CARS FOLLOWING AFTER FIREMEN

The Eldorado firemen call attention to the fact that civilians must be careful in following fires, as failure to observe rules will mean a misdemeanor. The law reads:

"Following Fire Apparatus Prohibited. The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than five hundred (500) feet or drive into or park such vehicle within the block where the fire apparatus has stopped to answer a fire alarm."

And section 101 reads as fol-lows: "Crossing Fire Hose, No driver of a street car or vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down in any street, private driveway, or street car track, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the fire department official in command."

For Lengthening Hem

in spite of all the hemming and having that's going on about it. So, for the girls who have decided to stop the fight and let their

hems down, here's what might be some helpful information.

Miss Mary Routh, clothing specialist of the Texas A&M College

Extension Service, has an answer to the girls' question: "How am I going to lengthen a skirt without giving it that telltale, letdown If it is a wool skirt that's being

let down, and if the fabric is shiny on the underside of the hem, rip the hem and steam-press it on the wrong side of the fabric-that is, if the wool is light weight or has a raised pattern in the weave. If it is a thick wool, Miss Routh advises steam pressing on the right side.

In steam pressing, cover the fabric with a dry wool press cloth, then with a cotton cloth dampened the in warm water. You may use a warm iron, but set it down, then lift it. Don't slide it back and forth.

If the shine is still showing after that operation, there's another brush or a rubber sponge—the kind used for suede shoes-and try raising the nap of the wool with it.

Conspicuous and stubborn hemline creases can often be erased by wetting the crease on the wrong side. Then turn the goods over on the right side and roll the crease back and forth in your finger to work it out. Then press on the wrong side afterward.



ART COLLECTION NOW ON DISPLAY AT STATE FAIR

The greatest art collection ever to be exhibited in the Southwest, a \$1,500,000 array of old masters famed the world over, will go on display this weekend when the State Fair of Texas opens Oct. 4 in Dallas.

By special arrangement with the Metropolitan Museum of Art of New York, thirty priceless paintings—including works by Rembrandt, Goya, Van Dyck, Van Ruysdael and Titian—have been shipped to Dallas in a specially-equipped boxar and under heavy guard. The collection can be seen throughout the Fair, Oct. 4-19, at the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts, located on the Fair grounds.

Six European schools of art Dutch, Flemish, French, German, Italian and Spanish, are represented in the display, and some of the priceless canvases had their origin in the fifteenth century. In subject matter, the paintings range from the classical solemnity of Peter Paul Rubens' "Virgin and Child" to the Dali-like "Christ's Descent into Hell", by a 17th century fol lower of Hieronymus Bosch.

Probably the best known work is The Horse Fair", which for more than a decade has been widely re produced, particularly on school tablets and as class room pictures. The artist is Rosa Bonheur, 19th century Frenchwoman whose great-ness is shown through her life-like draftsmanship, classical composition and deftness in details. This work, which its creator once fail ed to sell for a pittance to her own townspeople, is now valued at
