#### HOSPITAL NEED FOR THIS AREA TOLD IN REPORT

That West Texas areas are low in hospital facilities is indicated by a report released by the state health department, officials of which have been making a survey under a national aid act, providing federal funds.

The federal government is ready to allocate \$24,000,000 to Texas over a 5-year period, on a share-thecost basis. Four states have had their program approved to date and Texas is making this survey to determine areas in which need exists.

In a list of cities with A priority appears the name of Eldorado, along with Ozona, Menard, Sonora, Junction, and other West Texas places. Those in the A list include 62 cities, which will be given top priority as showing urgent need. It was reported in the recent

hearing held at Austin that the 62 places not served by hospitals constitute an area more than equal unserved areas in five other states in the union.



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



#### Hard of Hearing visiting this week at Van Horn and Children Handicapped

The child who cannot hear is bad-handicapped. Hard-of-hearing children are often considered backward and become greatly retarded in school when in reality they may be highly intelligent but simply cannot hear much of what is said to them. Children who appear backward in school should be observed carefully to determine if hearing is

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, many injuries to the ear can be prevented by keeping foreign objects out of the ear canal, taking good care of the ears during colds and other dis-eases and observing certain precautions when swimming.

"The cause of middle ear trouble ften is diving and swimming," Dr. Cox said. "Protect the ears by

vearing a rubber cap or ear plugs.' The State Health Officer declared that no hard instrument of any kind should be used in cleansing the ear canal since it may be injurious. Using ordinary precautions can do much to avoid minor ear trouble which may lead later to partial or complete deafness.


