SEVEN NEW TEACHERS JOIN LOCAL FACULTY

Teaching this year for the first time in the Eldorado Public School system will be Wilburn Curnutt, 27, head coach and teacher of social science, who comes to Eldorado from NTSC where he received both his BS and MA degrees, the latter in August of this year. At NT, he lettered in football three years and was all-conference guard. He was also in the service for several years. A graduate of the Canadian High School, he comes here well recommended.

Curnutt's wife, Mrs. Angelina Curnutt, also a graduate of NTSC, where she received her BS degree with a major in PE, will teach girls' physical education. She is a graduate of Albany High School, and has taught PE four years at North Texas, Pampa, and the past year in Dallas.

Herman Hopkins, who will teach General Science and Manual Training, will also serve as assistant football coach and head Basketball coach. A graduate of Krum High School, he attended Texas A & I at Kingsville, and later North Texas in Denton where he returned this year in June for his degree after two years in the service.

Miss Mariellen Pepper, a graduate of the Sweetwater High School, will teach Home Economics, succeeding Mrs. Howard Coleman. She received her BS degree and a 4th-Hughes certificate this spring at NTSC, Denton. Miss Pepper arrived in Eldorado this week and will room in the home of Mrs. Dora Oliver.

Public School Music will again be added to the studies with Miss May Elizabeth Burton of Abilene, employed as teacher. A graduate of TSCW, Denton, with a major in voice and minor in English, Miss Burton has spent the summer as director of music at a summer camp in Leicester, Mass.

Miss Jane Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Smith of Austin, former Eldoradoans, will teach Spanish in the school, coming from the University of Texas where she received both her B A and M A degrees, the latter at the close of the summer session. Miss Smith will teach both high school and elementary Spanish. A granddaughter of Mrs. W. M. Bearce, she has visited in Eldorado often.

Succeeding Miss Pearl Leifester, who has resigned due to ill health, will be Miss Pauline Jones, a local girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Jones, who will teach the sixth grade.

Miss Jones was born in Schleicher County, graduating from the Eldorado High School and Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, where she received her BS degree in Education this past year. (She was presented last Fall as 1946 Homecoming Queen at the University, and served as yell leader during her senior year. Since her graduation she was employed for some time at the Robert Bros. Auto-Lec Store in San Angelo, and has recently been assisting in the sheriff and tax-collector's office here.

Mrs. Ann G. Pruett, who was employed several weeks ago to teach in the Latin-American school, has offered her resignation.

There are no criminal cases. The two civil cases filed both involve damages.

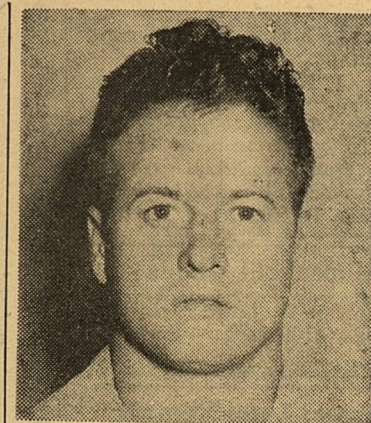

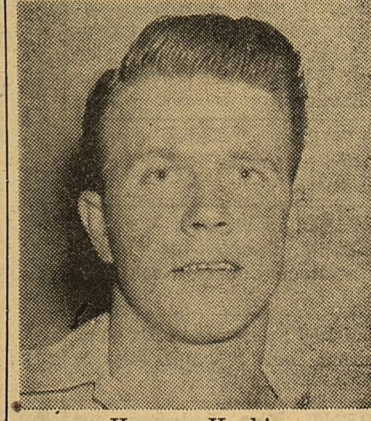

"Blocking and tackling are a little rugged, but prospects are good," said Curnutt yesterday, as he and Hopkins lined the boys up and put them through their paces in the third consecutive day of 1947 football practice.

With abandoning of Ellenburger as pay possibility, operators of the Groebl-Baugh wildcat (C SE SE 8M GH—&SA) are making plans to test other sands in which they had encountered good showings.

Perforations were made at 6465 to 6510, about 120 feet in Ellenburger. 168 perforations were made and packer was set 990 off bottom, 1000 gallons of acid being used. Swabbing out of the oil used started at 1:00 a. m. today (Thursday) but the hole yielded no other oil. Testing of the well will continue.

Morgan 3C Jess Koy (C SE NE 38L GH&SA) may be good for about 125 barrels per day, state operators, who have been testing it for some time.

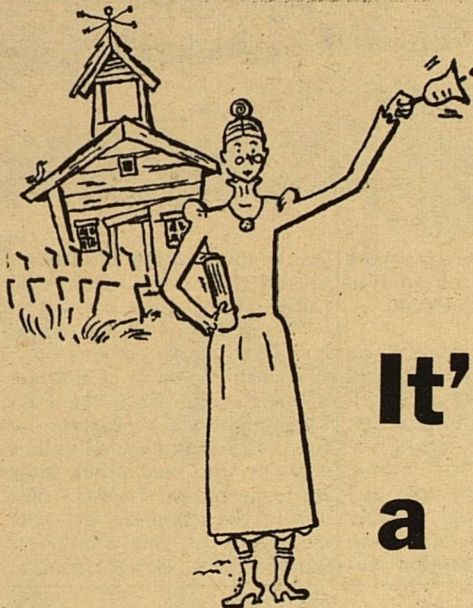

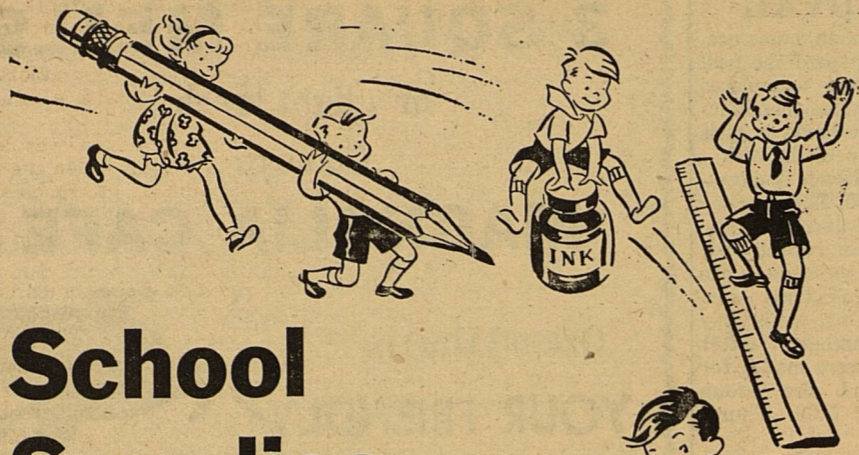

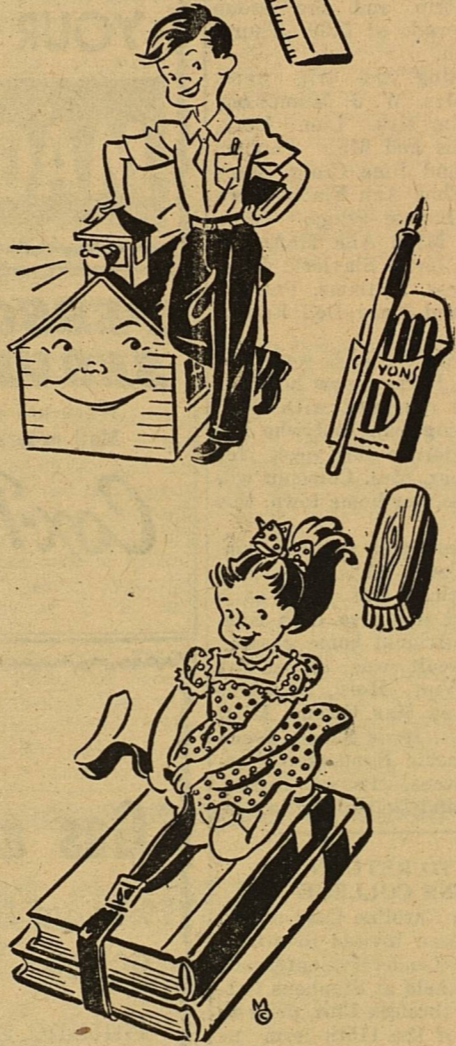

IMPROVEMENTS NOW UNDER WAY ON RESIDENCES

In spite of rising building costs, new residences are going up and improvements are being made on Schleicher Co. property.

MAYOR OUTLINES CONTROL METHOD FOR MOSQUITOES

Because of widespread complaint concerning the heaviest mosquito infestation the city has had in a dry season in many years, Mayor Jess Thompson asks for one hundred percent cooperation of Eldorado residents in eradicating the pests.

Contrary to belief of some local residents, he states, the city's disposal plant is not responsible for the spread of the mosquitoes. He points out that the plant is regularly treated, and that recent careful inspection fails to show any sign of mosquito breeding; for that reason places connected with the sewer are not furnishing breeding grounds for the insect, unless there is stagnant water elsewhere to provide hatching places.

Mayor Thompson, after examining the private septic tanks in Eldorado, believes that he has located the source of the trouble. From the vent pipes he has seen clouds of mosquitoes swarming out, indicating that they were bred in the underground tanks.

His suggestion for control is simple but effective: regularly, once a week, pour a half gallon of kerosene through sink or commode, or a gallon in open toilets, and thus kill the mosquitoes while they are in the "wiggler" stage.

Prevention & Control of Insect Pests in Seed Explained By Agent

Insect infestations in seed come from 1. seed infested in the field at harvest time and later put into storage; 2.) failure to keep seed houses cleaned of wasted seed; 3.) presence of grain feeds stored in or near seed houses, and 4.) failure to isolate or treat surplus seed that is kept over from year to year.

In order to destroy those insects present and prevent others from attacking the seed later, treat the seed with a mixture of 1 ounce of 3 percent DDT dust and 1 ounce of magnesium oxide dust at the rate of 100 pounds of seed. By adding 1 ounce of ceresan to the above mixture, the seed born diseases will be controlled. Use 4 ounces of copper carbonate with the above dust for treating 100 pounds of grain sorghum.

If treating large quantities of seed with the dust mixtures mentioned above is not available, good control may be obtained by fumigating the seed with ethylene dichloride-carbon tetrachloride mixture at the rate of 5 to 6 gallons per 1,000 bushels of seed. This material is poured directly over the top of the seed. This treatment does not prevent insects from re-entering the seed.

Other chemicals such as naphthalene flakes or moth balls, cyanide, methyle bromide, or carbon bisulphide will kill stored product insect pests, but will injure the seed germination if the moisture content is high.

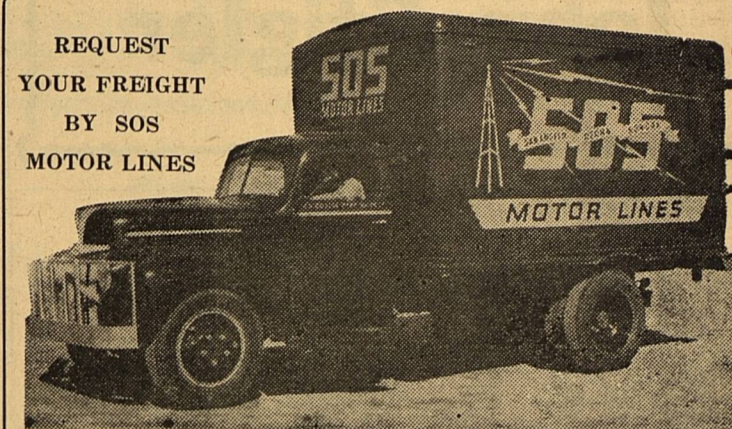

New Regulations For Motor Vehicle Owners

Changes in title and registration laws made by the Fiftieth Legislature will sooner or later affect all owners of motor vehicles, Texas Highway Department spokesmen say.

A number of these new laws become effective September 5.

After that date, for example, the Texas Highway Department will be required to charge a fee of \$1.00 for assigning numbers to new or reconditioned motors. A similar fee was ordered for serial numbers on house trailers.

The growing practice of installing new and rebuilt motors, some bearing no identification number, demands a strict accounting of both motor and serial numbers on vehicles to assure valid titles in the name of rightful owners.

New laws outline a procedure giving maximum protection to legal owners of all motor vehicles. When motors are exchanged, the vehicle owner must apply promptly to the Texas Highway Department for a correction of his certificate of title. Otherwise the title to his vehicle is clouded because its motor number does not correspond to his title, an awkward situation to handle when he tries to sell his car.

If the new or reconditioned motor bears a manufacturer's number, it should be used. If it is blank, as many are nowadays, the purchaser must apply direct to the Texas Highway Department at Austin for an assigned number. Forms for this application may be obtained from any County Tax Collector's office. It is illegal to stamp any number on a motor other than a number assigned by the Highway Department.

A new service has been provided for Texans who wish to take delivery on a new vehicle at the factory or from a dealer in another state.

Temporary license plates for the exclusive use of buyers while driving their new car back home are now issued under another of the Fiftieth Session's new laws.

Suggested by Highway Department officials for the convenience of purchasers wishing to drive their new car back from the factory, the new law eliminates many thorny legal technicalities formerly incident to the practice.

Temporary plates, good for thirty days, can now be secured without delay at the County Tax Collector's office, and carried to the factory or other out-of-state delivery point. The owner may secure certificate of title to his new car and regular registration plates after returning to Texas.
