One of the better wells in the Koy-Page field has been brought in this week, as Cooper Gas Co. 3-E Page, (C SW NW 33-L-GH & SA) takes its place in Schleicher County's oil history as a good producer. The hole was cemented on the bottom at 5,800 feet. The well is reported to be making about 600 barrels per day.

Completion of another good well in the Page field comes at a time when leasing has been unusually heavy in all parts of the county especially near the City of Eldorado, and serves as further stimulus to all phases of oil activity.

Schleicher County's only resident millionaire rancher has passed

William Allen Davis, 75, who started ranching in Schleicher County with a rancher father to aid and advise and the know-how to rise to dizzy heights in the cattle world, closed his scant half century's residence here Tuesday night at his ranch home, where death claimed him.

His serious illness was of several weeks' duration. After the first attack, he rallied, though it was thought by relatives and friends leave his bed again. Death came quietly at the ranch home southeast of Eldorado, following several weeks' hospitalization in San An-

gelo. He was born Nov. 28, 1871, in Brenham, Washington County. About 1901, his father, known to his friends as "Pappy" Davis, left Williamson County and moved to Schleicher County where he bought from Jim Dabney a 28-section ranch now known as the West Ranch. This was later sold, but Davis continued to operate it under lease for over forty years, amassing a fortune from output of this bers of both organizations will ranch alone. owner. Through the early decades of this century, he steadily increased his holdings in Schleicher County until at the time of his death he owned and operated the twenty-two section ranch known as the East Ranch, the 14-section tract known as the Speck place, and an eightsection ranch known as the Nutt ley as manager of his station, which place; and operated the 40-section he recently bought from Vernon tract mentioned above, and owned tract mentioned above, and owned fifteen sections in Sterling County which he leased out.

Last year he sold his 61/2 section ranch in Sutton County to Frank

His home place, the East Ranch, located in Live Oak country, is well improved. He bought this ranch, originally composed of 14 sections, from J. E. Mills in 1906, and remodeled and improved a ranchhouse there, occupying it for 35 years. Most interesting to the passer-by is the 7-section preserve which he fenced in for his 125 deer. raising of which was one of his hobbies. 

Co. Agent's Column

Where water in stock troughs, reservoirs, or ponds is exposed to sunlight, it may become covered with a green scum or slime. The est cure for this trouble, in the ease of troughs or small reservoirs s to put a cover or roof over the water to keep out sunlight.

Green scum may be killed with pluestone (copper sulphate). After water treated with bluestone has peen used up, the scum may grow again from new seed falling in fresh water containing no bluestone. If this occurs, the treatmen nust be repeated. Since too much pluestone is injurious to livestock numans, or fish, care should be taken to add only the proper amount of bluestone to the water

Safe dosage is eight pounds per million gallons; one ounce per 8,000 gallons; or one level teaspoonful per 1500 gallons of water To apply bluestone, dissolve the proper amount in a few gallons of water in a wooden, stoneware, or enamelware container. Then slowly

stir the solution into the water to be treated. Treated water should be splashed on the trough walls to kill the scum there. In small tanks, the scum may be prevented from re-forming by put ing pieces of copper sheets or

wooden posts set in the tank. The copper will be effective a ong time unless covered with dirt

shavings in the water. This is best

done by nailing the copper sheet on

and slime. In treating ponds, the bluestone may be put in a sack and dragged through the water from a boat unti all is dissolved.

Concentrations as high as six pounds of bluestone per acre-foot of water, or twenty pounds per million gallons, have been used in ponds with no harmful effects. SHELL SAFETY MEETING HELD AT CHRISTOVAL

One hundred Shell employees and their families attended the annual Shell barbecue last Friday evening at Christoval at which the Austin Division of the Shell Pipe Line Corporation was presented the Holmes Award for safety, the nation's highest award for safety.

Robert Bradford, U. S. Bureau of Mines representative from Mc-Alister, Okla., made the presenta-tion to J. W. Hunt, Shell Safety engineer, for the Austin Division which extends from Houston to McCamey and includes Eldorado, Menard and San Angelo. The divsion had compiled a record total of 455,127 man hours worked over a period of 846 consecutive days

"The Austin Division has demonstrated to the world that it can work safely over a period of time in a hazardous industry without suffering accidents. This record is MUSIC STUDIO TO OPEN especially imposing when it is remembered that a total of 51,000 workmen were killed in accidents in 1946, including 16,000 on-the-job and 35,000 off-the-job accidents.

"It gives me extreme pleasure to see so many wives of employees present here this evening. Women play a major part in the prevention of accidents. There are fewer accidents when family relationships are good. A happy safety-minded family is the greatest insurance against accidents on and off the job and a safety engineer's fondest

"The Holmes award for Safety was established by Dr. Joseph A. Holmes in 1916," Bradford concluded.

Claude Dolhonde, new area suprintendent from Houston, was ilso present, and spoke briefly to he group.

One of those "now it can be told" tories was released by A. F. Terrill, assistant superintendent of Shell's West Texas area. He stated that both Eldorado and Garden City Shell stations were bombed by mistake in 1944 by the San Angelo Army Air field fliers who thought the lights were from the practice

At Garden City the bombs missed at Eldorado, they exploded within a few feet of the ten-inch main pipe line through which 37,000 barrels of crude oil were pumped daily to eastern refineries. Thereafter, the group were told, the station remained under black-out orders every night.


