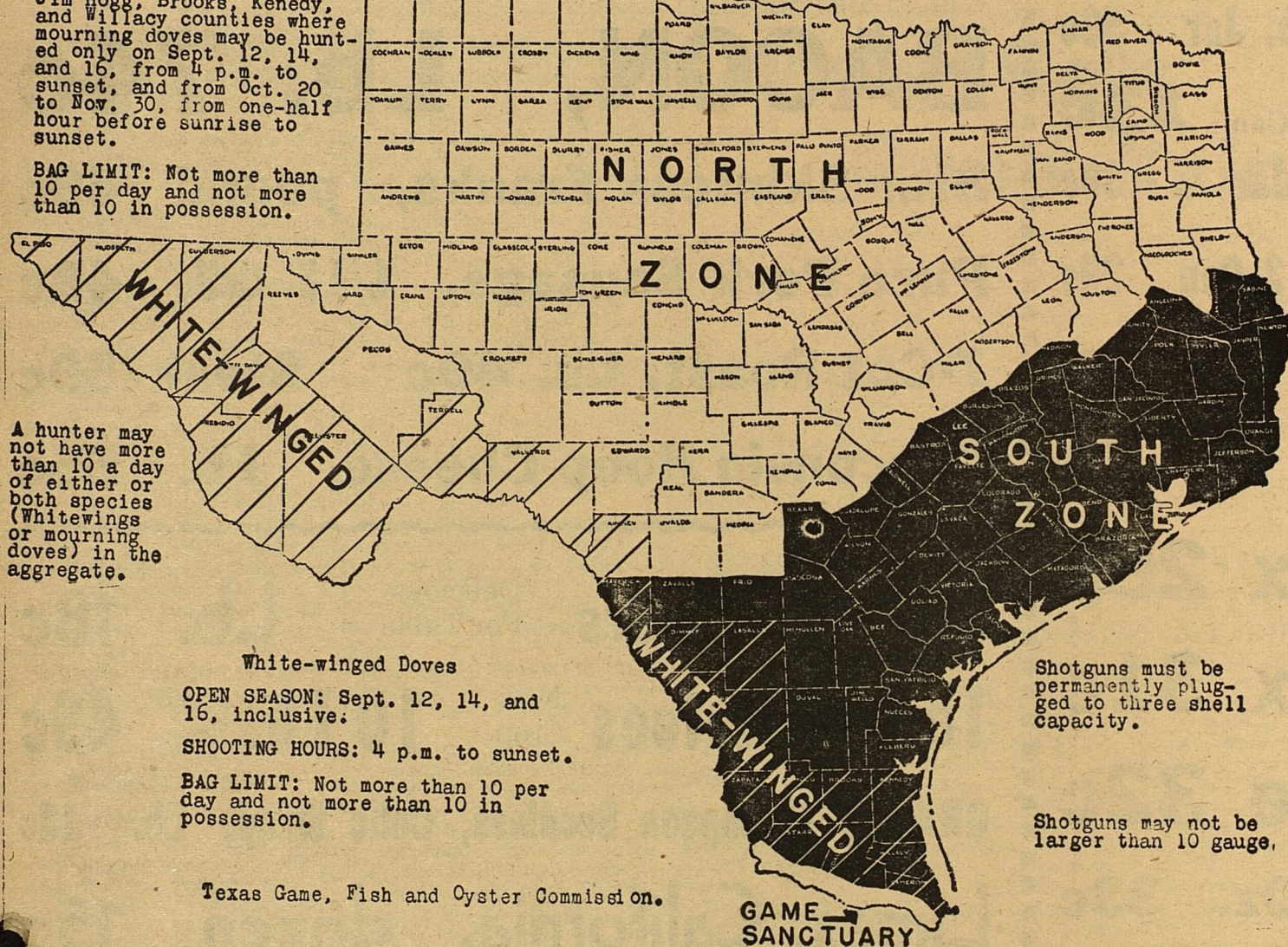

## SKELLY OIL CO. BUYS OUT LOWE IN JACKSON TEST

That Skelly Oil Co. will drill a wildcat on the Jackson place is a recent development in Schleicher County's oil history.

Ralph Lowe of Midland, who recently secured his 3264-acre block west of Eldorado, turned it over to Skelly, retaining one sixteenth of his seven-eighths interest in the leases. He had expected to make location near the old Opp No. 1 Jackson well which eight years ago pumped oil from 4049-81 foot depth. (Location of Opp: 1005 from N., 2070 from E., sec. 41-LI-TORR, 2 1/2 miles northeast of Eldorado.)

Lowe expects to drill 7000 feet if necessary to explore Ellenburger, location to be staked and start to be made soon.

Al P. Groehl No. 1 Jess Koy, the field's "problem child", is doing better by upping its oil and decreasing the water. This well pumps 55 to 60 barrels of oil daily and 15 of water, after acid treatment. Location is C NW SW 34-L-GH&SA.

Shell pipe line is receiving the oil, which is being run into Cooper Gas Co.'s gathering system and from there to Shell. J. D. (Jelly) Henderson, who is operating this lease in which he has an interest, is co-owner, with J. R. Dunaway of Longview, of Western Drilling, Koy-Page field.

Chapman and McFarland No. 1 Luke Robinson wildcat is nearing contract depth. No reports of oil showings have been put out by officials. Location of this wildcat is C SW SW 49-T-GH&SA. It is 7 miles northeast of the Page producers.

Oil showings in lime have been reported recently from the Hayden Baugh Est. Al Groehl wildcat, now drilling past 5800 feet. This test, about 5 miles from Eldorado on the Rudd road, and about 4 1/2 miles north of the producing field, is C SE SE 8M-GH&SA.

## NEW LINE OF TRUCKS ANNOUNCED BY GMC

## MEAT RECIPES

**Pancake-Meat Folders**  
**Meat Filling**  
 2 cups chopped cooked meat  
 2 cups gravy or medium white sauce

1-2 cup diced celery  
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
 Salt and pepper

Heat gravy or white sauce made with meat drippings. Add chopped left-over meat, celery, green pepper and pimento. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Bake pancakes.

Place a spoonful of meat mixture on each pancake and fold over. Serve the rest of the meat mixture poured over the folded pancakes or in a separate bowl.

**Pancakes**  
 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 3-4 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard  
 1 egg  
 1 1/2 cups milk  
 4 tablespoons melted drippings or lard

Sift together flour with baking powder, salt and mustard. Beat egg, add milk and beat together. Add melted drippings or lard to milk and egg. Pour the liquid ingredients into the flour mixture and stir only until flour is moistened. Bake pancakes on a hot greased griddle turning only once. Yield: 8 to 10 large pancakes.
